WAR DEPT. WAR DEPT. WROTE "PROVED"
No longer just an experiment is the Nisci Compat "PROVED" Team, reports Time Magazine in its July 31 issue. Said Time:

"From a cautious experiment the Army had received en unexpectedly rich reward. A group of sinewy oriental soldiers, only one generation removed from a nation that was fighting fanatically against the U.S., was fighting just as fanatically for it. Last week the War Dopartment wrote 'proved' on the experiment. It added a unit citation (for 'outstanding performance of duty in action') to the already-remarkable collection of modals held by the Japanese American 100th Battalion.

"For almost two years after the attack on Poarl Harbor, young Japanese American soldiers trained hard and all but unnoticed at a camp in the U.S. Then the news began to spread: they looked so good that the Wer Departament began to recruit more from Hawaii.

"The first group soon got a real test. Formed up as the 100th Infantry Pattalion, they were sent to North Africa, attached to the 34th Division. To keep them a racial unit the War Department sent along 500 reserve

lime for fultation

While workers in the Chicago area are using the strike weapon to discriminate against Japanese Americans, the Chicago Sun on July 27 came out with a statement that this is no time for agitation.

It editorializes as follows:

"Joseph B. Ford, president of the Chicago Estate Board, contributes little to community wellbeing when he issues an inflammatory statement nouncing the transfer of between 4,000 and 5,000 Japanose Americans to Chicago.

NISEL ARE CITIZENS

"It may well be that some individuals dislike to near persons of Japanese ancestry, even though the latter are American-born citizens with inalien-It is also true, however, that some of ablo rights. the most indignant letters protesting persecution of Japanese American minority have come from members of the armed forces, who point cut that race discrimination is an Axis doctrine."

AMERICANS ALL

Harold S. Jacoby, acting area director of the War Relocation Authority, says that the proportion of Japanese Americans brought here is about 1 to every 1,000 of population -- approximately the national average . They have found jobs and parned their livings because workers were needed in our laber-short region. Some of them undoubtedly have relatives in the U.S. Army-perhaps in the 100th Battalion of the 442nd Regiment combat team, cited this month for "fighting brilliantly" in Italy. There is a bottor way to approach their problems than by exaggerating whatever latent prejudice may exist.

nisci to augment the 100th's normal battalien strength

of 800. The reserves were soon needed.
"From the day of their first action-in Italy--the 100th had one tough fight after another. The stocky, brown-skinned boys, with their curious Hewaiian English, showed themselves good shots, doggedly sistant in combat.

"Fifteen enlisted men won battlefield promotions. After Cassino, where they had spearheaded the crossing of the Rapido River and had clung to a corner of the town for many days, their combat strength was down to

120 mon.

"In the action at Belveders, for which the 100th was officially cited, the divisional commander had to commit the battalien seemer than expected, to outflank a tough German position. With little artillery support the Nisei cut behind the position of some 500 Germans. knocked it to pieces, killed, wounded and captured 271 Gormans .

"After the capture of Rome the 100th was joined by its recently trained counterpart, the 442nd Combat Team, also Japanese-Americans. Both units are exceptionally popular in the Fifth Army, have a wonderful knack for organizing little conforts, cooking up tasty

un-Army dishes.
"Moro recently the Japanese-Americans have seen action at San Luce and Pastina. Last week their versatility was further recognized. They had pitched in with the Engineers to help rebuild the port of Leg-horn. Said their commander, Major General Charlos W. Rydor: they're the best troops in the Division.

MYER DISCUSSES TULE DECISION

Director Dillon Myer teletyped to the project Tuesday concerning the recent docision dismissing prosecutions against Tule Lake evacuees indicted for selective service violations

Director Myer's teletype

roads as follows:

On July 22 Judge Goodman the Federal District Court sitting at Eure ka, California, dismissed prosocutions against 26 Tule Lake evacuees indicted for Solective Service violations. We have not yet received a copy of the decision but from nowspape r accounts it appears that the Judge was influenced by the fact that Tule Lake is a segregation center for disloyal evacuoes. In any event all the decision means is that particular Judge will probably treat future Tule Lake cases in same fashion if not overruled by higher court. The decisifn has no bind-ing effect on other Federal District courts which have been uniformly holding that evacuses in Relocation Centers who refuse to obey selective service calls are draft dodgers and punishable as such. Justice Department may appeal Judge Goodman's decision directly to Supreme Court. We shall advise you further upon receipt of further information.

"The amount of food in the isolation kitchen was too great to have been entirely consumed and probably some was hidden to be eaton later, "WRA officials said.

When examined by the doctors, the strikers "were not in serious condition" and "the men are cetting around unassisted," officials declared.

COBLIERS MAGAZINIE THEILUS STORY OF WOUNDED

"It was common know-ledge that they'd licked the pants off Hitler's boys in Italy and had kept going in the face of terrific casualties," writes Gene Casey in praise of tho 100th Infantry in the August 5 Collier's. Tο find out why they had "fought like a gang of tigors" among other things, Casey interviowed Mac Yazawa who stopped a lot of shrapnel in the Volturno River crossing.

The gist of the article is now familiar to many nisei and issei with very little variations. The story of the 100th however is not so well known to the rost of the American public. .. that the 100th landed at Salerno and es of ublished a number "firsts" in the Italian campaign. "They were first

to take German prisoners, first to destroy a German tank, and the first to charge and take a German position with bayonets."

Calling Mac a "GI Japyank," Casey describes him as "strictly a GI Joe ... an American kid with an anruly look of black hair that hung down over his forehoad, and he was still young in his ideas, even though he had been sobered by a big chunk of war."

"He looked more like an Indian," said Casey, "than he did like a Japanese."

Mac has a married sister here in Rivers.


