PYT. OKITSU BRAYES NAZI FIRE TO SAVE BUDD!!ES

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Frivate Jou Okitsu, who fights with the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Toam on the Fifth Army front in Italy, recently made his way more than a half mile through heavy artillery, machinegun and sniper fire to get aid for 15 wounded buddies.

Okitsu, formerly of Los Angeles, California, is a messenger in a rifle compay. His parents and sister reside in Poston. ENEMY SHELLS

In the vicinity of Suvereto, Italy, the enemy occupied a high hill commanding the flat ground over which the Japanese Americans were advancing. German heavy artillery, mortar, and small arm's fire sprayed them continously.

In the initial barrage, 15 men of the supporting company were injured. Three casualties managed to work their way to Cd-tsu's company under the covering fire of the forward company. He aided the wounded men in finding cover and making them comfortable as possible.

Contact with their battalion headquarters as well as the nearest aid station was lost when onemy shells cut the communication lines between the front lines and the rear.

REACHES AID

On loarning of the predicament, Okitsu undertook to summon the necessary aid. He refused the offer of others to go with him.

Three thousand feet of exposed flat ground, all under observation of the enemy and subject to his constant artillery pounding, lay before him . During the entire course of . his trip, Okitsu was subjected the machine gun and sniper fire, intermingled with artillery and mortar fire. At length, by creeping, crawling, and run ning--halted several times b y artillery and mortar barrages which fell perilously close to him -- Okitsu finally managed to find the aid station.

NURSES AIDE PROBLEM

This week it appeared likely that the year-low nurses aide shortage problem is on its way to solution through the efforts of the community council and the cooperation of relatives of some of the hospital patients.

Deginning next Monday morning relatives of the patients in the D and E wards of the hospital will start working with pay in those wards, thereby releasing the regular aides to fill up some of the shortages in the other wards, confining their work to wards exclusive of D and E.

The nurses aide problem stems from the reluctance of workers to serve in those particular wards, but now that the relatives are taking over duties there, the biggest obstacle to the assigning of aides is eliminated.

It will take continued interest by residents and in some cases personal sacrifices in order to keep the hospital functioning at capacity or even near capacity. It has been brought to our attention that among those who have sacrificed for the benefit of the community is Miss Inouye, licensed nurse, who turned down a civil service position in order to continue serving Rivers when the hospital shortage was in its critical stage.

Even new, with the problem much relieved, the hospital needs more nurses aides, and we hope that the need will be answered. And with workers constantly relocating and leaving, there will be need for new aides to take up the nurses aide courses being offered at the hospital to fill in where vacancies arise. True, other sections may suffer from the drainage of workers to the hospital, individuals may affer because of personal sacrifices, but this is the price we must pay for centinued good health.
