CO-OP REFUNDS

Transferees to Receive Cash

Co-op patronage refunds for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1944, for those who went to Tule Lake, those relocated, and others permanently transferring or transferred from this center will be paid outright to them in cash.

This was the unanimous decision reached by the Co-op Board of Directors at a meeting held yesterday morning.

Refund checks for those already out of this center will be mailed as soon as correct addresses are notified at patronage refund departments in Butte and Canal.

Those leaving on indefinite leaves may collect their refunds upon presentation of revolving fund certificates, duly enclosed, and evidence substantiating indefinite leaves.

The Board of Directors agreed to pay to residents here, sometime around Christmas, a percentage of the revolving fund certificates issued for the past fiscal year ending June 30, 1944.

Fifteen to twenty English speaking nurses aides are needed to work in the Rivers hospital wards other than the D and E wards.

Teizo Yahanda was elected to head the Canal High PTA at the initial meeting last Tuesday night.

Following the introduction of the high school faculty and student council members, the serving of refreshments concluded the business and social meeting.

99½% DIE FROM NATURAL CAUSES

The War Relocation Authority revealed last Saturday that only 431 Japanese, interned in the WRA centers, had died from January 1 to October 1 of this year and that 99½ per cent of the deaths were from "natural causes," according to an AP release.

Of the 431 deaths, 75 of them occurred at the Tule Lake center.

Many of the deaths, WRA said, were among elderly Japanese.

The figures were released following a Tokyo broadcast which said "memorial services" will be held in Tokyo October 18, for "more than 1000 Japanese internees in America, Canada, Australia, and India" who have died since January.

ITALY

Nisei Destroy German Nests

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Two Japanese American soldiers, home town buddies from Waianae, Oahu, serving with the Fifth Army's Japanese American battalion in Italy, recently destroyed four German machinegun nests, enabling their platoon to capture an important hill position above Rome.

They are Technical Sergeant Yeki Kobashigawa, platoon leader, and Private First Class Shinyei Nakamine, both veteran infantrymen who have fought with the Fifth Army since Salerno.

As their platoon began its advance against heavy enemy fire, Kobashigawa and Nakamine crawled to within 50 feet of the first machinegun nest and silenced it with several well aimed hand grenades, capturing two Germans and killing one.

Similar tactics knocked out another gun emplacement directly behind it, yielding four prisoners in the process.

Leading their platoon steadily forward, they shot up two other machinegun nests with tommy guns at close range.

In this daring advance the two Hawaiians worked so swiftly and efficiently that their whole platoon suffered only one casualty though it was constantly moving against superior forces.

BOOKS FOR SOLDIERS

The suggestion had been made to JACL national headquarters from members overseas that the league should start a drive immediately to start book clubs for wounded Nisei GIs overseas. If this program were carried out, the soldier members thought that a little message written inside by the individual or organization would be appropriate. Then after the Nisei soldiers finish reading the books, they could be passed on to the American soldiers of other nationality background.

INITIAL STEP

As an initial step, books were purchased through the contribution of the JACL national headquarters' staff members. Other book lists are being compiled, among them being the forthcoming book of Carey McWilliams concerning the Pacific Coast evacuation. Also contacts are being made with publishing concerns in the East by the JACL New York office in order that special rates may be obtained.

The JACL office announced that it would be glad to accept money or latest books to be sent to the wounded soldiers overseas. Arrangements have been made with an officer of the 442nd to distribute the books.

Returning Nisei wounded soldiers all state that the latest books are in great demand. The boys take good care of them because everyone is anxious to read to pass away the time. Most of the books donated by many groups are old and out-dated so the latest publications are the things desired.

FOR CHRISTMAS GIFTS

The program of the JACL calls for sending the books by first class postage in order that the books may not go several months after mailing or be lost in transit. The Xmas gift season for overseas may be the ideal time to send those books to the 442nd Combat Team. The JACL National Headquarters or regional offices will be glad to help with the mailing.

She was formerly a resident of Los Angeles, where she was a student of Mrs. Tsutomu Hosoura of Canal. Here at the project, she has been employed as B.F. Runyan's secretary.

She becomes the second Gila resident to return to the West Coast this year to engage in essential work for the government. Mr. William Ishizu, former resident of San Gabriel left last spring with his family to accept employment with the Federal Communications Commission in Portland, Oregon.

Another Class At Ft. Snelling

According to word received from Major Paul Rusch, director of personnel at the Fort Snelling School in Fort Snelling, Minnesota, tentative plans have been made for the formation of another class at the Language School in which academic work will begin on February 1, 1945. Persons wishing to enter this class must be inducted into the Army before December 1, 1944, in order to complete eight weeks of basic military training before transferring to Fort Snelling. Any men interested in entering this class should write Major Rusch immediately so that their applications will be in his office before November 1.

Major Rusch is also interested in hearing from any Nisei women who wish to attend the Military School as members of the Women's Army Corps. Any girls wishing to be considered for this assignment may obtain preliminary application blanks from the relocation office for submittal to Major Rusch.

The Fort Snelling School is the successor to Camp Savage which is now closed. According to Major Rusch, the buildings, equipment, and conveniences now available at Fort Snelling are far superior to those provided at Savage.

PHILADELPHIA HOSTEL REPORT

A total of 149 resettlers, including 14 family groups, were among some 200 individuals who were provided with temporary shelter by the Philadelphia hostel and otherwise aided in relocating during the period from early April, 1944, when the hostel was opened, until mid-September, a report from the Philadelphia WRA states.

Twenty Issai and 15 children under the age of sixteen were among the hostel's evacuee residents, most of whom resettled in Philadelphia or in other communities in Pennsylvania and Southern New Jersey.

In addition to incoming evacuees from relocation centers, the hostel sheltered 47 other persons. Among these were several Nisei soldiers on furlough and the five Issai from Gila River who were obliged to leave a farm at Great Meadows, N. J. by neighbors' protests and who were later employed by another farmer from nearby Newtown, Pa.

Nisei Serve With Burma Marauders

Several stories have appeared in Chicago, Ill., and Madison, Wis., newspapers recently telling of the experiences of Japanese American soldiers serving with Merrill's Marauders in Burma. One story which appeared in the Wisconsin State Journal of Madison on September 12, 1944, and was given more than a column of space in the paper's editorial page consists of a letter from Sgt. Henry Gesho of Seattle, Wash., to his friend, Toshiko Sonda. Sgt. Gesho says that there were 14 Japanese Americans serving with Merrill's Marauders. Sgt. Gesho writes in part:

"I am very proud to say that 14 of us were one of the first elements of Merrill's Marauders to leave the States... We hold the recognition to be the first Nisei to be assigned to front line action with platoons... I was proud to be with the boys because we were so readily accepted and the importance of

our work was recognized. Two hundred per cent cooperation was given us and they looked after us better than brothers.

"My baptism of fire came at Valawbeun (Burma) when our platoon was flanked on all sides by Japanese. Believe you me, Toshiko, the good Lord I know is looking after me. We were caught in a cross-fire of machine guns and all I got in this four hour battle was a bullet hole in my pants leg. My knees were shaking but strangely enough I was calm and collected enough to translate enemy officer's orders who foolishly shouted aloud and enabled us to know their next move... It was the calmness, coolness and alertness of the other 47 men in our platoon which kept me under control. Gee, but they sure are a bunch of swell pals and it brings a lump to my throat when I realize that each man in our outfit sort of secretly looks after my safety from capture.
