## SRC RELOCATES FUEL OIL DISTRIBUTION 340 STUDENTS COMMENCE TOMORROW

Student Relocation progress report by the Student Relocation Council of November 1 reveals that 2,166 questionnaires were on file in the Council's office with another 200 students known to be interested in placement in college.

### 500 ACCEPTED

Of the 2,166, more than 200 students have been accepted by some college. For more than 1,300 others, transcripts, letters of reference, and other material have been assembled and analyzed, and the students are ready for placement as colleges and communities are approved, and as sufficient scholarship funds become available. Of the other 300, about half are now being processed and the other half have been placed in a "Postponed" file either at the student's request or because the students is not eligible for relocation at this time.

### IN 24 STATES

Of the 500 who have been accepted at some college, 340 have received travel permits. They are located in 24 different states, the greatest number being in Nebraska, Missouri, Colorado and Ohio.

### A Merry One

Christmas Eve was a very merry one for the populace of Gila including the youngest and the oldest resident. Among the happiest of the 111 colonists on the eve were the patients in the hospital who were given a program under the co-chairmanship of Mrs. Ruby Kiritu and Grace Hagiya. Rev. R. Susu-Mago presided over the program, which consisted of the Christian choir, a prayer by Dr. Douglas, and a Christmas story by Mrs. Douglas.

Fuel, for the heaters already installed in private residences, will be distributed tomorrow in both communities was disclosed by Firman Brown, deputy director. He also revealed the arrival of 1,000 additional heaters.

Two tank trucks—one for each community—will be responsible in distributing the fuel. The Mess Division will furnish one gallon cans for the colonists in which they will receive their oil from the trucks which will stop at convenient locations of each block. These tank distributions will continue until the complete equipment of the storage tanks with pumps.

### FOR NET WORK

Approximately 100 camouflage net factory weavers averaged 1,216 feet of garnished net on Thursday. Three crews attained 1,584 square feet per person.

It is stated that he expected a great influx of workers once the new plan of pay which eliminates the contribution to the community fund for a 11 work in excess of 1,000 square feet was understood by the people.

### SHOE REPAIR SHOP

The Canal shoe repair shop will remain closed until January 4, revealed Al Hayashi, manager. Shoes brought in during November will be repaired during this time and those brought in since December 16 will be repaired after New Years.

### LIBERAL MOCHI SUPPLY ORDERED

Instead of the anticipated 2 lbs. of mochi gone, only 1½ lbs. per person will be available for New Years. According to T. H. Yamada, senior steward, the remaining 120 hundred pound sacks are enroute from Los Angeles to Casa Grande and may not arrive in time for the holiday.

### WIRE FENCES MARK BOUNDS

Wire fences are being put up by the United States Engineering Dept. as lines of demarcation to indicate the bounds of the communities at Butte and Canal from sunrise to sundown.

According to Firman Brown, deputy director, plans call for fences running parallel to the north edge of Canal 30 feet away from the barracks; then parallel to the west edge 39 feet away from the barracks; then parallel to the south side 500 feet away from the nearest barracks; and finally parallel to the east edge 400 feet away from the nearest barracks.

For Butte the south and east fences will be 165 feet from the nearest barracks.

# NISEI CITIZENSHIP RIGHTS TO BE DEFENDED BY JACL

In defense of the citizenship rights of Americans of Japanese ancestry, the Japanese American Citizens League is entering the test case brought by the Native Sons of the Golden West in the United States District Court of Appeals in San Francisco which aims at cancelling the citizenship of all nisei Americans, reports the Pacific Citizen, journal of the JACL.

"The announcement that the JACL will actively participate in the Native Sons case marks a new policy for the organization," Miko Masacka, national secretary said.

The JACL will enter the case as a "friend of court," along with the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Lawyers Guild, with Walter Tsukamoto, as counsel for the case.

The northorn bounds will extend approximately 1,000 feet beyond the barracks and enclose the Butte northeast o f the hospital building; then at the west the fence will be at the edge of the road bounding 23 and 72 blocks leaving out the net project area then running up the south edge of the net project area and enclosing the long butte west of water tank butte and extending back half mile from the western edge of the camp.

New planted vegetables to be harvested next spring include the following: Field 69-carrots-11 acres; lettuce-13 acres; turnips-2½ acres; field 65-lettuce-10-acres; field 59-bulb onion-8 acres; carrots-8½ acres; lettuce-50 acres; p e a s -18 acres; field 48-bulb onion-7 acres; romaine-5 acres; field 38-carrots-17 acres; beets-5 acres; turnips-7 acres; green onions-3 acres; spinach-5 acres.
