HIGA, VETERAN OF ITALY SPEAKS HERE TOMORROW

Pfc. Thomas Higa, twice wounded veteran of the 100th Battalion, is scheduled to arrive on the project sometime today and will speak in Japanese tomorrow at the Butte amphitheater and the Canal High auditorium at 2:00 and 7:30 p.m. respectively.

He will speak at 2 at the Butte amphitheater instead of in the auditorium since fresh paint is being applied on the auditorium floor.

A great deal of interest has been created in the lecture tour of Pfc. Higa who is traveling under the sponsorship of the Japanese American Citizens League. His primary purpose is to speak in Japanese to the parents and relatives of the Nisei GIs overseas and explain the life of the Nisei soldier, their rela-

tionship with other units, what they are thinking about, what they need and want and many other phases which have concerned the people back home or which may interest them.

Everywhere Pfc. Higa has visited, he has been appreciated by the parents and relatives. His tour started from Spokane, Wash., on August 15 and continued through the states of Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Colorado, Nebraska, Wyoming, New Mexico and Arizona.

The Chicago committee in charge of the itinerary in the Midwest area are planning for his appearances in Chicago, Fort Snelling, Minneapolis, Ann Arbor, Detroit, Cincinnati, Cleveland and other communities where arrangements may be made before he proceeds to the East.

OCHIKUBO**CASE DOES NOT AFFECT OTHERS**

Recent discussions in a

number of project papers of the injunction suit filed by Dr. George Ochikubo to prevent interference with his proposed return to the West Coast military area, have included a misleading inference that should the case be tried in court its outcome will determine the rights of Nisei in general.

This, project attorneys have pointed out, is an erroneous interpretation of the facts. The Army has revoked the applicability of the mass exclusion order as far as Dr. Ochikubo is concerned and has issued to him an individual exclusion order. Decision in his case will therefore pertain to him alone, and will not decide the question of return to the West Coast of other evacuees, either individually or as a group.

CLEVELAND AIDS FAMILY HOUSING

A new policy designed to help families come to Cleveland as complete units and have immediate security of housing was announced today by Max L. Franzen, Director of the Cleveland Baptist Hostel here.

The new setup, worked out through a joint effort by Franzen, the Cleveland War Relocation Authority, the Cleveland Resettlement Committee and the Cleveland Federation of Churches, calls for progressively turning over the facilities of the hostel to family groups.

Under the plan, a man, his wife and children would live together in the hostel as long as it was necessary until adequate housing was found. The cost would be moderate, calling for \$1.00 a day for each adult and 50¢ a day for each child.

Franzen suggested that interested family heads contact the hostel representative or leave officer at each project to make the necessary arrangements.

PREVENT THAT FIRE

What! Another warning about fire, residents might say in disgust after being warned so often about that match, the cigarette, the rubbish, that lumber around the barrack, etc.

But this time it's no false alarm; it's the real stuff. For Rivers will be just one of thousands of communities in the United States that will be observing Fire Prevention Week from tomorrow until next Saturday, October 8 to 14.

THE HAZARDS

Fire prevention week comes at just about the right time too, for autumn is the time when fire prevention needs renewed stimulation. With the heat of summer gone and the cool mornings and evenings approaching, dangers of fire recede into the back of the brain to hibernate for the winter. It's exactly this type of attitude plus the coming of stoves that can cause a large fire, unexpectedly too. In fact it was on October 9 in 1871 that Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lamp to start the famous Chicago fire, which is still remembered to this day by this national Fire Prevention Week.

Rivers' part in fire prevention, not only for this special week but also for all the 51 other weeks of the year, will be to cooperate with the fire department in eliminating fire hazards.

Although Rivers hasn't suffered serious residential fires, the 31% increase in fire losses during the past year for WRA as a whole is not a pleasant indication.

Fire Chief E.D. Mauser lists the common hazards as follows:

Rubbish and scrap lumber, stoves, electric appliances and cords, smoking, and matches. He states that fuel oil must not be stored inside buildings except in screw top metal containers. Stoves should be in good condition before using this winter. Careless smoking too has caused most of the fires in the centers.

OUR PART

Rivers has a fire department in each camp, backed by a group of 598 volunteer firemen, 462 in Butte and 136 in Canal. Each block is organized into a company and a captain appointed for each group. They have been given special instructions in fire fighting, fire prevention, and the common fire hazards found in camps.

Add to this organization the conscious effort on the part of each of the 9000 residents to individually eliminate hazards, and we ought to have a pretty good protection against fire destruction.

TOO EASY OPEN

TO FAMILY MEN

OMAHA'S WAR INDUSTRIES FACE LABOR SHORTAGE

The latest labor-market information pertaining to the Omaha-Council Bluffs Area states that production of war materials vitally necessary to our armed forces is being delayed because of an acute labor shortage. In fact, the Omaha area has been reclassified as a Group II labor market. This situation is reflected in the Omaha VRA office by more and more unsolicited offers from essential industries.

A plan has been worked out by representatives of the Omaha Pacific Schools, the Chamber of Commerce, the Associated Retailers, and the Omaha Manufacturers Association whereby students whose scholastic standing permits part-time employment can be recruited. They will be able to put in 24 hours a week, 8 hours on Monday starting at noon, 8 hours on Saturday, and 8 hours distributed throughout the week.

Seabrook Farm Seeks Workers

MYER SPEAKS IN BEHALF OF JAPANESE AMERICANS

"Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, but a matter of the mind and heart. It is a creed learned by practice and action." So stated Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, in behalf of the Japanese Americans at an inter-faith meeting at the Friday Morning Club in Los Angeles last Monday, according to the L.A. Times.

This was the second of his addresses in Southern California in which he spoke for the interests of the Japanese Americans.

"In the past several months the temper of public opinion on this issue of 'Can the Japs' has been changing rapidly and unmistakably," he told the religious leaders. "The change has been brought about, I am convinced, by the magnificent combat record of the Nisei boys in the uniform of the US Army."

1300 MEN

He pointed out the record of the 100th Infantry Battalion which first met action around the Salerno beach head. To the 1300 men who have served in this unit, he said, more than 1000 Purple Hearts, 44 Silver Stars, 31 Bronze Stars, 9 Distinguished Service Crosses and 3 Legion of Merit medals had been awarded. The entire battalion had received a Presidential citation within the past three weeks, he also stated.

Myer reminded the audience that the Nisei in uniform, many of them evacuated from the West Coast 2 years ago, not only on the Italian front, but are in Burma, China, the Pacific islands, and some with the famed Merrill's Marauders.

30,000 LEAVE CAMPS

Branding as extremists, those who keep the fires of hatred burning against the Japanese Americans, he said that "they based their suspicion not on disloyalty but on racial prejudices."

He disclosed that about 30,000 people of Japanese ancestry have been released from the camps, whose peak was reached at about 107,500 internees. Approximately 800 of that number are now living in the West Coast area.

Shizuo Yagi, formerly of this center, was the first Nisei in Milwaukee, Wis. to be inducted into the Women's Army Corps on Sept. 30, according to a WRA report.
