## SGT. TOGIOKA WINS SILVER STAR FOR GALLANTRY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--While convalescing recently in an army base hospital in Italy, Sergeant Noboru Togioka, formerly of Dinuba, California, was presented the Silver Star for gallantry in action.

As wire chief for a battalion headquarters company of the 442nd Japanese American Regimental Combat Team then attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Division, Togioka kept communication lines between the battalion and regimental headquarters open during a heavy concentration of fire. The action took place on the Fifth Army front.

The 442nd Regiment is composed entirely of Americans of Japanese descent.

### CITATION

Togioka's citation reads, in part:

"During periodic mortar and artillery shollings that a battalion command post was subjected to for six hours, telephone lines connecting the battalion CP, the regimental CP and the frontlines were knocked out. Learning of the situation and its seriousness, Togioka, on his own initiative, took his repair kit and made his way along the telephone lines in the midst of terrific barrages. When two of his men offered to accompany him he refused their offer. Tracing the lines in full view of the enemy, he located the damaged line and repaired it.

### AWARE OF DANGER

Fully aware of the danger he continued to patrol the lines for more than an hour, making repairs as the lines were blown apart by shells. It was during one of the heaviest shollings and while repairing a line that Togioka was wounded seriously by shrapnel. Togioka's determination and undaunted bravery at the risk of his life are a credit to himself and his organization.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Kango Togioka, now of Poston Relocation Center.

## A SOLDIER'S APPEAL

To the editor:

I'm very poor in grammar and never was good at putting things on paper. I have a few remarks I'd like to have the Nisei hear. It's on some of the soldier's minds, here in Italy.

I noticed you have been publishing the casualties that this combat team has suffered. I know it must not be encouraging to the folks and friends. Now that the Allies are doing such a good job--Don't let yourself think for a minute, that it is going to be easy going, from now on. There are going to be a lot of fierce battles, and to win, the price will be many human lives. Bloodshed is inevitable.

### WE DO OUR BEST

We've been hearing reports that the Nisei have been gathering in large groups, on street corners and public places, conducting themselves in a "rowdy" manner, causing the people to doubt them. We also heard that certain groups are having "gang" fights in public places, forcing the manager to put out, "No Japs Allowed", signs. How do you suppose your own brothers or sweethearts feel, who have died and are dying in the battlefields? How do you suppose all of us feel, when we hear such disgusting reports? Need we answer that? Do you want your brothers who are fortunate to return, come back to a country where they aren't wanted, just because of a few rowdies? You are letting us down terribly, if such things continue. You have an important job to do and that's to keep a country to live in and for us to return to. We are doing our best here; won't you do your part? I know many of you are doing your best, but you must try harder to suppress such conduct that would create bad feelings. I give credit to those who had courage to relocate and have made friends with Caucasians, proving to them that you are also good Americans. Reading the papers, I'm inclined to think that the women are doing a more successful job than the men. We salute you, ladies.

### HOW ABOUT A HAND

What are the men fighting and giving their lives for? For each and everyone of you, yes, you. We all volunteered not for "glory," (there isn't any glory in war, it's inhuman and cruel), but to help make a place for all of you in America and to do our share for our country. We ask for no special credit, since it was our duty. Other Americans have been giving their lives; why shouldn't we?

Are we asking too much to you all to keep the "Wol-come Mat" for us, as we march down the "gang plank"? How about it fellows, we all know you're OK. How about a hand?

## REPLACEMENTS MADE IN FARM MANAGEMENT DEPT.

Two replacements and an addition to the farm section's appointed staff personnel have received Washington approval, announced Robert Davidson, farm chief.

Arthur C. Worm, who has been Tempe district manager for the Hilvert Produce Co., will replace Carl Quast as farm superintendent. Don Steward will be reclassified as assistant to the livestock superintendent to fill the posi-

tion left by Walter Enrick.

C. A. Lasator, former branding inspector for this district in Arizona, will be the new foreman of livestock to look after beef cattle.

Farm chief Davidson stated that 523 feeder pigs for the hog farm and about 500 feeders for beef cattle are being purchased.

At a unit foreman meeting Monday Tex Tagawa was appointed packing house foreman. George Takemoto, dairy foreman, is relocating to Nebraska. He will be succeeded by Sonzaburo Ishimoto, foreman of milkers, and Tom Hirano, who is newly assigned. Henry Sato was named to replace Harry Mayamoto as foreman of the hog farm.

The following field changes were announced by Davidson:

Kubo, who was in charge of the packing shed and records, is now office manager for the farm section.

## LATE S/SERGEANT FOUGHT HEROICALLY IN ITALY

The late Staff Sergeant Kazuo Masuda, for whom Rivers gave a memorial service was Friday, was a "One-man mortar squad" near Castellina, Italy, according to a War Department release.

### IN "RED BULL" DIVISION

S/Sgt. Masuda, squatted in no-man's land under heavy enemy fire, plunked the tube of his 60-mm. mortar in a helmet filled with dirt and singlehandedly broke up a German strongpoint.

Kazuo fought with the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team, then serving with the 34th "Red Bull" Division on the Fifth Army front in Italy.

The regiment, made up of Americans of Japanese ancestry, was storming the enemy's main line of resistance near the Italian village of Castellina. The Germans, well entrenched on the hill, were pouring

steady artillery, machine-gun and mortar fire down on the advancing Americans.

Masuda's six-man mortar squad went into a huddle. Their job was to silence the enemy guns. Out of that group, emerged a lone figure, loaded down with bulging ammunition pouches slung in front and on his back, carrying a mortar tube under his right arm and an extra steel helmet in his left hand. The amazed Germans, suspecting some kind of Yankee trick, uncorked a terrific barrage of self-propelled guns and mortars.

### FOUGHT SINGLEHANDED

Alternately running and sidestepping like a college halfback, Masuda dashed 25 yards up the slope. Hastily filling his extra helmet with dirt, he buried the mortar barrel in it. Squatted beside this improvised emplacement, he wrapped his legs around

**JACL****PACIFIC CITIZEN PLANS SPECIAL CHRISTMAS EDITION**

The Pacific Citizen, the official organ of the Japanese American Citizens League, which had been winning a national reputation for its editorial policy and well balanced news coverage of the Japanese in the United States, is once again planning to issue a special Christmas edition as last year.

The publication is counting on the JACL members and its subscribers to put in their names and addresses and thereby make this special edition a directory of the resettled evacuees of the Pacific Coast.

The income from the Christmas edition is needed by the publication to cover the deficit with which it is confronted. Last year there was a deficit of \$3000 which had to be met. The National JACL treasury was drained to keep the publication going. Without the income from the special Christmas edition of last year, the Pacific Citizen may have been discontinued during the early part of this year.

Notices of appeal are being sent to all the JACL members and the Pacific Citizen readers for a special effort to be made in soliciting names of people who desire to help the publication to become financially solvent.

**CLINTON NISEI LAUDED**

Eleven Japanese Americans working in a war plant from 16 to 21 hours a day in Clinton, Iowa, were praised recently by the Manpower Commission for their furtherance of American's war effort, according to the Clinton Herald of August 29.

**IDAHO NISEI EVADE DRAFT**

Three Nisei from Minidoka Relocation Center, Idaho, were convicted for selective service violation on Monday at federal court, according to an A.P. report.

Those convicted were K. Sakaguchi, 24 years old; Sumio Sakaguchi, 20, both of Seattle and Teitoku Kajimura, 21 of Cle Elum, Wash.

Eighteen of 35 Japanese Americans indicted on draft evasion charges remain to be tried.

(continued from page 3) the tube. Without sight or bipod, he calculated the deflection and elevation and began firing on the enemy. Though Nazi fire peppered the ground around him, he kept on firing his mortar until his ammunition ran out.

Then, quite unconcerned about German marksmanship, he retraced his steps down the slope and returned with two cases of ammunition. He began pouring shells into the enemy positions again. This was too much for the Germans. They retreated to another position in confusion.

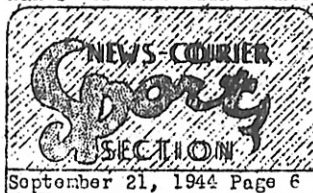
