Shibuya Named President Of Gila Co-op

Kinbaichi Shibuya of block 6 4 was elected president of the Gila River Co-op at a special meeting of the Board of Directors held Saturday, September 23. He succeeds Harry Kono, past president, who is relocating this Thursday.

Other officers elected are as follows:

Vice president-Teizo Yahanda of block 3, treasurer - Shobei Sasaki of block 20, and secretary-Masato W. Kato of block 34. Sasaki and Kato are re-elected to their respective offices.

Results of the semi-annual election held two weeks ago show that following members compose the Board of Directors:

Canal. Section 1-Shobei Sasaki (re-elected), Teizo Yahanda (remaining). Section 2-Shoichi Nakateri (elected), Tsunoyoshi Fujimoto (remaining).

Butte. Section 1-Genji Endo (re-elected), Itsuhoi Takano (remaining). Section 2-Yoriyuki Sato (re-elected), Wataru Kawata (remaining). Section 3-Shinpei Tanaka (elected), Kinbaichi Shibuya (remaining).

Evacuees May Return After Physical Exam

Evacuees who have passed pre-induction physical examination for armed forces and wish to return to the center pending call to duty and do not wish to pay board and room will be reinducted into the center, according to a teletype from E.G. Arnold, acting director of WRA.

If they wish to be visitors, they will be required to pay board and lodging during period of their stay. Those who have been inducted into

FORTY-FIVE NISEI DEATHS REPORTED BY CENTERS

Forty-five American soldiers of Japanese ancestry with parents or other next of kin living in the country's relocation centers have been killed in action, Director Dillon S. Myer of the War

Relocation Authority reported to Secretary of the Interior Harold L. Ickes on September 7.

A WRA compilation of casualty notices received by center families up to August 31 showed a total of 139 War Department telegrams, including 45 killed, 92 wounded and two missing in action, Myer said. The 45 were killed in Italy in such hard fought battles as Cassino, Volturno and Belvedere.

The parents of the men killed have expressed the belief that their sons "died for two causes--for their country and to win acceptance as Americans," Myer said.

Most of the casualties so far have been volunteers, Myer said, explaining that selective service was not applicable to Japanese Americans between June, 1942, and January 1944. He added that since casualty notices go directly to the families at the centers or to evacuee families who have relocated and do not come through WRA channels, it is believed that some casualty notices were missed and that the total number received by evacuees in the centers up to August 31 may be 10 or 20 percent higher than the 139 reported.

ITALY

COMMANDER CITES 100TH INFANTRY

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--High tribute was paid to the fighting soldiers of the Japanese American 100th Infantry Battalion by their battalion commander, Lieutenant Colonel Gordon Singles, a West Point graduate.

"There are countless instances of battlefield heroism by these infantrymen fighting on the Fifth Army front," said the firm, steel-nerved battalion commander. "They have fought their way over endless mountains in Italy since last September. They have captured towns from Germans without assistance of other units. Recently they captured a German command post, complete with a large motor pool and an entire field artillery battery, all intact."

Italians towns recently captured by the 100th Battalion are: Belvedere, Sesseta, Pastina, and Orsiana. Belvedere was taken by a surprise thrust, Sesseta by a flanking attack, Pastina by a frontal attack, and Orsiana bypassed and then completely surrounded.

"These Americans of Japanese ancestry take their hardships in stride," he continued. "Battlefield instructions are carried out quickly. This alertness has made several otherwise impossible gains possible throughout Italy. Their spirit has won my admiration and respect, just as it has all observers who've lived in the field with them."

"We've experienced stiff fighting in Northern Italy," Colonel Singles continued. "But the men display a willingness to fight the enemy, even after being in the line for long periods. One instance that comes to mind is a platoon of the 100th that met a German force three times its size. The Japanese Americans attacked nevertheless, and not only were the Germans beaten back but our prisoner stockade received many more Germans that day."

STUDENT RETURNS WEST

Miss Esther Takei's returning to California and her entry into Pasadena Junior College indicates that permits to return to the Western Defense Command are not confined to cases of "mixed marriages" or to those who go temporarily for business.

Several Nisei who have been trying to bring up test cases which would set a precedent for other evacuees have been given individual permits and their suits artfully dismissed so that actually the suits were not tried in court; no precedent is set.

POLICY UNCHANGED

Director Dillon Myer has stated: "Insofar we know there has been no change in the policy of the War Department governing return of evacuees to the evacuated area. For sometime now the Western Defense Command has been issuing special permission for individuals to re-enter the area either temporarily or permanently when good reasons for such re-entrance are given. Ordinarily temporary permits have been granted to individuals who have property problems or other personal business which require personal handling and thus necessitate the presence of the evacuees in the evacuated area for a short period. Permits for indefinite residence have been given mainly to 'mixed marriage' cases..."

Although "in the main" indefinite permits are given only to "mixed marriage" cases, the Takoi case seems to indicate that any evacuee who wants to go for a good reason may be permitted.

OTHERS MAY APPLY

We cannot see how the Commanding General can say yes to one person and no another unless there is definite indication that the second would be dangerous to the war effort if he is allowed on the West Coast.

Those desiring to re-enter the western defense area for indefinite residence should apply directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio, San Francisco. Those who want temporary re-entrance will continue to apply through WRA channels.

LETTER

Disturbing to Soldiers

The Chicago Sun of September 10 publishes a letter by a "Joe Fromm" which concerns itself with the primary worries of the American soldier abroad about conditions at home and with evidences of race feeling at home.

In regard to Japanese Americans, Fromm writes as follows:

"Similarly disturbing to overseas soldiers--especially those who are liberal and tolerant--are the growing race hatreds at home. When my outfit moved over to Cassino from the Adriatic in Italy several months ago, I read in American magazines and newspapers, letters condemning all Japanese, regardless of birth, in the most bitter, intolerant and un-American manner. Japanese Americans were the target of the most vile attacks and discrimination. You can imagine my feelings and the feelings of my comrades, then, when we heard that the unit which we were relieving at Cassino was the famous 100th Battalion, consisting exclusively of Japanese Americans. You can well imagine what we thought of this bigoted group in the United States which was seeking to make life unbearable for the parents and families of those men who, we learned, protested their withdrawal from Cassino although they had been decimated by wounds and disease. This battalion of Japanese Americans since has been proclaimed the most decorated unit in the American Army and the battalion with the heaviest casualties."

P. B. E. Accepts Nisei Student

Under existing California school laws the Pasadena Boards of Education has no alternative but to accept Esther Takei, 19-year-old American born Japanese, as a student at Pasadena Junior College, the board ruled in replying to protests over the girl's enrollment there, according to the L. A. Times of Sept. 21.

As a result of the board's action in upholding Miss Takei's rights as an American citizen, a group of 2-Pasadenans protested on the contention that the entire question of the Japanese' return to California should not be settled until returned servicemen has a "say-so."

NISEI CHAPLAIN LEADS RESCUE PARTY IN ITALY

The following news story, which appeared in the Chicago Tribune on September 7, 1944, is quite unusual and may be of general interest. It appeared under the by-line of Clay Cowran, Chicago Tribune Press Service.

WITH U.S. FORCES NEAR FLORENCE, Sept. 1 (Delayed).--Lt. Masao Yamada, a Protestant chaplain with a Japanese American infantry unit, today told how he and 11 enlisted men penetrated German lines west of Florence under a white flag of truce to bring back the bodies of two Japanese Americans killed during a combat patrol.

Yamada, whose home is in Koalakku, Hawaii, said: "A few days ago I heard that three of our men were missing from the preceding night's patrol. Learning where they had gone, I got my men together and we started in jeeps.

"At our front lines we left the jeeps and crawled forward until we saw the German positions in a small wood across an open field. Binding our handkerchiefs together, we fastened them to a stick and waved the improvised flag at the Germans.

"One big German blockaded us forward. We walked (continued on page 5)

CITATION

His citation reads as follows: "The Soldier's Medal is awarded to Master Sgt. Susumu Toyoda for heroism and bravery near Terokina, Bouganville, British Solomon Islands, on June 29, 1944. When a civilian war correspondent became exhausted while swimming in heavy surf, Master Sergeant Toyoda at great risk to his own life with another enlisted man swam out and brought the drowning man to shore against a strong undertow, thereby saving his life."

ed into the field, where we could see at least six machine guns pointing at us. As we reached the edge of the wood the German motioned us to stop. Then he and three others walked out to meet us.

"We sat in a circle and talked. The German spoke in Italian and one of my men acted as interpreter. The Germans were very interested in us. Apparently it was the first time they had seen any Japanese Americans. They wanted to know why we were fighting for America and when we told them we were real Americans they did not seem to understand.

"When we asked about our buddies they explained that the men of our patrol

Staff Sgt. Salvatore Rapisarda, one of Brigadier General Frank B. Merrill's famed Marauders, back in Cleveland from the India-Burma jungles lauded the Nisei soldiers, according to the Cleveland News of Sept. 19.

"I want to stress one thing," said Sergeant Rapisarda. "The American Japanese soldiers with our group saved our necks more than once. Serving as interpreters, they translated the enemy commands and in that way we kept a jump ahead of them. They were as loyal as the rest of us and just as mad at the enemy."

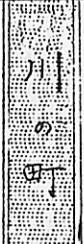
