ARMY

Munition Work Open To Nisei

Americans of Japanese ancestry will help to produce munitions at military ordnance depots, with their first employment to take place in the Army Ordnance Department at Tooele, Utah, and Sioux, Nebraska, the War Department announced yesterday.

Only those of unquestioned background and loyalty will be chosen for employment.

If the employment of evacuees proves successful at Tooele and Sioux it is expected that more of them will be recruited for similar work at other military depots. Selection of the first two installations was based on an extensive field survey of ordnance depots, including a study of the jobs most suitable to evacuee skills and an analysis of the communities involved.

Local merchants, civic officials, church leaders, and labor unions in the Tooele and Sioux communities have signified their willingness to accept Japanese American workers and their families into their communities. Adequate facilities are available in both localities.

OPPORTUNITY FOR NISEI SAYS MYER

"The action of the War Department in making employment available in ordnance depots to Americans of Japanese ancestry opens the way for citizens at relocation centers to make an important contribution to the production of weapons for victory," stated Director Dillon Myer. "The communities of Tooele, Utah, and Sioux, Nebraska, the location of the first two military depots to initiate employment of Nisei have stated their readiness to accept

HE PULLS TEETH BY FLASHLIGHT

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Graduate of a six-year dental course at the University of California, Captain George Takahashi of 118 North Humboldt Avenue San Mateo, California, now fixes teeth by flashlight in an old wine-cellar near the Fifth Army front lines in Italy.

Captain Takahashi is regimental dentist of the 442nd Japanese American combat team which has fought with the 34th "Red Bull" Division.

"It's quite different from my sunny office in San Mateo," says Captain Takahashi, "but actually we can do just about everything for the men here we could do at home - right here in range of Kraut artillery."

His present cellar "office" is in an abandoned house in a mountain draw, only 100 yards from a Japanese American artillery outfit. Sometimes he must halt delicate work temporarily as a roaring battery of 106s shakes the foundations of the building.

However, Captain Takahashi's portable dental chest includes every glittering instrument found in a dentist's office at home, neatly laid out on the inevitable snow white towel, spread over the head of a wine cask.

The man who neatly lays the instruments out is Corporal Abraham Tokioka of Honolulu, the captain's assistant. He also helps mix cements, pedals the foot drill and, when they set up in old wine cellars, hold the flashlight.

Corporal Tokioka trained as a dental assistant at the Army's O'Reilly General Hospital in Springfield, Missouri. He had previously taken pre-dental courses at the University of Hawaii, and worked in a dentist's office in the Islands.

When Captain Takahashi and Corporal Tokioka have no dental appointments, they report to front line aid stations to assist in receiving and caring for the wounded.

COAST RETURN TEST CASE

The scene of the injunction suit which is intended as a test case for the right of the Nisei citizens to return to the evacuated area of the Pacific Coast will be Los Angeles, Calif., where the federal court is expected to hear witnesses, the JACL reports from Salt Lake City.

Major General Charles H. Bonesteel is expected to be one of the chief witnesses under an order to show cause why Dr. George A. Ochikubo of the Topaz Relocation Center should not be permitted to return to the coast.

HEARING IN L.A.

Dr. George Ochikubo left Salt Lake City for Los Angeles Friday morning, accompanied by Attorney Saburo Kido, national JACL president, who is serving as one of the counsellors for Ochikubo. The two were given special permits by the Western Defense Command to go to Los Angeles without escorts and are expected to remain in Pasadena with friends until the court hearing is over.

The developments of the case are being watched closely by all interested parties since it will set the precedent for others who have had no military connections or cases of mixed marriages. The granting of permits to Mrs. Shizuko Shiramizu of Poston, Arizona, formerly of Salinas, California, and Masaru Baba who has an honorable discharge from the army and now residing at Reno, Nevada, has indicated that the army is relaxing the restrictions as far as those with honorable discharges and families of men in the armed services are concerned.

WILL ARMY SIDE STEP?

Dr. Ochikubo's case undoubtedly will reveal the extent to which the army is willing to relax its exclusion orders at this time and will show the procedure the army intends to adopt in handling these civilian applications for permit to return to the evacuated area, stated the national headquarters of the Japanese American Citizens League. JACL officers expressed the hope that Dr. Ochikubo's case will be tried in court so that it will not be handled on an individual basis. Otherwise, other cases will have to be filed to test the right of the Nisei in general. Indications are that the Western Defense Command may set up a procedure whereby the permit will be granted on an individual basis and thus eliminate the necessity of a test case.

STUDENTS

CENTER VISITS PERMITTED

A recent revision of the WRA manual regulations on Japanese Americans who are visiting the centers provides that, in the future, students who have returned to their families during official vacation periods (when they have not graduated and intend to go back to school), will not be charged for either meals or quarters, the information digest published on August 15 points out.

In the past a charge of 20 cents per meal and 20

cents per night for occupancy of living quarters (other than the quarters of the students's family, friends or relative) was made. Evacuees out on student relocation, however, had pointed out that such charges made to them during their return to the center constituted an undue hardship in view of the fact that they were not wage earners. The above revision was made, therefore, in recognition of their particular problem.

BUTTE BLOCK MANAGERS GIVE MEETING RESULTS

Toshio Kinoshita, formerly central block manager, submitted his resignation at the Butte Block Managers meeting last week, since he is relocating.

A new block manager from block 34, Hidetaka Muraoka was introduced.

Three men from Utah, who are here to recruit workers for the Tooele Ordnance Army Depot near Salt Lake City, were introduced. Major C. E. Davies stated that the work is not heavy labor but able bodied men are needed. Lt. Col. Frank E. Meek stated there is no danger in the work as the fuses and detonators are put in at the port of embarkation. He also stated that the project is a self sufficient community.

Other announcements made at the meeting are as follows:

Any block manager who resigns does not have to move out of his apartment, which is generally 1-C.

The Council should explain more thoroughly to the people about the disposition of the camouflage fund.

The Co-op will discontinue taking orders for bottled soft drinks and other beverages for personal or party use, it was decided at a meeting of store managers and supervisors held Tuesday.

The reasons given for this decision are as follows:

1. Shortage of buyers.
2. Because of the scarcity of the above items in Phoenix and in other towns, buyers are visiting many stores before finding even one case of drinks. Very often too much time is spent in order to fill the order. Consequently buyers would not have sufficient time for other necessary buying.

STUDENT INTERVIEWER

June Suzuki, student representative from the National Student Relocation office for Japanese Americans in Philadelphia, arrived on the project yesterday.

She arrived as a part of the relocation movement. Miss Suzuki will interview graduates in both camps, who have not

yet relocated. She will also begin interviews on the potential mid-winter and summer graduates.

Formerly a resident of 32-8-C, Miss Suzuki, prior to the evacuation, was a student of UCLA.

Recently, she was working in the laboratory at Scranton-Keystone, Pa.

During her stay there, she was president of her dormitory, feature editor on the school paper, and a member of the Sigma Ma Elpha, honorary medical society.

She has also spoken to many groups in near-by towns.

Miss Suzuki will study for her junior and senior years at Pembroke College in Providence, R. I.

She will speak for the first time Sunday at the joint meeting of some of the Butte organizations.

Tooele To Be Investigated

Suichi Takeda and Karl Iwanaga, from Butte and Canal respectively, left yesterday to investigate conditions at the Tooele Army Ordnance Depot near Salt Lake City, Utah, where evacuated labor is being sought to produce munitions.

Three openings are available at Florence Prisoner of War Camp for girls to serve as stenographers and secretaries to Army Officers administering the camp. Starting salary is \$146 a month for a 48 hour week. Housing will be provided in camp at the hospital for \$15 a month for single rooms, \$8 per month each if two girls room together. Meals are served for about 25¢ per meal. No housing is available for workers' families. Accepted applicants will be given indefinite Civil Service appointments. JACL SEEKS REOPENING OF CALIFORNIA OFFICE

REFUGEE CENTER

Nineteen nationalities are represented in the 982 European refugees who have arrived at the refugee center in Oswego on Lake Ontario, according to a WRA information digest.

Among the nationalities represented in the group, the largest number, 363 are from Yugoslavia with 228 from Austria, 158 from Poland, 93 from Germany, 42 from Czechoslovakia, and smaller groups from 14 other countries.

A large percentage of the refugees speak German, and at a rough estimate one-quarter to one-third of the group speak a fair amount of English. Many have relatives in this country. Ages range from three weeks to 80 years.

National JACL headquarters at Salt Lake City announced that it has filed its application for permit to reopen its offices in San Francisco, California, where it was functioning prior to the evacuation of all persons of Japanese parentage from the Pacific Coast.

In its application, the JACL wrote to Major General Bonesteel that in view of the lifting of the various civilian restrictions by the Western Defense Command, it felt it should be permitted to reopen its offices in order to render service for those desiring to return to the Coast.

The person designated by the JACL as its representative to return to San Francisco in the event that the permit would be granted was Miss Teiko Ishida, the acting national secretary, who has been managing the Eastern office in New York City.

ACLU FIGHTS FOR MINORITIES

A total of \$1640.74 was spent on Japanese American evacuation cases during the past year by the American Civil Liberties Union, according to a report published this June.

First place in the past year's work of the Union is given to the struggle for civil liberties for racial minorities. The Union's efforts to aid in the cause of Japanese Americans, as well as other groups, in every way within its sphere—from favorable publicity to representation in the courts—are fully reported.

BALLOT

CALIF. PROPOSAL LACKS SUPPORT

A California measure, intended to make it economically impossible for persons of Japanese descent to earn a living in that state after the war, failed to get on the November ballot because of insufficient signatures to petitions, the S.F. Chronicle reported Monday.

Petitions filed bore 77,875 names—100,000 short of the number required to insure a vote on the measure this year.

The present alien land law, passed in 1920 and amended since, prohibits any alien who is ineligible to U.S. citizenship (therefore including Japanese aliens) from owning any land in California and from leasing agricultural land. It permits the aliens, however, to lease, commercial, industrial, and residential properties.

The proposal initiative measure would have extended the present law to prevent any Japanese alien from owning or leasing any kind of property in California.

Under the proposed measure, offshore fishing by the Japanese also would have been forbidden.

REORGANIZATION OF COMMUNITY COUNCIL

A streamlined plan for the reorganization of the Canal Community Council, proposed by Chairman Ben Fukuzawa, was unanimously approved by the council at Tuesday's meeting.

The plan discontinues the formation of the numerous committees and commissions of minor importance and establishes three

definite sections under which various divisions will function.

The three sections, administration, operation, and welfare, will be headed by Takato Hamai, Masuzo Sano, and Mitsuzo Daito, respectively. Since each council member is under one of the sections, he has a definite job to pursue. Every member has been placed in the division to which he is best qualified, so the best service for the good of the community can be obtained.

Besides forming a more efficient manner of handling committee matters, the new plan provides for five advisors to the chairman. Three of the advisors are not council members. This will enable the chairman to get the viewpoint of those not directly connected with the council.

PAPER DRIVE

The Canal Girl Scouts will make a house-to-house campaign in the present paper drive, so it will not be necessary to place the newspapers and magazines on the curbsteps.

A truck will pick up the bundles at the block manager's office on the 23rd.

SILLS CHOSEN DRAFT ADVISER

Mr. John S. Sills, formerly with the WRA office in Cleveland as assistant relocation adviser arrived on the project yesterday with his wife and 2 girls.

He will assume duties dealing with Selective Service matters.

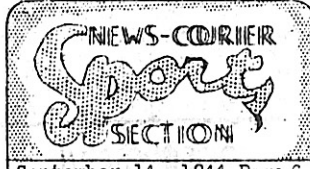
CONTINUE, D'AGE CHANGED
