## CHUSHINGURA

### Benefit Movie Nets \$888.50

The Gila Health Committee reported the net benefit of \$888.50 for the "Chushingura" movie program.

The financial report of the movie is as follows:

Incoming: Butte \$582.70

Canal 305.80

Expense: Movie Fee \$75.00

A special donation of \$75 from the Gila Co-op paid for the movie fee making the net balance of \$888.50

This balance will be reserved in the health fund until the end of this year to be presented to the hospital evacuee personnel as their annual bonus.

The Committee expressed its appreciation for the cooperation given by CAS officers, Gila Co-op Block Managers and the whole community in making the program a success.

## TWO COACHES FOR NOVEMBER

Because of the heavy demand for seats on the two special coaches chartered during October, plans have been made to schedule two coaches during November. They will leave Chandler on Thursday, November 9, and Thursday, November 30 at 4:50 a.m. Seats may be reserved on either of these coaches by persons on short-term or trial leave and visitors returning to eastern points, as well as by relocators who are taking indefinite leave.

Reservation of both trains may be made at the Canal or Butte relocation offices at any time. The coach leaving Gila October 26 is almost completely full, although several seats remain available for emergency use by last mi-

## WAR FUND, CHEST DRIVES GET GOOD PARTICIPATION

Generous subscription to the United War Fund and Community Chest greeted workers who started the campaign among the appointed personnel on Tuesday afternoon. The campaign teams report practically unanimous participation with many staff members giving more than a day's pay and very few giving less.

The drive started among the appointed personnel before the general community drive got under way because of the comparative

simplicity of organizing the drive among the appointed staff and the desire to make a good early showing in the state campaign.

Representatives of the various participating groups in the Community Chest and of churches, councils and block managers are meeting today at 4:30 in Butte and Friday at 11:30 in Canal to organize and plan their campaign for the drive in the various blocks.

Saturday's NEWS-COURIER will carry more detailed account of the time and method of soliciting in the blocks. "We have set \$3000 as our goal," says W.C. Sawyer chairman of the drive, "and I feel confident that we shall be able to reach our goal." "We want it clearly understood however that this is to be a voluntary contribution. Credit will be given to those who do contribute but no workers will return to 'pressure' people who feel that they cannot give."

## Men Needed To Install Stoves

Eight men are needed immediately to help install stoves in evacuee barracks. Unless these additional workers are secured at once the installation of stoves will not be completed before cold weather sets in, stated Thomas I. Reynolds, a assistant personnel officer.

This is a permanent job and experience is not necessary. The Manpower Executive Committee has given this work a high priority rating and men not employed in other essential activities should apply to the personnel management section for transfer if they are interested in this work.

## Plans Progress For Institute

A steering committee to draft plans for the Leadership Institute scheduled here from November 7 to 17 is being appointed this week.

A.L. Griswold, CAS supervisor, who attended a Phoenix meeting Monday, states that members of the Phoenix YMCA, YWCA, girl scouts, and campfire girls indicated they may participate in the Rivers Leadership Institute.

Among the tentatively listed activities for the Institute are an arts and crafts exhibit, club group meetings, general assemblies for all young people, an Armistice Day parade, football games, and a social evening.

The chief of the Institute will be Masao Satow, executive secretary for Japanese work of the national council of the YMCA, who will arrive here at the end of this month. The purpose of this Institute is to strengthen leisure time services for people in relocation centers by helping individuals lead and participate in group activities. minute travelers.

## T/S Chomori's Commission

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--For demonstrating exceptional qualities of leadership against the enemy on the Fifth Army front in northern Italy, Technical Sergeant Masuo Chomori, formerly of Glendale, Calif. has been commissioned a second lieutenant.

A platoon sergeant with the Japanese American 442d Regimental Combat Team since its activation in Camp Shelby, Miss., in February, 1943, Chomori won his battlefield commission for his exemplary and inspiring leadership during both training and battle periods. He demonstrated his abilities as a field commander under the most adverse conditions in combat.

When his platoon leader was wounded during an attack in the vicinity of Suvereto, Italy, Chomori assumed command. His rifle platoon was counterattacked by enemy forces consisting of one infantry company, three Mark IV tanks, and one self-propelled 83 - mm gun. The enemy also had the advantages of commanding ground, initial surprise, and superior fire power.

Chomori reorganized his platoon and directed its withdrawal to a more tenable position. His cheerfulness and efficiency contributed much to the maintenance of morale in his platoon and company.

On another occasion, in the vicinity of Hill 140, near Molino A Ventoabbato, he again assumed charge of his platoon when his platoon leader was wounded. His company had dug in to hold off enemy counter thrusts after capturing its objective. His platoon was entrenched in the center of the company sector on high ground which dominated the fields of fire to the company front.

Toward evening, German artillery laid an extremely heavy barrage on the Japanese American positions, followed by a concentrated 81 - mm mortar barrage.

## Chicago's Church

Established to be of assistance to its members relocating to this area, the Chicago Buddhist Church, 5487 S. Dorchester, was opened Sunday, October 8, with an inaugural worship service of dignity and beauty. A good-sized congregation chiefly Nisei but including Americans, of other ancestries, was present.

The Rev. Gyonay M. Kubose, pastor, officiated, with the aid of Roy Y. Higashi, assistant minister and executive secretary. In his sermon, "Life Without Regret," the Reverend Kubose, who was born in San Francisco and graduated from the University of California, emphasized Nisei dedication to the teachings of their parents and the principles of their fellow Nisei who are giving their lives on scattered battlefronts. The sermon, as well as all other parts of the service, was in English.

The new church is affiliated with the Buddhist House of Los Angeles and the Dharma House of Santa Fe. It will maintain a counselling service for resettlers and assist with such problems as housing and general information.

## FOLLOWERS WIDESPREAD

The incense offering was particularly impressive with representatives of the eight War Relocation Projects, Nisei servicemen, the Issei, and longtime Japanese American residents of Chicago taking part. Included were: George Fujihawa, Central Utah; Bob Shimizu, Colorado River; Jiro Aratani, Gila River; Ki-kuyo Masuda, Granada; Asako Kubo, Heart Mountain; Kiyo Nishimori, Manzanar; Koichi Hayashi, Minidoka; Shig Kitahata, Rohwer; Sgt. Hiroshi Taniyama, Camp Snelling; Teruo Muroyama, Chicago, and T. Mayeda, Issei.

The service was opened by Arthur A. Takemoto, executive secretary of the Young Buddhist Association of Chicago, who introduced Taro Kawa, chairman, formerly an active Bussei leader of Los Angeles and Gila River. Takemoto, who is from the Colorado River and Central Utah centers, is the only Japanese American member of the Board of Directors of the Buddhist Brotherhood in America.

G. Raymond Booth, Chicago district relocation officer of the WRA, gave a congratulatory message, while Gustav Carus, attorney and son of the late Dr. Paul Carus, author of a number of well-known books on Buddhism, responded in behalf of the church. A period of silent meditation was observed for the nation's war dead.

## OFFERTORY

The offertory ceremony was conducted by Handy Matsuda, San Fernando and Gila River, and James Mayeda, Los Angeles and Manzanar. Helon Munekiyo of Yakima, Washington, and Heart Mountain, was the pianist.

The Reverend Kubose was in Japan for six years of graduate study after leaving the University of California. He returned to this country just before the outbreak of the war and was associated with the Buddhist Church in Oakland. A former resident of Heart Mountain Project, he is planning to visit various centers in the near future. Mrs. Kubose and their two sons, 7 and 3, are presently living with her parents at the Colorado River Project.

## Nisei Displays Heroic Action

In the face of the extremely difficult and hazardous situation Chomori displayed extraordinary coolness in controlling his men. Several German counterattacks in force were driven back, largely through the effective rifle fire of the platoon under his direction. Though his group suffered ten casualties during this action, he personally supervised their evacuation to safer territory.

In all subsequent action, for a period of almost three weeks, he remained in sole charge of his platoon in lieu of an officer during some of the bitterest fighting for the approaches of Pisa and Leghorn.

His wife, Mrs. Elsie F. Chomori, lived in Compton, Calif., before she was evacuated to the Rohrer Relocation Center. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kin-saku Chomori, and four brothers and two sisters live in the Manzanar Relocation Center.

Those who did not receive or need adjustments should contact the refund department of the Co-op at the Canal administration building or at the Butte Co-op office at 69-15.

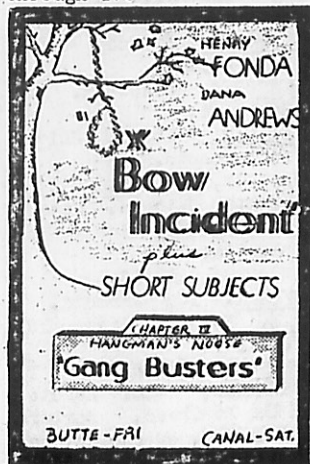
Residents moving from block to block or to other apartments should also report to the Co-op refund departments immediately to notify the change of address.

## KOSEKI FIRST RESIDENT TO LEAVE FOR TOOELE

Toraji Joseph Koseki of 74-6-A, became the first Gile resident to leave the project for work at the Tooele Ordnance Depot in Utah. He left with his wife and children this morning.

Koseki was born in Japan, raised in Hawaii, and graduated from the National School of Chiropractic in Chicago. He practiced chiropractic in Honolulu and then moved his family to Los Angeles where he lived for 11 years and worked for several local and federal government agencies. He is a veteran of World War I who helped organize the Commodore Perry American Legion Post and the JACL.

Here on the project he has worked in the hospital and supervised the mimeograph section. He also served as vice-chairman

of the Community Council, chairman of the Recreation Association, adjutant of the Ex-Servicemen's Association, Vice-chairman of the Butte Boy Scouts and member of the War Manpower Commission.

## SEABROOK FARMS ASK FOR MORE EMPLOYEES

Employment and housing are still available at Seabrook Farms, according to a teletype message received recently from J. Leon Yager, special re-

cation officer, stationed at Seabrook. There is also an immediate need for 200 to 250 men and women or childless couples who can be housed in single rooms or dormitories, Yager adds. Transportation and traveling expenses for persons going out on trial leave will be paid by the company.

A 5¢ an hour increase in wage rates is now in effect at Seabrook, which means that men are now paid 60¢ an hour and women are paid 55¢. Yager asserts that time and a half will be paid for overtime after December 1, and that from December 1, to May 1 there is a strong probability that a 48 hour minimum work week will be established.

If there is any slack in the work load, preference in employment will be given to family heads. In the event that there is so much slack that full time employment is not available for the remaining single workers after one month employment, their fares back to the project will be paid by Seabrook, Yager concluded.

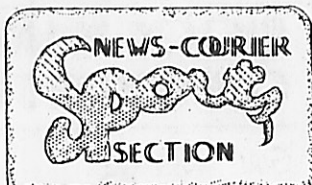
## Small Private Saves Big Pal

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--Small, wiry, 110-pound Private Takaji J. Goto, ex-aviation mechanic of Santa Ana, California, rescued a 175-pound wounded comrade and carried him to safety under heavy enemy fire on the Fifth Army Front in Italy recently.

The Former Santa Ana Junior College student fights with the Japanese-American 442nd Regimental Combat Team, at the time attached to the 34th "Red Bull" Infantry Division.

Their unit, a flank security detail, was attacked and driven back by a German rifle and machinegun company during the advance up Hill 140 near Molino A Ventoalto.

The unit withdrew 25 yards leaving one dead and one wounded. Goto voluntarily crawled back 75 yards to the wounded man in the face of machine pistol and rifle fire with scant concealment and no cover. Applying a tourniquet to the leg of his 175-pound comrade, and in the midst of small arms fire and hand grenades, he

### AUTHOR WRITES ON JAPANESE

Carey McWilliams, long a champion of minority groups and author of such books as Factories in the Field and Brothers Under the Skin, has just published another book entitled Prejudice, Japanese Americans: Symbol of Intolerance. (Scheduled for release October 16).

In his new book author McWilliams has written a carefully documented story of the Japanese in America from the first days of their immigration to their present life in the WRA relocation centers. Here he presents the treatment of the West Coast Japanese minority in terms of the total American scene and the fact that the United States, in order to take its place in the international world of tomorrow, must solve its racial problems at home.

"Sharing as we do with our fellow Christians the firm conviction that individual human personality and intrinsic worth of Christian character transcend all barriers of class, creed or race, now therefore be it resolved by the Southern California Baptist convention that we individually and as a community co-operate in every way possible with the WRA and with all other government agencies by receiving with true Christlike spirit those persons of Japanese ancestry whose return to the Pacific Coast has been duly and regularly authorized and whose return to their homes in this area will not, in judgement of those authorities, be inimical to the best interests of our State or nation."
