Most of the casualties so far have been volunteers, Myer said, explaining that selective service was not applicable to Japaneso Americans between June, 1942, and January 1944. He added that since casualty notices go directly to the families at the centers or to evacuee families who have relocatod and do not come through WRA channels, it is belived that some casualty notices were missed and that the total number reocived by evacuees in the centers up to August 3 1 may be 10 or 20 percent higher than the 139 reported.

STUDENT RETURNS WEST

Miss Esther Takei's returning to California and her entry into Pasadena Junior College indicates that permits to return to the Western Defense Command are not confined to cases of "mixed marriages" or to those who go temporarily for business.

Several Nisei who have been trying to bring up test cases which would set a precedent for other evacuees have been given individual permits and their suits artfully dismissed so that actually the suits were not tried in court; no precedent is set.

POLICY UNCHANGED

Director Dillon Myer has stated: "Insofar we know there has been no change in the policy of the War De .partment governing return of evacuees to the evacuated area. For sometime now the Western Defense Command has been issuing special permission for individuals to re-enter the area either temporarily or permanently when good reasons for such re-entrance are given. Ordinarily temporary permits have been granted to in-dividuals who have property problems or other per-sonal business which require personal handling and thus necessitate the presence of the evacuees in the evacuated area for a short period. Permits for indefinite residence have been given mainly to "mixed marriage" cases \dots "

Although "in the main" indofinite permits given only to "mixed marriage" cases, the Takei case seems to indicate that any evacuee who wants to go for a good reason may be permitted.

OTHERS MAY APPLY
We cannot see how the Commanding General can say yes to one person and re enother unless there is definite indication that the second would be dangerous to the wer effort if he is allowed on the West Coast.

Those desiring to re-enter the western defense area for indefinite residence should apply directly to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio, San Francisco. Those who want temperary re-entrance will continue to apply through WRA channels.

NISEI CHAPLAIN LEADS RESCUE PARTY IN ITALY

The following news stry, which appeared in the Chicago Tribune on September 7, 1944, is quite unusual and may be of general interest. It appeared under the by-line of Clay Cowran, Chicago Tribune Press Service.

WITH U.S. FORCES NEAR FLORENCE, Sept. 1 (Delay...ed) .-- Lt. Masao Yemada, a Protestant chaplain with a Japaneso American infantry unit, today told how he and ll enlisted men penetrated German lines west of Florence under a white flag of truce to bring back the bedies of two Japanese Americans killed during a combat patrol.

Yamada, whose home is in Koalakeku, Hawaii, said: "A few days ago I heard that three of our men were missing from the proceding night's patrol. Learning where they had gono, I got my mon together and we started in joeps.

"At our front lines w e left the jeeps and crawled forward until we saw the German positions in a small wood across an open field. Binding our handkerchiefs tegether, we fastened thom to a stick and waved the improvised flag at the Germans.

"One big Gorman bookoned us forward. We walk-(continued on page 5)
