In a three column front pa ge story, Maxwell Riddle of the Cleveland Press tells the story of how the adopted sons are proving their loyalty to the land of

Unclo Sam. He writes:

"The blood and lives of a gallant band of a dopted Clevelandors are proving on the battlefields of Italy the loyalty of the Japanese Americans for the land of Uncle Same"

THREE HAVE DIED
"Throe have been killed in action, and four mome wounded. They themselves were replacements for Japanesc Americans who had fallen in battle before thom.

"These adopted Clovolanders are members of the femed 442nd Infantry Combat Toam, which originally was made up of Japanese Americans from the Hawaiian Islands . They are adopted Blevelanders because their families now live and work in Cleveland, after evacuation from the Pacific Coast."

The desecration ofthe Japanese comotory in Portland, Oregon, for the second time within a .year was blamed on adults rather than boys, reported the AP.

Ponderous gravestones and tossed were broken into heaps like a childs set of blocks--so tered that it is doubted that graves and monu ments could ever be rematched.

The cemetery has been practically abandone d since evacuation. In 1943 a group of Portlan d church people announce d that they would clean and beautify the cemetery in the absence of the Japanesc and nisei. They were prevented from doing so by a group of American Legionnaires.

# Tule Boy Killed By Dump Truck

Four-year-old Osamu Nakata, son of Mr. and Mrs. Shigeo Nakata, formerly of Fresno, Calif., and the Jeromo Relocation Center, was instantly killed August 7 at the Tule Lake Center when struck by a dump truck loaded with coal.

The ovacuee driver of the truck was cleared of all blame by E.R. Server, Modoc County Coroner, who investigated the accident. Although there were no witnesses, it was believed the boy was running alongside the truck when the vehicle started to turn and struck him with the right rear wheel. The truck was preparing to stop at a block to unload and was moving at about 5 milès an hour in second gear.

In addition to his parents he is survived by two brothers and a sis-

tor.
