CASE DOES NOT AFFECT OTHERS

number of project papers of the injunction sui t filed by Dr. Georgo Ochi-kubo to prevent interference with his proposed return to the West Coast military area, have included a misleading in-ference that should the case be tried in court its outcome will determine the rights of Nisci in general.

This, project attorneys have painted out, is an erroneous interprotation of the facts. The Army has revoked the applicability of the mass exclusion order as far as Dr. Ochikubo is concerned and has issued to him an individual exclusion ordor. Docision in his case will therefore pertain to him alone, and will not docide the question of return to the West Coast of other evacuees, either individually or as a group.

CLEVELAND FAMILY HOUSING

A new policy designed to holp families come to Cleveland complete as units and have immediate sccurity of housing was announced today by Max L. Franzen, Director of the Cleveland Baptist Hostol hore.

The new setup, worked out though a joint effort by Franzon, the Cleveland War Relocation Authority, the Cleveland Resettle-ment Committee and the Cloveland Foderation of Churchos, calls for progressively turning over the facilities of the hostel to family groups.

Under the plan, a man, his wife and children would live together in the hostel as long as it was nocessary until adequate housing was found. Tho cost would be moderate, calling for \$1.00 a day for .oach adult and 50% a day for each child.

Franzen suggested that corested family heads interested contact the hostel representativo or leave officer at each project to make the necessary arrange-

ments.

What! Another waning about fire, residents say in disgust after being warned so often about that match, the cigarette, the rubbish, that lumber around the barrack, etc.

But this time it's no falso alarm; it's the real stuff. For Rivers will be just one of thousands of communities in the United States that will be observing Fire Provention Week from tomorrow until next Saturday, October 8 to 14.

THE HAZARDS

Fire prevention week comes at just about the right time too, for auturn is the time when fire prevention needs renewed stimulation. With the heat of summer gono and the cool mornings and evenings approaching, dangers of fire recode into the back of the brain to hibernate for the winter. It's exactly this type of attitude plus the craing of stoves that can cause a large fire, unexpectedly too. In fact it was on October 9 in 1871 that Mrs. O'Leary's cow kicked over a lamp to start the famous Chicago fire, which is still remembered to this day by this national Fire Prevention Week.

Rivors! part in fire prevention, not only for this special week but also for all the 51 other weeks of the year, will be to cooperate with the fire de-partment in eliminating fire hazards.

Although Rivers hasn't suffered serious residential fires, the 311% increase in fire losses during the post year for WRA as a whole is not a pleasant indication.

Fire Chief E.D. Mauser lists the common hazards as follows:

Rubbish and scrap lumber, stoves, electric applianco and cords, smoking, and matches. He states that fuel oil must not be stored inside buildings except in screw top motal containers. Stoves should be in good condition before using this winter. Caroless smoking too has caused most of the fires in the centers. OUR PART

Rivors has a fire department in each camp, backed by a group of 598 voluntoor firemen, 462 in Butte and 136 in Canal. Each block is organized into a company and a captain appointed for each group. They have been given special instructions in fire fighting, fire

provention, and the common fire hazards found in comps.
Add to this organization the conscious effort on the part of each of the 9000 residents to individually climinate . hazards, and we ought to have a pretty good protection against fire destruction.

MYER SPEAKS IN BEHALF. OF JAPANESE AMERICANS

"Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, but a matter of the mind and heart. It is a creed learned by practice and action." So stated billon S. Yyer, PRA director, in behalf of the Japanese Americans at an inter-faith meeting at the Friday Morning Club in Los Angles last Monday, according to the L.A. Times.

This was the second of his addresses in Southern California in which he spoke for the interests of

the Japanese Americans.

"In the past several months the temper of public opinion on this issue of 'Dan the Japs' has been changing rapidly and unmistakably," he told the religious leaders. "The change has been brought about, I am convinced, by the magnificent combat record of the Nisei boys in the uniform of the US Army."

1300 MEN He pointed out the re-cord of the 100th Infantry Battalion which first met action around the Salerno beach head. To the 1300 men who have served in this unit, he said, more than 1000 Purple Mearts, 44 Silver Stars, 31 Bronze Stars, 9 Distinguished Service Crosses and 3 Legion of Merit medals had been awarded. The entire battalion had received a Presidential citation within the past three weeks, he also stated.

Myer reminded the audience that the Nisei in uniform, wany of them evacuated from the West Coast 2 years ago, are not only on the Italian front, but are in Burma, China, the Pacific islands, and some with the famed Morrill's Marauders.

Branding as extremists, those who keep the fires of hatrod burning against the Japanese Americans, he said that "they based their suspicion not on disloyalty but on racial prejudices."

He disclosed that about 30,000 people of Japanese ancestry have been released from the camps, whose peak was reached at about 107,500 internees. A proximately 800 of that number are now living in the West Coast area.
