BENNETT

Returns From California Trip

Project Director Leroy H. Bennett and A.F. Chamberlin, evacuee property officer, returned Thursday night after an eleven-day trip to California on WRA business during which they visited San Francisco, Sacramento, Fresno, Los Angeles, and several small cities.

Project Director Bennett revealed the interesting fact that some Japanese American troops have been brought into the Fresno area for special training. While in San Francisco he met R.B. Cozzens and Director Myer.

Chamberlin reports that a new WRA warehouse to store evacuee property has been opened in Fresno and that all warehouses are in good shape, especially the one in Sacramento. At present there is a shortage of labor and lumber which is causing some delay in shipments, but it has been improving during the past few months.

He noted that there has been a slight drop in the price of real property, and the market is on the whole slower. He said that colored people have generally taken over many of the places formerly inhabited by Japanese.

TWO NISEI

EXEMPTED FROM EXCLUSION

Charles H. Carr, U.S. district attorney in Los Angeles, announced Thursday that military authorities have exempted two American-born Japanese, Mrs. Shizuko Shiramizu (her husband was killed while fighting with American forces in Italy) and Masaru Baba, from the government order excluding Japanese from the Pacific coast defense zone and particularly from Los Angeles county, according to an AP report.

FOUR GILANS TO HEAD ARABIA FARM MISSION

David A. Rogers, chief of the farm section, with three associates, Carl W. Quast, Walter E. Emrick, and Raleigh J. Sanderson, will leave next week to head an agricultural mission to Arabia.

Rogers will report in Washington on September 11, and the rest of the party will join him the following week. As soon as pre-

parations for the expedition can be completed, the group will leave for Arabia. It is understood that they will be flown in from Cairo to Dhahran.

The party was formed by the War Food Division of the Foreign Economic Administration after the Arabian Government requested a group of agricultural men to assist in the farm production problems of that country. Headquarters for the party will be at Dhahran on the Persian Gulf. His Majesty King Ibn Saud wishes the first demonstration work to be started at Al Kharij, on land directly adjacent to his palace so that he can follow the progress of the demonstration closely and plan for the successful results of the demonstration to be carried to other parts of the nation. It is expected that approximately two years will be required to complete the mission.

Gila Obtains Sept. 8 Coach

Southern Pacific officials in Phoenix have advised the relocation office that an extra coach will be made available for Gila relocators on Friday, September 8, announced Wilson Hart.

This coach will be in addition to the regular coaches leaving on September 7 and September 14.

Since most of the Seabrook relocators scheduled to leave on September 14 have switched to the September 8 coach, there will be an unlimited number of seats available for regular relocators on Sept. 14.

Seabrook relocators who are unable to leave on either the 7th or 8th, may also leave on September 14, if they prefer.

Carr asked federal court to dismiss suits brought by a Civil Liberties Union attorney to test the right of the military to exclude Mrs. Shiramizu and Baba. He said army officials had advised him that there were no facts on record indicating that Mrs. Shiramizu or Baba might jeopardize security.

Carr said military authorities have exempted certain individuals from the general exclusion order.

ITALY**Nisei Warrior Has Big Day**

In a day's fighting, Private First Class Robert W. Yasutake, Lahaina, Maui Hawaiian infantryman recently silenced three enemy machineguns, killed four Germans and wounded and captured seven others in Italy.

Yasutake fights with the Japanese-American 100th Infantry Battalion on the Fifth Army front in Italy. His unit then was attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Division.

The action occurred while Yasutake's company successfully completed the mission of cutting a winding road through a grape field which the Germans had been using as a supply route.

100TH MEMBERS RESCUE CAPTIVES

Attacking a German-held house near Belvedere, Italy, four company runners of the Japanese-American 100th Infantry Battalion killed one German and wounded another, captured three prisoners, and rescued three American soldiers who had been held captive.

Privates First Class Seitoku Hanashiro, Kohala, Hawaii; Seichi Maeda, Wainaku Mill Camp, Hilo, Hawaii; Tetsuo Tateishi, Aiea, Oahu, and Masaru Kado-moto, Honolulu, Hawaii, had passed an isolated house and were fired on by snipers. Noticing that the shots were coming from two windows and a doorway, they opened fire and forced and Germans to withdraw. Maeda when advanced under cover of his comrades and tossed a grenade in the doorway. It brought from the house the shout: "Hey, don't fire-- we're Americans!"

"If you are Americans come out with your hands in the air," Tateishi ordered. Three American soldiers came out. Four German snipers were in the house, they said.

Tateishi advanced toward the doorway and demanded that the Germans surrender. It took shots

WATCH THAT STEP

Japanese Americans, whose actions are being watched by a critical America, must watch themselves the more carefully because of that fact. The record of loyalty and contributions to the nation written in all parts of the world by Nisei fighting men must not be marred by the thoughtless actions of a few on the home front.

To young Nisei who go out from relocation centers after more than two years of confinement, temptations to go on a spree without regard to public opinion is undoubtedly strong. We may feel that we ought to make up for lost time, may even feel that we will get sympathy for the deprivations of the past few years.

LITTLE THINGS COUNT

Most of the Nisei on the outside are making a good showing of themselves in their work and in their associations with other people; but at the same time there are some who are helping to stamp the term "rowdy" not only upon themselves but upon other people of their race. It is probably those people who have caused rumors to fly in the centers that certain cities on the outside have a "reputation." Their intentions may be innocent, and their behavior may be just silly at the worst, but the results can be harmful for the entire Nisei population.

For example drapes and peahooks in themselves are all right. No one has the right to tell anyone else what clothes to wear and how to fix the hairdo. But the fact does remain that this particular type of apparel is looked upon with disfavor and often with antagonism by the American public because it has become associated with rowdiness and with gangs.

SHUN THE CONSPICUOUS

It would be discreet therefore to steer away from the unpopular and stick to the normal and the more inconspicuous, not only in clothes, but also in actions, speech, and in social contacts. Nisei are a minority and a not too popular one at that; it would be the height of indiscretion to try to buck against society's preferences by parading in unpopular attire or indulging in conspicuous actions and speech.

Several issues ago a young woman from Illinois wrote a biting note against those who would condemn Chicago as having a "reputation." If all people had the same pride in themselves and the same concern for the welfare of the other Nisei, then the Japanese Americans on the outside will gain a "reputation" of another kind, one that will match the reputation built by the 100th and the 442nd.

CHURCHILL**LAUDS NISEI, NEGROES**

Prime Minister Churchill in Rome on Aug. 21 praised the 5th Army as one of the great striking forces of the Allied Nations and paid a special compliment to U.S. troops of Japanese and Negro ancestry, ac-

ording to an AP release. Churchill's very personal participation in the war occurred during his recent visit to the American 5th Army front. He personally shot a big American gun at two German cannon positions north of Pisa. He pulled the lanyard and it fell 200 yards short of the target. A gunnery officer corrected the elevation, and two rounds later both enemy guns were destroyed.

J.A.C.L.**Receives \$500 Contribution**

The JACL national headquarters in Salt Lake City this week announced the receipt of \$500 from the William S. Paley Foundation Inc. of New York City. This contribution is for 1944.

The Paley Foundation was established by William Paley of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

According to a recent ruling of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue, all contributions made to the JACL are deductible by the donors in arriving at their taxable net income. Also bequests, legacies, devises, or transfers to or for the use of the JACL are deductible in arriving at the value of the net estate of a decedent for estate tax purposes. Gifts of property to the JACL are deductible in computing net gifts for gift tax purposes.

This undertaking is the actual application of recommendations resulting from previous surveys by American specialists and technicians, particularly agronomists and irrigation engineers.

Before they were employed by the WRA, Rogers had been with the Soil Conservation Service from 1935 to 1942; Quast had been active in vegetable business of the valley for several years; Sanderson was water master for the Secaton Indian Reservation, and Erick employed in vocational agriculture at Bakersfield, Calif.

Ralph K. Moyer, Rivers statistician, resigned from his WRA job today to accept a position in Phoenix. He has been with the War Relocation Authority for two years and has lived in Phoenix for 26 years.

Nisei Soldiers Show Influence

Influence of Nisei soldiers is apt to show up without warning almost anywhere. Evidence of this comes from the Michigan WRA office at Detroit which reports receipt of a letter from J. Hughes Powell of Sparta, Michigan opening as follows: "My son who lives in a barrack at Fort Myer, in which are also Japanese American soldiers, advises me to write you in regard to getting Japanese families to work on farms."

They are first taught nursery rhymes in Indian, and when they master this, they are given text books. The brightest from among them are chosen to be sent to higher schools.

We all wish him happy hunting.



テニアン島に於ける 有史以前の遺蹟

テニアン島 八月十九日AP報(選着)
米國陸戦隊がマリヤナ群島中のテニアン島に上陸すると、彼等は世界に珍らしい考古学上の記念物にお目にかつた。それは有史以前に高度文明を有し

た人種に依つて建設せられた円錐状の大石柱で、之れ等の上には約十噸もある大磐石が載つけられたまゝ、米軍の六週間に亘る連続空爆にも微動だにもせず残存したものである。日本がマリヤナ群島

を統治すること二十七年、其の間考古学の權威を送つて、如何なる民族が如何なる時代に建築せるものなりや研究せしめたが、未だ解決の鍵が見附からず、学界的謎として残されて居ると碑文に書いてある。

斯る旧蹟はカロリン群島中のボナペツサイへ西島(日本統治領)にもある。テニアン島の古蹟を最初に発見したのは千五百廿一年で有名なマゼラン世界一周探險の時であつたが、西班牙人は唯だ無意味に記録に止めたのみであつた。

今より七十五年前テニアン全島はアイリッシュ系ジョンストン兄弟に賣つて六箇年借地せられ、ジョンストンはカロリン群島の土人二百

五十名を輸入して、野牛、猪を狩猟し、煙草、ポテト、ヤム、パイナップル等を栽培してサイパン、ガムに販賣して巨利を博した。千八百七十五年ジョンストンの契約満期後は濫獵の爲島内の獸畜は激減したので、西班牙政府は六年間狩獵禁止令を布いたことがある。其後幾度遷して日本統治となるや急速に開發せられ世界の宝庫として登場したものである。砂糖の生産額だけでも三百萬弗に及んでゐる。

この限に及ぶ農家は全部の所有となつたが、シブルックの所有地及び借地の總計は拾万英加に及ぶ。六百萬英加を一厘平方として考へて一寸すくは勘定も出来ぬが、シブルック氏が日本人を重用するやうになつた動機は本年正月に偶然コロラドのシブルックから来た二世ボリスの忠告な事。旅に端を著してゐるとか聞きました。

私が当地に来て以来既に社長自身も意で日本人の會合があり腹藏まで各自の意見或は要求を徴し、且秘書格の中村綾子氏を以て個々の不手又は不満の點を心に致し、暖かい心を持てます。

約一ヶ月前ビートの收穫が一段落を告げた時、工場内の日本人のみに一日の休暇を支給し、昨夜は社長自身重役を伴つて日本人慰勞の宴が挙がりました。メカニクス、鍛冶屋、金庫、ワラック使用などしてゐる日本人は一時間六十五仙以上七十五仙の給料を取つてゐます。他の人種は普通五十仙で働いてゐますが日本人は良能な事を遂行するといふわけに一時間五十五仙支給されてゐます。

兎に角社長は具眼の士です。人間慾を云へば果てしなく戦時下の現在五十五仙は女過ぎるといふ人もありますが生活費、食費、安い事を考へれば此處の五十五仙は都會の八九十仙乃至是處に相当します。

住宅の方は二晩の経験で貴下も承知の通りですが、私共の假りに住んでゐるアパートは今の所ウッドストロウで六カバールよりか設置してあり湯もこのストロウを通して沸かせる日式のもです。氷庫にしても外見は立派ですが氷を入ると式もつて、然し近くこれらを全部電氣のうちに換へるといふ高壓線を引く為には今工場の前に蓄電所を建ててゐます。全部出来あがるのは十月か拾月頃なると話です。

小生は家賃は取りせん、フリーのレント無しです。レントが要りませんから却つて今のまゝの方が吾々には有難いです。只今家庭を持つて自炊してゐる人は日本人中に五家族ありますが石炭は不自由なく配給されてゐます。家賃を請求する近はフライパン、鍋、皿類すべてを整備し、只身一つを持つて来て住むのは良いやうにする予定です。

アパートにはベッドルームから三ベッドルームまでありまして一室の公室は從十四呎横指二呎です。ベッドは四分の三型でウッドフレーム製です。ダブルベッドも一つ備へられてゐます。寢心地の良いことセンターのベッドと較べるとなりません。

壁は四方空洞煉瓦で暑寒共に防がやうなつてゐます。窓は二重の設備が既に出来あがりました。冬期に入つて相當の寒さを感見せねばなりません。どちらを向いても森林林があり沼澤の多い敵が蚊が多いやうです。

七日目か十日目に必ず立つ場所です。適度の濕りを保つ為には農園やガーデンには灌漑の設備がありません。私共は二年間ゼロームの硫酸臭い水を呑んで来ました。故に当地の冷たい清水にありつきたい。小つみでも永住したいといふ氣持になつてゐます。太平洋岸の猜疑深い根性曲り達と異なり東部の住人は貧乏人も相當ある様です。人間が質朴で一寸接しただけでも暖かい人間味を感じます。センターで物知り顔する連中は口を開けば

一所に多數の日本人が押しかけたりしては弟の加州を実現する恨みありとか何とか行かぬ先から取り越し苦労をしてゐますが、それは何時になつたら全センター日本人が安住の地を得られるかと問ひ返してはなりません。

ヘリーフォードの海軍かとも思はれる慈願温善な好老翁、小くも予からかな聲で誰がシブルック氏が如何なる計畫をもつと同胞をかくも優待してゐるかといふ議論は暫らく指し、何處を向ても排斥の声で八方塞がりの現在このシブルック氏の好意を素直に受け會社の必要とする人員のみで飽くまで踏みといまつて盡す覚悟が必要で、斯くして各自が忠実に實績を挙げるといふのは遠からず同氏後援のもとに支えられて、歩合耕作或はリース等で農業或は商賣の機會を掴み得るのではいかと思ひます。

同胞の数は少なからず相當識者もゐるから敢然起つて衆首をひらかうとする人々が少ないのは残念です。いづれ小口禍を恐るゝからず、一刃難を排して二世の將來の爲に生活の樹を植ゑる方が在米同胞の取るべき唯一の道です。後見者 八月十三日 中川正又 板橋政吉様
