MAN POWER

Age Ceiling On Four Mess Jobs

In a second move to alleviate the Center's critical labor situation, Gila's Man Power Executive Committee on Thursday, placed an age ceiling on four mess hall jobs. Hereafter no men under fifty will be assigned as dishwashers, potwashers, pantry clerks or timecheckers. Men under fifty now holding these positions will be transferred to more valuable assignments and replaced by women or older men. Through this program the Committee hopes to jar loose able bodied men now performing work in mess halls which could be done by women. These persons will then be available for more pressing jobs.

The Committee also tackled the mess operations truck swamper problem. It developed that swampers have been making deliveries only to the mess hall door, the pantry clerks taking it inside for storage. This system not only results in damage to the food but requires mess halls to maintain husky pantry clerks to handle it. It was recommended that the Supply Officer instruct swampers to deliver merchandise inside the mess hall as directed by the Chef.

NATIONAL WAR FUND DRIVE COMMENCES NEXT WEEK

Gila's two community councils this week endorsed the Community Chest Fund and reaffirmed the

action taken by the council last year which provided that only Community Chest and Red Cross organizations might make a general solicitation for funds.

This action by the councils was taken, as the National War Fund again asked community support and as last quarter allotments were made to local organizations participating in the Community Chest.

The drive for funds will get under way next week, using the national slogan: "Give a Day's Pay!"

Teams from the various participating agencies will work with block managers and block representatives next week in conducting the drive.

The National War Fund is a federation of the leading war related appeals, except Red Cross, to provide essential wartime services to our Armed Forces, Merchant Marine and prisoners of war. Arizona is assigned to raise \$132,000, Pinal County \$15,000, and Rivers \$900. Last year Rivers topped its goal by giving \$922 and the community received State wide recognition and praise for exceeding its goal and being one of the first in the State to do so. The committee seeks to do the same again this year.

The Community Chest provides a fund from which all of the youth organizations on the project re-

will not be tolerated. The Committee emphasized that all requests for transfer must first clear through personnel management. No one is authorized to contact workers regarding transfer except representatives of personnel management. Requests will not be approved if this procedure is omitted. It was pointed out that the administration of labor priorities rests solely with the personnel management section and possession of a high priority is not a license to violate established procedures.

The Committee also requested that division and section heads re-examine activities conducted by their units to see if unnecessary labor is assigned.

THOMAS**Expresses Views
On Evacuation**

Californians who oppose the return of the Japanese Americans to their homes in California "legally, if possible, illegally if necessary," do not believe in democracy, Norman Thomas, presidential candidate of the Socialist party, declared in a campaign speech before a San Francisco club on Sept. 26, according to the AP.

Thomas said the flarour of "racism" against the California-born Japanese is "a far greater danger to American liberty in general than to the Japanese Americans in particular."

He stated that "What was done on the west coast was, as Justice Murphy admitted, painfully similar in principle to the German treatment of the Jews."

Thomas insisted that "greed for land made fertile by Japanese skill and labor was partly at the bottom of the herding of these American citizens into concentration camps. Thomas argued that if military necessity dictated the treatment accorded them, they should be paid damages for what was done to them, "just as we give property owners damage for things done to their property under military necessity."

**GILANS NAMED
IN ESCHEAT CASE**

The state of California has started an escheat action in Fresno Co. against Mr. and Mrs. Tamigoro Chiamori, residents of Canal, and their two sons, Akira and Yasushi.

The escheat case involves an 80 acre orchard and vineyard land, valued at \$50,000, which is located one mile southwest of Parlier. The state charges that it was owned by aliens of Japanese ancestry in violation of the state anti-alien land law. The petition alleges that the alien Japanese obtained title to the property as the distributee of son, Kiyoshi, who had died. The property was

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PARENTS' RESPONSIBILITY

The importance of the home, school, and religion in a child's life was outlined by Cecil F. Andres, assistant counselor of the social welfare section, in a talk entitled "Juvenile Delinquency--A Challenge to Parents," delivered before a meeting of the Butte Elementary PTA last week.

One of the big factors leading to juvenile delinquency is unhappiness, turmoil, and discord between parents within the home, the one place where a child looks for support though all else in the world may fall apart.

A SECURE HOME

Mrs. Andres stated that the most important influence in a child's life is his home, his parents, and family life. To a child his parents represent almost God-like beings. A child must have a sense of "home" as a place where no harm can come to him because his parents are there. He should have the feeling of security of acceptance and understanding. Parents must set a constant example of honorable character for the child to follow.

It is not mere chance that the greater number of delinquents come from broken homes where parents are separated, divorced, or where there is such unhappiness between the parents that it almost soaks into the child's body.

When a child enters school, the teacher can only share but never completely take over the parents' responsibility. The child must have definite hours for study at home. The parents must see to it that he is never unnecessarily absent since such habits lead to laziness, discouragement, and failure. When a parent fails to meet this obligation, when a child truant, then the community must step in because such neglect can be a threat to all.

Religious training is of utmost importance. It is one of the greatest sources of ethics, faith, courage, and comfort.

COMMUNITY'S PART

How can society as a group prevent juvenile delinquency? Youth must be given outlets to their natural instincts for dare and adventure. A youth center might be a solution. A clubroom, perhaps, where boys can make as much noise as they want without being bothered, play games, turn on the radio or phonograph. They can be taught to make things such as airplanes, cabinets, desks, or clay articles. Exhibitions of these articles will serve to give incentive to their efforts. They must be given tools of learning, for play, and for work.

In conclusion she declared to her PTA audience: "The world moves forward on the feet of its children. Will these feet be strong, sure, purposeful or will they be faltering, wayward and lead to destruction for themselves and their people? How will we meet the challenge? The answer rests with you."

NISEI TEST CASES TAKEN BEFORE SUPREME COURT

The Korematsu and Endo cases, testing the constitutionality of evacuating and confining American citizens of Japanese ancestry, were taken before the United States Supreme Court on Tuesday, according to the AP release.

KOREMATSU

Fred Korematsu, formerly of Oakland, asked the high tribunal to rule on the validity of evacuation orders which resulted in his being placed in the Topaz WRA Center. Mitsuye Endo, formerly of Sacramento, demands freed from the same center and a court declaration that she has the right to go wherever she pleases.

The court was told that there is no question of the loyalty of either to the United States, and that there was no evidence involving any Japanese American citizen in espionage or sabotage on the west coast.

ACTION UNINTENDED

Attorneys for Korematsu charged that neither Congress nor the President intended such action and said that only in Nazi German could a similar "imprisonment program" be

Six Juveniles Disturb Peace

Six young juveniles, children of appointed members, charged with reckless driving in block 73 and disturbing the peace, were picked up by the internal security Wednesday night, stated John Nichol, police chief.

The boys were arraigned before Project Director Leroy H. Bennett this morning. The sentence will be announced later. Complaints against these boys had come in from block 73 residents.

found. Counsel for Miss Endo contended that the only legal ground for her detention was "implied authority" said to be conferred by Congress and the President.

Solicitor General Charles Fahy urged the court to consider circumstances involved in the cases in the light of sacrifices made by millions of other citizens so far in the war.

Fahy said that after the attack on Pearl Harbor, evacuation and detention were necessary, that it has always been the government's plan to restore evacuees to full liberty as soon as circumstances permit, and stated the people concerned had been treated in a "fair and decent manner."

Mr. and Mrs. Kumajiro Sakamoto and Gikei Sakamoto, Sakamoto's older brother, will work on the palatial estate of A.N. Spavel, president of the International Latex Corp., and one of the nation's most outspoken advocates of civil rights and equality for minority groups. Spavel also wishes to employ two additional Japanese couples to work with the Sakamoto's as housekeeper, gardener, chauffeur and caretaker, Jimmy Sakamoto, a reservist, accompanies his parents and will remain with them until he is called to active duty into the United States Army.
