New Plan Gets Net Workers Increased Income

An opportunity to earn a net income of \$30 a month and more was extended to net workers through a drastic modification of the Plan III wage system by the combined Community Councils of Butte and Canal, Tuesday afternoon.

REVISED PLAN 3

The modification gives to the net hand a base pay of \$16 plus a bonus of \$10 for an average of a 1,000 square feet per day per month, plus 48¢ per hundred square feet above the 1,000, plus his share of the residual fund. The 48¢ per hundred square feet is what the contractor is paying for piece work; thus a net amount

above the 1,000 a day average will all go into the worker's pocket.

The residual fund will come out of that part of net worker's pay which comes below the 1,000 square feet figure. The fund, it is estimated, will mean an additional approximate \$8 income to each of an estimated 7,000 workers. If 963 workers work at the plant and produce at least 1,000 square feet per day average over a 23 work day month.

CAN EARN \$90

The net worker for an average of 100 square feet a day over the 1,000 can earn \$11.04 over a 23 day month, and the same amount

for each additional 100. Thus a worker weaving 1,500 square feet average will earn, assuming 963 workers, \$16 plus \$10 plus \$55.20 plus \$8 for a total of \$89.20. These figures are all approximate.

ONE PER FAMILY

Project director Leroy Bennett points out that there are about 120 workers at the plant now and that the residual fund share per person will be approximately a dollar each. He said that if the community supplied the 963 workers, the share will be increased by 8 times.

Application for work is limited to one person per family for two weeks.

We can still count our blessings one by one. Christmas is a season of joy for all of us, but particularly for the little children enough to have implicit faith in Santa Claus. And what a heart warming joy it is to us to know that in spite of war and the severe, drastic change it has brought in our lives--all of which our children cannot understand--this faith in Santa Claus will not be crushed. Through the noble efforts of the national JACL, Christian organizations and individuals in many parts of the nation have generously contributed gifts so that not a single child in a relocation center will be without a gift, come Christmas morning.

WHO are no longer children have also received a wonderful gift this Christmas--a gift for which we have long hungered, and that is the knowledge that we have many friends throughout the nation who are sympathetic towards us and care for our welfare. The nobleness of these, our new friends, is made the greater by the knowledge that many of them have never seen us. Not only will each child receive a gift, but under the leadership of the CAS and the block managers, the residents of each block in this center are whole-heartedly sponsoring a Christmas party for the children with Christmas trees and what trimmings can be obtained. No, Christmas will not go unobserved here. In the faith and joy of our children on that day will be much of our hopes for the years to come.

HEAVY FARM SHIPMENT BOUND FOR CENTERS

Four hundred crates of lettuce and two hundred crates of green onion on two semi-trailers driven by Assistant Farm Superintendents, Carl Gast and R. Sanderson, left here Tuesday morning for the Parker Dam Relocation Center at Poston, Arizona. These commodities are the first to be sent out from the Gila farms on trucks and were to be available to the residents by Christmas.

However, the exporting of the Gila farm produce to the other relocation centers will be curtailed drastically from the first of the year because of the recent federal order curbing the carload shipping of vegetables with less food value such as lettuce, spinach, broccoli, and melon. This order was released to make more freight cars available for the shipment of vital defense material.

In addition, there should be submitted to the United States Attorney in charge of the case, substantial factual information in the form of letter or affidavits from persons well-acquainted with the internee, relating to his character, past activities, and loyalty to this country.

The rehearing may be granted at the discretion of the United States Attorney in charge of his case after examination of the submitted material. He will notify the applicant of any decision.

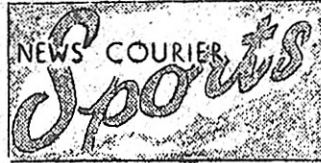
