# SGT. TOGIOKA WINS SILVER STAR FOR GALLANTRY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--While convalescing recently in an army base hospital in Italy, Sergeant Noboru Togicka, formerly of Dinuba, California, was presented the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

As wire chief for a battalion headquarters company of the 442nd Japanese American Regimental Combat Team then attached to the. 34th "Red Bull" Divi-Togicka kept comsion, munication lines between the battalion and regimental headquarters ope n during a heavy concentration of fire. The action took place on the Fifth Army front .

The 442nd Regiment is composed entirely of Americans of Japanese descent.

CITATION

Togicka's citation

reads, in part:

"During poriodic mortar and artillory shollings that a battalion command post was subjected to for six hours, tolophone lines connecting the battalien the regimental CP and the front lines were knocked out. Learning of the situation and its soriousnoss, 'Togioka, on his own initiativo, took his ropair kit and made his way along the telephone lines barragos. When two of his mon offered to accompany him he refused their offer. Tracing the lines in full view of the enemy, he located the damaged and ropaired it.

AWARE OF DANGER
Fully awaro of the danger
he centinued to patrol the
lines for more than an
heur, making repairs as
the lines were blown apart
by shells. It was during
one of the heaviest shellings and while repairing
a line that Togicka was
wounded seriously by shrapnel. Togicka's determination and undaunted bravery
at the risk of his life
are a credit to himsel f
and his organization.

We've been hearing reports that the Nisoi have been gathering in large groups, on street corners and public places, conducting themselves in a "rowdy" manner, causing the people to doubt them. We also heard that certain groups are having "gang" fights in public places, forcing the manager to put out, "No Japs Al-lowed", signs, How do you suppose your oun brothers or sweethearts feel, who have died and are dying in the battlefields? How do you suppose all of us feel, whon we hear such disgusting reports? Need we answer that? Do you want your brothers who are fortunate to roturn, come back to a country whore they aren't wanted, just because of a few rowdies? You are letting down torribly, if such things continue. You have an important job to do and that's to koop a country to live in and for us to roturn to. We are doing our bost here; won't you do your part? I know many of you are doing your best, but you must try harder to suppress such conduct that would create had feelings. give crodit to those who had courage to relocate and have made friends with Caucasians, proving to thom that you are also good Americans. Reading the papers, I'm inclined to think that the women are doing a more successful job than the mon. We salute you, ladies.

## LATE S/SERGEARIT FOUGHT HEROICALLY IN

The late Staff Sorgeant Kazuo Masuda, for whom Rivers gavo a memorial sorvice was Friday, was a "One - man mortar squad" near Castellina, Italy, according to a War Departmont roleaso.

IN "RED BULL" DIVISION SYSET. Masuda, squatt-

ing in no-man's land under heavy enomy fire, plunked the tube of his 60-mm. mortar in a holmot filled with dirt and singlehandedly broke up a Gorman strongpoint.

. Kazuo fought with the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team. then serving with the 34th "Rod Bull" Division on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

The regiment, made up of Americans of Japanese ancestry, was storming tho enomy's main line of resistance near the Italian villago of Castollina. Tho Germans, well entrenched on the hill, were pouring

steady artillery, machinegun and mortar fire down on the advancing Americans

Masuda's six-man mortar squad went into a huddle. Thoir job was to silence the enemy guns. Out of that group, omorgea figure, loaded down lone with bulging ammunition pouches slung in front and on his back, carrying a mortar tube under his right arm and an extra stool helmet in his left hand. The amazed Gormans, suspecting some kind of Yankoe trick, uncorked a torrific barra 30 of selfpropolled guns and mortars. FOUGHT SINGLEHANDED

sidestepping like a col logo halfback, Masuda dasied 25 yards up the slope. Hastily filling his oxtra helmet with dirt, he buried the mortar barrel in it. Squatted beside this improvised caplacement, he wrapped his logs around
