## STOVES

### Housing Dept. Releases Policy

Due to shortage of stoves the following policies have been drawn up by the housing dept. approved by Project Director L.H. Bennett.

All single person will be allowed to remain where they are without stoves, but single men who want heat will have to move to another apartment which is occupied by a single person who has a stove. Single persons who have stoves must accept people moving in from a place without a stove. In some instances it may be necessary to move a stove and the single person from an apartment to a quarter of other single persons.

Except for moving, all requests must be taken up with the block manager. Contact the housing department directly when a family or single person wishes to move.

## CANAL COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

The regular meeting of the Canal Community Council was held last Tuesday.

The council gave unanimous approval in holding a joint Community Chest and War Fund Drive. The War Fund Drive started on Sunday and will continue for a week with the quota for Rivers being \$900 this year. The cooperation of all was requested for the success of this drive. S. Uchiyama and Allen Aoyagi were appointed as the Canal Community Chest Drive Committee.

The chairman reported on the Manpower Commission's Executive Board meeting which was held in October at which time the solving of the labor shortage was discussed. The problem will be worked out by reassigning workers from less needed positions

## MYER DEFENDS CITIZENS' RIGHTS

Dillon S. Myer, W.R.A. director, told the "Remember Pearl Harbor" League organized by the farmers in the White river and Puyallup valleys in Washington, who oppose the return of evacuated Japanese, to "let these who want to fight go overseas to do it," according to the UP release.

He told Corydon Garret, newspaperman and spokesman for the recently organized league, that the organization advocates taking the citizenship away from the Nisei, and when they do that, they are "monkeying with your own citizenship and mine, and I don't care for that."

Myer believed that the friction was mostly economic, and that the sponsors of the league feared competition offered by the Japanese, who before the war were prominent in the truck farming industry in the White river and Puyallup valleys.

"They forget we have some 12,000 Japanese Americans fighting with our armies, some of them in the South Pacific," he said. "In one relocation center recently we had 46 gold star mothers whose sons had been killed in action."

# BUTTE BLOCK MANAGERS DISCUSS ART EXHIBIT

An art exhibit will be held on November 10, 11, and 12, it was revealed at last week's Butte Block Managers meeting by Meijiro Sato of the Butte CAS.

He asked the block managers to appoint their block representatives to take care of the exhibits. He stated that further information and instructions for residents concerning this art display will be announced through the newspaper at a later date.

## DUNWOODY GIVES TRAINING PROGRAM

Complete information on the veteran's training program at the William Hood Dunwoody Industrial Institute is now available, states Maxine Hagan, student relocation adviser. This institute provides industrial and mechanical training and is open to Nisei, other than veterans. Any one interested may inquire at 13-10-A.

Advisers for this group are Mary Mark and Tomiko Okuda.

The Block Managers, following the suggestion made by the disposal division representative, recommended that following points be made known to the block residents:

1. That shrubbery and branches be cut to a suitable length and left in a neat pile so that it could be easily collected.

2. That melon rinds, egg shells, coffee grinds, and orange peelings be placed in a separate box or container.

3. That notice be placed in the latrine for proper disposal of foreign material.

At this time James L. Shelly, successor to Hugo Wolter as assistant project director in charge of community management, was introduced. Reporting on the recent Denver conference, he stated it was based on the relocation problem, encouraging residents to think about relocation and its opportunities. For those unable to relocate and unable to take care of themselves, especially the old age and the sick cases, some adjustment will be made through another source.

A suggestion to retract the shower curfew regulation was unanimously accepted by the body.

One block manager stated that upon his personal investigation, about 19 steel beds were being used as back stop for baseball games at the appointed staff field. His idea was that steel beds should be given to all residents having cot beds if such steel beds could be secured, and the body was unanimously in favor of his opinion.

# CURTISS CANDY COMPANY ASKS FOR MORE WORKERS

Because of the success of the evacuees at the Curtiss Candy Company of Chicago, Illinois, the plant superintendents are asking for more Issei and Nisei workers. At the present there are about 100 Issei and Nisei employed in the plant. Weekly bonus earnings of many Issei and Nisei women workers run from the guaranteed minimum up to high as \$45.00 per week.

Harry Mayeda, plant personnel department, has made arrangements with K. Matsumoto for housing and boarding girls who seek employment in the plant. There are adequate showers and bathing facilities and the hotel is within easy access of the various plants. Two to three girls will be in each room. Weekly rates are \$12.00 with three meals a day. Similar arrangements for housing and boarding of men, or couples without children have been made.

The plant also offer part time work for girls and boys who wish to go to school. At the present there are a number of students who are working on part time basis.

## Six Youths Sentenced

Six delinquents, children of appointed staff members in Butte, were sentenced on Saturday, October 14, for reckless driving and disturbing the peace, announced John W. Nichol, chief of the internal security.

One youth was sentenced to a curfew from right after school until 6 a.m. After 9 p.m. he must be in his home. He will not be permitted to attend the movies, unless accompanied by his parents. He will not be allowed to enter any cantoons or recreation halls, and he will be confined to block 81. He will serve this sentence for 90 days, then be put on probation for 90 days.

The remaining five will serve the sentence for 30 days, and be put on probation for 30 days.
