Joseph T. Koseki was elected vice chairman of the Butte Community Council and a member of the Executive Board to replace Motojiro Iwata, who resigned because of relocation, at the regular meeting held Monday afternoon.

The Council acknowledged the resignation of Motojiro Iwata of block 31, Roy A. Satow of block 51, and Toshio Sugano of 61, who are all relocating.

Acting Project Director Ben F. Runyan swore in Masao Nishimura of 29, Kaoru Nagai of 44, Otokichi Kuwahara of 51, and Ginjiro Kawaguchi of 61 as new members of the Council.

Military authorities of the Western Defense Command this week opposed the return of Dr. George Ochikubo, Nisei dentist of Topaz, in an affidavit filed in a Los Angeles Federal court where Ochikubo seeks an injunction to prevent the Army from continuing his exclusion, reports the L.A. Times.

The affidavit stated, "The presence of Dr. George Ochikubo on the Pacific Coast would constitute a potential danger to military security, and military necessity requires the continuance of his exclusion." It was signed by Lt. Col. Harold W. Schweitzer, executive officer of the Civil Affairs Division, Western Defense Command.

Federal Judge Peirson M. Hall continued the injunction hearing one week to permit Defense Atty. A. L. Wirin time to prepare arguments.

"The 232nd Bn., the group where the first bunch from Gila came, is about through with its 17-week cycle and the lucky guys should be on furlough soon, if they haven't already left. About a third of the, boys like Shig Imazumi, Tom Taniguchi, and Nob Arakawa, for instance, left for Fort Snelling in their 14th week, a couple of weeks ago.

"Guys left are like Joe Watanabe, Knox Takasugi and so on. Over in Co. D of the 232nd are boys a couple of weeks ahead of us in their cycle. John Tachihara captured an expert's rating there in rifle shooting.

"Over in Co. B of the 208th are some of the boys who left Gila early in August. Hank Maeyama, Ben Matsui and so on as you may probably know.

"My bud's in Co. C next to us where most of the Ft. Sheridan, Ill., guys are."

FROM A SOLDIER

Dear Editor,

I am writing to you because I am sure that this information will be of great interest to the residents of the Gila River Relocation Center.

Recently, Tech. Sgt. Harry Fukuhara, formerly of the Gila River Relocation Center, was awarded the BRONZE STAR MEDAL for his meritorious duties in various campaigns in the South West Pacific Area. This is especially significant because he is among those who first volunteered for the Army from Gila in November 1942. At that time, the status of the American Japanese soldiers was very questionable--even the Army was very skeptical for the Nisei soldiers were not allowed on the West Coast--the attitude of the whole nation was one of doubt and suspicion--and the pressure against volunteering, brought about especially by the "unhealthy groups" was strong. Despite all these unfavorable conditions and circumstances, he volunteered, because he, like the rest of the volunteers, still

had faith in America, and knew that it was his duty as an American to serve his country in time of crisis.

As Harry Fukuhara related his experiences to us in his modest and unassuming way, I can say that he has gone through "hell and high water." There is no doubt that he has already done his part as a "Yank" fighting for ideals which we all treasure.

At the present, he is still in some jungles--giving his best. To him, and many like him, in the Pacific theater, on the Burma front, in China, on the Italian front, and in the European theater, we all owe deep and sincere thanks---for giving so much and asking for so little in return.

TANAHASHI

UNSELFISH ACT PROVES FATAL TO NISEI SOLDIER

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Second Lieutenant Kei Tanahashi of the Japanese American 442nd Regimental Combat Team died of wounds received in battle on the Fifth Army front in Italy because he insisted that his wounded comrades be treated and evacuated first.

Lieutenant Tanahashi's platoon was attacking Hill 140, near Castellina, Italy, when it was pinned down by intense enemy artillery and small arms fire. The terrain was rough and bushy but there was little cover for the advancing American troops.

Fire from enemy snipers and automatic weapons 400 yards ahead threatened not only the platoon but the entire company. Lieutenant Tanahashi led his platoon forward some 300 yards in order to dislodge the enemy.

In the meantime, another German automatic weapon on their flank caught them by surprise with its deadly firing. Lieutenant Tanahashi, leading his group, was mortally wounded but refused medical attention until every other injured soldier of his platoon was given first aid and evacuated to a place of safety.

Disregarding the serious nature of his wounds, he remained at his post and directed operations against the snipers and automatic weapons until (continued on page 5)

SINCLAIR

PLEADS FOR TOLERANCE

A plea for greater tolerance toward Japanese Americans and for Hawaii's statehood was made last Saturday in Baltimore by Dr. Gregg M. Sinclair, president of the University of Hawaii, according to the A.P. report.

Dr. Sinclair, onetime professor of English at Hakone College in Japan, had warned 18 years ago that "the anti-Japanese immigration law is a deep wound in the side of Japan and cracked the base of friendship."

He states that "definite steps are being taken in Hawaii to find a basis of cooperation for the races of all countries."

Research by the university sociology department had shown that at no

time could Japan or Japanese people have gained political or numerical control over Hawaii and that Japanese population there could never exceed 37 percent of the entire population, he said.

100th Infantry Squads Triumph

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY,

ITALY—Two squads of Japanese Americans of the 100th Infantry Battalion killed 30 Germans, captured 46 others and took large quantities of enemy equipment in an afternoon's fighting on the Fifth Army front in Italy recently.

Enemy material captured by the men, led by First Lieutenant James Boodry, 112 Pine Street, Clinton, Massachusetts, included five machineguns, 38 machine pistols, 13 pistols and several hundred "potato masher" and fragmentation grenades.

Members of the 100th Infantry Battalion include: Sam Minami, Rohwer, program; Rio Kashiwagi, Granada, general arrangements, and Mrs. George Saito, Manzanar, finance. Masao Satow, Granada, a member of the National Council of the YMCA was to be the toastmaster.

UTAH COMMITTEE WORKS FOR FAIR EMPLOYMENT BILL

The Utah Committee for the passage of the Fair Employment Practice Committee bill, which would make this government agency which has been carrying on effective work in breaking down racial discriminations in the employment field a permanent department, held a meeting recently in the chambers of Judge Baker, in the City and County Building of Salt Lake City. Judge Baker was elected the temporary chairman and Saburo Kido, national JACL president, secretary.

The various phases of the bill which passed the House of Representatives and is now before the Senate were discussed. It was moved that a message be sent to all the representatives and senators from the State of Utah and that the committee members were in favor of the passage of the bill. Judge Baker was instructed to send such a message in the name of the committee.

The committee members represent Salt Lake City, Ogden, Provo, and other neighboring districts.

OUSTED FARMERS FIND EMPLOYMENT IN HESTON

The five Issei farmers from the Gila River Relocation Center who were forced to leave a farm at Great Meadows, N.J., last April when neighbors protested their employment, have been employed since then on another farm only 50 miles away in a friendly atmosphere by a farm owner who praises their ability and faithfulness.

The Issei resettlers are Torazo Matsumoto, 58; George Choichi Yamamoto, 42; Katsuji Edward Tani-

guichi, 40; Ted Eikichi Miyamura, 38; and Kazumasa Frank Kitagawa, 37. For five months they have been working on the prosperous farm of Herman S. Heston in Newtown, Bucks County, Pa., which is about 30 miles from Philadelphia. Heston was assisted in arranging for their employment by the WRA relocation office in Philadelphia.

"Within a week after the five men came to work on my farm," Heston said. "I knew I could depend on them. I have found them loyal, hard-working, clean, and pleasant to work with. We like them a lot and have a high regard for them."

Yamamoto's 19-year-old son Ayao also worked on the Heston farm for a month, but recently returned to Gila River on receiving notice of his impending induction into the U.S. Army.

Nurse Corps Accepts Nisei

Mrs. Eiko Kikuchi, surgical nurse at Women's Hospital in Cleveland will become the first Japanese American Army nurse to be accepted from that city according to the Cleveland News of Sept. 20. She will leave for Billings General Hospital on Oct. 1.

She is eager to serve her country the best way she can. With increasing casualties that accompany the American Army's great military gains, she concluded that the Army needed nurses.

She is a graduate of Mercy Hospital School of Nursing in San Diego. Prior to evacuation her home was in El Centro.

he was evacuated.

He died in a field hospital from the loss of blood and the injuries sustained while in action. Had he permitted himself to be treated earlier and had he been evacuated along with the first group, he might have lived, doctors in the field hospital said.

Lieutenant Tanahashi was well known in Los Angeles, California, where he was the scoutmaster and organizer of the famous drum and bugle corps of Troop 379, Boy Scouts of America, which made a national tour and played at the White House in 1935. He was graduated from the University of California at Los Angeles in 1939.

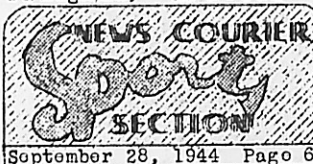

以上の外はWRのとしては館府内に無料居住は許可せぬと。

日系兵士の

戦死傷數

WRの局長マイヤ氏よりイキーン内務長官への報告に依れば転住所内に親又は近親のある者で米軍の爲に戦死した日系兵士は既に四十五名によると。

WRの記録に依れば八月三十一日迄に陸軍省より転住所内の家族へ通知したる死傷數は百三十九件の多きに上つて居るが其の中戦死は四十五件で九十二件は負傷である。是等は伊太利のカシノ、ヴォーグ、ノ、ベ、ルビテル等の激戦で戦死又は負傷したものである。

今日迄の死傷者は主として志願兵ばかりであるがWRの記録にない死傷者もあるの事実の數は是以上である事論を俟たない。
