other social function held in Butte Community without official invitation, or to cause any disturbance or to loiter in or around the place where such function is being held or to refuse to leave the premises if requested to do so by any member of the Internal Security force or any member of the appointed staff or any resident of the Community in charge of such function.

e. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to use vile, obscene, profane or blastho mous language in any public place or at any public gathering.

f. It shall be unlawful for any male juvenile to annoy, molest or in any manner assault any female juvenile.

g. It shall he unlawful for any juvenile to be absent from his blook and from his home over-night without the express permission of his parent or parents.

h. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to enter upon, possess or in any manner use any mechanical equipment owned by the government of the United States without the express permission of the official responsible therefor.

i. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to create any unnecessary noise or disturbance or to annoy or molest any person attending any moving picture show, play, dance or other public ex-

hibition in the Community.

It shall be unlewful for an

j. It shall be unlawful for any juvenile to loiter after the hour of 8:00 p.m. in blocks 57, 58, or 69 or in the area containing government buildings, shops, warehouses, and storage yards to the north of said blocks and it shall also be unlawful for any juvenile to loiter after the hour of 8:00 p.m. in blocks 41, 42, or 43 or in or near school buildings to the north of block 43 except for the purpose of attending a regular class or function in an orderly manner.

k. It shall be unlawful for any male juvenile to wear clothing of the type known as "zoot suit" or to wear his hair in the style known as "duck

tail" or "zoot suit."

8. Effective Date. This Code is declared to be an Emergency Law under Section 7 of the Constitution and the Community Clerk shall furnish copies of this Code to each Block Manager and cause the same to be posted in a conspicuous place within each block immediately and shall cause this Code to be published in full in the next edition of The NEWS-COURIER and this Code is declared to be in effect on and after September 1, 1944.

This Act duly passed this 28th day of August, 1944 by three-fourths vote of the total membership of Butte Community Council and approved in the manner provided by law.


