ON WEST COAST RETURN
Gov. Fred Houser of California, candidate for United States Senator, "has been informed" that decision has been made to permit Japanese to resettle in California, and seems to be quite excited about it.

Spoaking to residents of Modoc County, Houser charged the New Deal with plans to permit the return of evacuees. Said he:

"...Decision has been made to permit Japanese to resettle in this State regardless of the fact that California is still in the war zone and regardless of

objections people here have to such a move,

"You in Modoc County know better than most Californians the character of these people with whom we are at war and how little they can be trusted, yet the administration is ready to turn the Japs loose in ou r communities as soon as the November election is over."

No doubt Mr .. Houser has heard about the 100th and 442nd combat units composed of Japanese American soldiers. When the Army announcement came to reinstitute solective service for Japanese Americans, Mr. Houser should have yelled his head off warning Californians about "the character of these people" who were about to don U.S. uniforms. Now that the Nisei are fighting in Italy Mr. Houser ought to warn his fellow citizens that Nisci soldiers shouldn't be allowed in the war zones--if Japanese Americans are considered dangerous on the West Coast, then surely they should not be allowed on the front lines in Italy and the South Pacific.

But no, Mr. Houser is the type that keeps quiet when he so feels. He was content to live peacefully in . California while Nisci were dying in Italy so that war wouldn't come to California and to the 47 other states. He was content to let the Nisei exchange their lives for the Purple Hearts, Distinguished Ser-

vice Crosses, and the Medals of Honor.

But now that the brothers, sisters, children, and parents of these Nisei soldiers might be allowed the freedom that is long overdue them, Mr. Houser decides it's about time he break his silence and expose the

"character of these people."

In so doing he certainly reveals his own character -one that is marked by prejudice and lives on distortion of facts. And as to the character of Japane se Americans, the Purple Hearts and citations earned by Nisei on the battlefronts speak for thomselves.

# BUTTE CODE PROVIDES FOR IUVENILE BOARD OF THREE

The Juvenile Code of Butte Community, in addition to the offenses published in the provious issue, provides for a juvenile board as follows:

Juvonile Board. A Juvonile Board is hereby established to consist of three members to be appointod by the Community Council to serve for a period of one year. In the event that any vacancies occur in the Juvenile Board the Community Council shall fill such vacancies within a poriod of two weeks.

2. Jurisdiction of Juvenile Board. The Javenile Board shall hear and determine all cases of juvenile delinquency and all offenses committed by juveniles which may be referred to it by the Judicial Commission. When and after any case has been referred to the Juvenile Board by the Judicial Commission the same constitutional rules and procedures applicable to the Judicial Commission shall govern the procedures of the Juvenile Board.
