Nisei Establish Church Group

A Japanese American Christian Fellowship has established in Cleveland with Victor Fujii as pastor and with a weekly attendance averaging more than 100, according to the Cleveland News.

The group has two major aims, according to the report. They wish to worship together and they want to reach a better interracial understanding with other Christian youth groups.

Says Pastor Fujii:

"Now that we've come together from all parts of the west, we hope we'll be accepted for what we are--fellow Americans. Already we've made contact with other Christian youth groups and we plan to meet with them this fall."

necessary to put center jobs on a priority basis in order that essential positions are always filled.

ITALY

SERVICES HELD FOR 120 NISEI

A memorial ceremony for nearly 120 nisei soldiers killed during the 442nd's first 29 days of action was held Sunday, July 30, in a stubble field near Cocina, Italy, which they had seized from the Germans, according to a UP correspondent.

During the ceremony a 36-round salute was fired by an infantry squad led by Sergeant Mishimoto whose squad was among the first to reach southern Pisa and penetrate six miles behind the German lines on a patrol.

Addressing a group of center loaders yesterday, Utz stated that centers are facing increasing difficulties in carrying on essential activities. He said that it may be necessary to consider activities on a priority basis and that community leaders, in cooperation with the appointed staff concerned, could aid in creating sentiment regarding community service in doing certain jobs and see that priority positions are filled.

The optimum number of workers and also the minimum for the different activities might be set up. If some activity has more workers than the minimum, men from that work could be transferred to the more essential activities.

Utz believes that by this priority method the center would be made a more livable place for those who must remain here.

TULO HUNGER STRIKERS END ELEVEN DAY FAST

The "hunger strike," recently conducted by thirteen segregationists at the Tulo Lake Segregation Center, came to an end on July 30, stated the Pacific Citizen.

WRA officials announced that the men had started the strike on July 19 with the declaration that they could not eat until they

were released from the camp's isolation stockade where they were interned following the disturbances last November.

They were sent to the camp hospital on July 30, after breaking their fast.

They will be returned to the isolation area, the WRA reported.

The thirteen strikers "definitely were not in a serious condition," it was reported.

The strike had been started with fourteen segregationists, but one of them had quit the demonstration on July 25.

The decision to abandon the "hunger strike" reportedly came after the WRA declared July 29 that foodstuffs which were in the isolation area kitchen apparently had been hidden to be eaten later during the strike.

Central Block Manager Resigns

Michimasa Asami, temporary central block manager, submitted his resignation from the position at last week's meeting since he would like to take care of the juveniles.

Douglas Mitsuhashi, Sakao Morodomi, and Shiro Ishimaru were named for a committee to elect a new chairman.

Two new block manager replacements were also announced. Jitsutaro Tokuyama replaced Frank Yoshihara of block 52, and T. Miura took the place of Giichi Nakamura of block 39.

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'ADOPTED CLEVELANDERS'

"Our adopted Clevelanders," is what the Cleveland Press calls Japanese Americans who are residing in that city and many of whose sons, brothers, and husbands have been killed or wounded in Italy.

In a three column front page story, Maxwell Riddle of the Cleveland Press tells the story of how the adopted sons are proving their loyalty to the land of Uncle Sam.

He writes:

"The blood and lives of a gallant band of adopted Clevelanders are proving on the battlefields of Italy the loyalty of the Japanese-Americans for the land of Uncle Sam."

THREE HAVE DIED

Three have been killed in action, and four more wounded. They themselves were replacements for Japanese Americans who had fallen in battle before them.

"These adopted Clevelanders are members of the famed 442nd Infantry Combat Team, which originally was made up of Japanese-Americans from the Hawaiian Islands. They are adopted Clevelanders because their families now live and work in Cleveland, after evacuation from the Pacific Coast."

AS DESERVING CITIZENS

It is good to know that people in Cleveland are giving a square deal to its deserving citizens, regardless of race and ancestry.

Some of these same deserving people in other cities don't fare so well. From Chicago comes news that the 59 Japanese American trackmen have been forced to abandon work, some even returning to relocation centers, because of the anti-Japanese pressure brought to bear by union men. And there is still the West Coast from which persons of Japanese ancestry are prohibited.

We'd like to see these discriminatory policies abandoned. With the Clevelanders, we too feel that the Japanese Americans have proved and are proving that they are a deserving race, and are entitled to live in a country for which they fight.

Japanese Graves
Pillaged Twice

The desecration of the Japanese cemetery in Portland, Oregon, for the second time within a year was blamed on adults rather than boys, reported the AP.

Ponderous gravestones were broken and tossed into heaps like a child's set of blocks--so shattered that it is doubted that graves and monuments could ever be rematched.

The cemetery has been practically abandoned since evacuation. In 1943 a group of Portland church people announced that they would clean and beautify the cemetery in the absence of the Japanese and nisei. They were prevented from doing so by a group of American Legionnaires.

SENTENCE STAYED ON CONDITIONS

Two Butte residents, Noboru Kawata and Roy Suetani, charged with permitting gambling in their apartments, were sentenced by the Judicial Commission yesterday morning to 90 days in jail. The sentence, however, was suspended on the following conditions:

1. Each man must work in the occupation in which he is best suited for six months at wages which are to be determined by the WRA.

2. Observe curfew from 9 p.m. to 6 a.m. for two months except that they may attend programs sponsored by any organization upon obtaining a permit from the internal security.

3. If they fail to comply with these conditions without a valid excuse, or commit an offense within the next 60 days, they must serve 90 days in jail.

Tule Boy Killed By Dump Truck

Four-year-old Osamu Nakata, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shigeo Nakata, formerly of Fresno, Calif., and the Jerome Relocation Center, was instantly killed August 7 at the Tule Lake Center when struck by a dump truck loaded with coal.

The ovaque driver of the truck was cleared of all blame by E.R. Server, Modoc County Coroner, who investigated the accident. Although there were no witnesses, it was believed the boy was running alongside the truck when the vehicle started to turn and struck him with the right rear wheel. The truck was preparing to stop at a block to unload and was moving at about 5 miles an hour in second gear.

In addition to his parents he is survived by two brothers and a sister.

Complete exclusion of Japanese immigration in Canada after the war was announced as a government policy by Prime Minister Mackenzie King, according to an AP report from Ottawa.

He said a special commission will be set up to determine the loyal and disloyal Japanese. The loyal would be treated justly but would not be allowed to congregate in British Columbia. The disloyal would be sent to Japan whether they were born there or not.
