#### ITALY Nisei Destrov German Nests

THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY-Two Japanese American soldiers, homet own buddles from Waianae, Oahu, serving with the Fifth Army's Japanese American battalion in Italy, recently destroyed four German machinegun rests, enabling their platoon to capture an important hill position above Rome.

They are Technical Sergeant Yeki Kobashi awa, platoon leader, and Private First Class Shinyei Makamine, both veteran infantrymen who have fought with the Fifth Army since Salerno.

As their platoon began its advance against heavy Kobashi6awa enemy fire, and Nakamine crawled to within D feet of the first machinegun nest and silencedit with several well aimed hand gronades, capturing two Germans killing one.

Similar tactics knocked out another gun emplacement directly behind it, yielding four prisoners in the

process.

Leading their platoon steadily forward, they shot up two other machinegun nests with tommy guns at close range.

In this daring advance the two Hawaiians worked so swiftly and efficiently that their whole patoon suffered only one casualty though it . was constantly against moving superior forces.

Also contacts are being made with publishing concerns in the East by the JACL New York office in order that special rates may be obtrined.

The JACL office announced that it would be glad to accept money or latest books to be sent to the wounded soldiers overseas. Arrangements have been made with an officer of the 442nd to distribute the books.

Returning Misei wounded soldiers all state that the latest books are in great domand. The boys take good care of them because everyone is anxious to read to pass away the time. Most of the books donated by many groups are old and out-dated so the latest publications

Major Rusch is also interested in herring from any Nisei women who wish to attend the Military School as mombors of the Women's Army Corps. Any girls wishing to be considored for this assignment may obtain preliminory application blanks from the relocation office for submittal to Major Rusch.

The Fort Snelling School is the successor to Camp Savage which is now closed. According to Major Rusch, the buildings, equipment, and convoniences now avail able at Fort Smelling are far superior to those provided at Savage.

Several stories have appeared in Chicago, Ill., and Madison, Wis., news papers recently telling of the experiences of Japanese American soldiers serving with Morrill's Maraudors in Burma. One story which appeared in the Wisconsin State Journal of Madison on Septembor 12, 1944, and was given more than a column of space in the paper's editorial page consists of a letter from Sgt . . Henry Grsho of Scattle, Wash., to his friend, Toshiko Sonda. Sgt. Gosh o says that there were 14 Japanese Americans serving with "errill's Marauders. Sgt. Gosho write s in part:

"I am very proud to say that 14 of us were one of the first elements of Morrill's Maraudors to leave the States ... We hold the recognition to be the first Nisei to be assigned to front line action with platoons ... I was proud to the hostel shel- we were so readily accepted and the importance of

"M y baptism of fire camo at Valawbeun (Burma) when our platoon was flanked on all sides Japanese. Believe you me, Toshiko, the good Lord I know, is looking after me. We were caught in a crossfire ; of machine guns and all I got in this four hour battle was a bullet hole in my pants leg. My kness wore shaking but strangely enough I was calm and collected enough to translate onemy officer's orders who fool ishly shouted aloud and enabled us to know their next move ... I t was the calmness, coolness and alertness of the other 47 men in our plateon which kept me under control. Gee, but they sure are a b unch of swell pals and it brings a lump to my throat whon I realize that each man in our outfit sort of secretly looks after my safety from capture.


