10,000 Nisei Serve In Army

American boys of Japanese ancestry in the American army, half from the Hawai-ian Islands and half from the mainland, according to Department of Interior rolease. Those from the mainland for the most part ore members of families who make up the 110,000 two-thirds persons, two-thirds of them American-born citizens, who wore evacuated from the West Coast early in 1942. Approximately 30,000 evacuees have rolocated in normal communities throughout the United States and together with their kinsmen in military service are making a real contribution to the war program, Director Myer said.

The 442nd Combat Team

is made up of volunteers, 1200 of them voluntoering from relocation centers. More than 5,000 in all are now fighting in .Italy. Other soldiers of Japanese ancestry, both volunteers and inductoes, are in training in other thoaters.

# utaly WoundedNisei Takes3Germans

Concealing a wound until his mission was completed, Sergeant Kay Ihara, a switchboard operator with the Japanese American 442nd Combat Team, captured three Germans the first day he went into the front lines.

Carrying a portable radio set, Sergeant Ihara, whose home is at 1704 W. 38th Avenue, Denver, Colorado, went out to assist a forward artillery observer. He was wounded slightly by shell fragments, but concealed his condition and refused to leave his post.

As the attack moved forward, he observed a German before a cave in a mountainside. Armed only with a carbine, he surprised and captured the Nazi, then backed him into the cave and captured two

others.

Only when he returned from the field with his three prisoners did he submit to medical attention.

"It was tough and exciting," said Sorgeant Ihara, "but I'd rather be up there with the fellows than back in the command post."

CAMDUFLAGE FUND

That old familiar "camouflage not fund", the ofttalked-of and not-much-acted on problem child of this center, has come up again this week with the Community Council's proposal that the fund be used for community benefit such as a student scholarship fund. Such a proposal has come up several times before, but each time well meaning groups have found that because of legal aspects involved, their hands are tied, that the fund is as good as frozen.

The disposition of the fund could be made less complicated if the people who still have claims to it would individually sign papers releasing their share of the fund so that the remaining sum of approximately \$19,000 can be used in a lump for a worthy purpose instead of being whittled down through individual pay-

ments and handling costs.

This may sound like an attempt to railroad individuals to sign away the few cents that will be coming to them, but actually we feel that the small amounts that might go up in individual cigarotte smoke could be used for a better cause if saved as a lump sum.

DISTRIBUTION TAKES TIME

Why not distribute the romaining amount fast and get it over with, some people may ask. If it were as simple as all that, it would have been done when the first distribution was made. Anyone who has taken enough interest in the trust fund can readily see where

the complications come in.

The fund carries a long history of dragged out existence ever since the net factory ended in May, 1943. And it is going to keep up its dragged out existence because of the pay plan laid out when part of the net workers earnings were set aside in trust to be distributed to all other workers working at the time. The fund was established at the time because it was felt that the net workers were earning too much compared to the other \$16 and \$19 men and women who were on project jobs.

According to the pay plan all the fund must be distributed to the beneficiaries (those working at the time of the factory's operation), unless each of those beneficiaries releases his share for community use. The distribution is complicated by the fact that a part of the romaining \$10,000 must be held to be paid back to the net workers themselves. This is the refund to the net workers for income tax which they paid for that part of the earnings they never got (the part they gave up to the trust fund).

COMPLICATIONS INVOLVED

In other words even if the distribution were to be made to the beneficiaries, a large sum must be held back to pay income tax refunds to the net workers, who may claim such refunds until Doc. 31 of this year. When all the tax refund claims are met, then there will be a little more left of the net fund, which will again have to be distributed proportionately. It will be a long and complicated process, and the most that a beneficiary can get from now until the end of its existence will not be more than two dollars.

The situation therefore is this:

The Community Council and other groups want to use the remainder of the net fund for a student scholarship fund or community fund. But no one can touch the fund except through signed releases by individual beneficiaries. The Council is proparing authorization and release blank for individuals to sign. It is up to the people to decide whether they need the few cents more than students or the community needs the \$19,000.

Go For Broke, the news-paper of the First Battalion, 442nd Inf. a t Camp Shelby, has changed its name to We Will Do It, since the Battalion was redesignated the, 171st Infantry Battalion Sep arate as of August 10.

The redesignation puts the 171st in a class almost or completely by itself, the camp paper reported. The change means that the organization will be able to carry a medical detachment, other service units, and provisional companies if necessary.

The commanding officer of the Buttalion is Lt. Col. Shorman L. Watts.

Jobs in a war plant making parts for rocket ships and bombers, has just opened up for a large number of Nisei girls in Cleveland, according to a WRA release from Cleve - . land.

Inexperienced girls will be taught drilling, assembling, packing, and inspecting operations at a high rate of pay, which starts at 70¢ an hour, goes to 75¢ after 30 days, and, then to 80g after 3 months. After these increases, further p a y raises, a'r e possible, based on merit. Time and a half is paid after 40 hours and a 58 hour week can be adjusted downward if the girls do not wish to work that many hours.

Working conditions in the light and airy factory are good, the rolease states. Woman who is in charge of the personnel dopart ment will assist girls in housing and transportation problems might arise.

At this writing, five nisei are already employed at the company and are apparently well satisfied with their jobs.


