DEATH

Fall Fatal To Ex-Lodi Man

Teruo Matsumoto, 28, of 44-14-D, died yesterday morning from injuries suffered when he fell from a mess operations truck on which he was working. His father, Gunichi Matsumoto, believed to be residing in the Rohwer Center in Arkansas, is being notified.

Young Matsumoto fell from the back of a vegetable delivery truck just before it stopped at mess hall 40 to unload vegetables about 9 o'clock yesterday morning. He apparently landed on his head and fractured his skull. It was apparently accidental as far as could be determined at this time.

Judge Walter B. Love, ex-officio coroner for Casa Grande, will investigate the matter and will announce officially the cause of the death.

DIET WORKERS BADLY NEEDED

Special diet for hospital patients will have to be discontinued unless more workers are obtained for the dietary department, Dr. Grace Lawson, chief dietitian, declared.

Recovery and often the lives of many patients depend on these special diet that they are receiving, she stated.

The present diet workers are so over-worked that they must have a rest, or they will soon become hospital patients themselves.

Dietary workers are given lessons while they work. It is one of the most desirable places in the hospital to work, Dr. Lawson stated.

Workers should apply immediately with Dr. Lawson at the hospital diet kitchen. English speaking ability is not imperative.

The slogan is "give a days pay," as it was last year, but it must be clearly understood that contributions are entirely voluntary, stated W. C. Sawyer, chairman of the drive.

that some manpower is being wasted due to irregularities in scheduling workers and in time reporting. A survey is now under way to determine how much leakage is resulting from this practice. The Committee also recommended that section and unit heads carefully examine this matter to see that timekeepers are making correct entries on time reports.

The serious shortage of stove installation workers came in for more attention. It was decided that if sufficient workers do not come forward voluntarily it will be necessary to effect transfers from among those holding less essential jobs.

R. S. Davidson, chief of agriculture, gave the Committee a resume of the survey he is conducting in the agriculture section. He stated a great many places had been discovered where a little tightening up would lead to better utilization of available manpower.

It was emphasized that section and unit heads must be more prompt in notifying personnel management when a project or activity is temporarily closing or nearing completion. In this way the workers can be transferred to other jobs without loss of time. These workers would, however, be available to return to that job if it reopened.

NISEI ENGINEERS ON THE FRONT

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY--An advance company of volunteer Japanese-American Engineers has been working and fighting with front-line Infantrymen in the Fifth Army's drive over the forested mountains of northern Italy.

They built roads, constructed by-passes and picked up hundreds of enemy mines, all in range of German shell fire--meanwhile knocking off their share of Krauts.

TOUGH JOB

Part of a special regimental combat team activated and trained at Camp Shelby, Mississippi, last year, all members of the Engineer company are Americans of Japanese descent who volunteered for combat duty from Hawaii and relocation centers in the United States.

When they joined the Fifth Army as fresh troops, they were assigned the main road of advance in their sector--one of the toughest jobs on the front.

"From the first day we knew we had a smart, rugged gang," said First Lieutenant Frank Hanten of White Lake, South Dakota, Engineer officer. "They're eager to learn and they cooperate perfectly. They're a good GI Engineer outfit."

Their normal work is routine and laborious. Road gangs swing picks and axes in broiling sun, often missing the noon meal. Sometimes they work 24 hours in one shift, filling up shell holes with rocks and gravel.

CLEAR THE WAY

One of their most important jobs in constructing by-passes--emergency run-arounds through stream beds where retreating Germans have blown up bridges.

Huge, rumbling bulldozers and air drills are used for this work. As soon as the Krauts give up a bridge position, the advance Japanese-American Engineers swarm in to chop down trees around it, grade down the embankments. With every minute counting, the husky little GIs,

APPLYING FOR RETURN

The Friends of the American Way group of Pasadena has suggested the procedure to follow for evacuees formerly of Pasadena who are eligible to return to the Western Defense Command area.

We believe that the procedure is a good one to follow for any evacuee who wishes to return to the Western Defense area and are printing it for those who might be interested.

1. Have a definite place to go to live. If you are to live with a family in the community, have them write you a letter telling you they want you and what the living arrangements will be.

2. Have a definite job and a statement from your employer giving the terms of employment, type of work, etc. If you are going to school, have a copy of your admission papers.

3. Send these with your request for return to the coast to the Commanding General, Western Defense Command, Presidio, San Francisco, Calif. He is the only person who can grant you this permission.

In sending these applications to the Commanding General we believe that the applicants should also give other pertinent information, especially if they have family members or relatives in the armed forces of the United States. Indications are that those with close relatives in the armed forces get quicker and more favorable action on their applications.

The general policy of exclusion from the West Coast still remains, and each application is considered individually.

Marine's Appreciation

The Rev. John Yamazaki, former Gilan, now an Episcopal priest in Cincinnati, tells a story of a Cincinnati Nisei girl bride and her experience on a recent trip to visit her soldier husband at Camp Blading in Florida.

The Nisei bride was reading a paper in the coach when a Caucasian Marine came to her, tapped her on the shoulder and asked: "Are you a Nisei?"

Here is her account of what followed: "I wondered why he should ask me but I told him I was a Nisei. This seemed to please him very much. 'I have been in the South Pacific for two years,' he told me, 'and I have been very close to the Nisei out in the front lines. I owe plenty to the Nisei and I want to show my appreciation. You must be my guest for the rest of the trip.'

"From then on (the bride continued), he took me to all my meals in the diner and insisted on paying for them and for all other incidentals on the trip, like papers, magazines, sandwiches and coffee. I knew I would have hurt his feelings if I refused."

STATE ATTORNEYS URGE LIFTING OF COAST BAN

Attorneys general of California, Oregon, and Washington, on October 7, petitioned the U.S. Supreme Court to lift--as soon as national security permits--civilian exclusion orders against citizens of Japanese ancestry issued by military authorities in the West Coast area, according to an AP report under a Washington dateline.

Filing a joint petition as friends of the court in the case of Fred T. Korematsu, Oakland Nisei, the petitioners said the high tribunal had emphasized in the decisions handed down previously that except in the most unusual circumstances racial discriminations are prohibited. The petition asserts that "it was reasonable for the military commanders to meet the danger threatened (after Pearl Harbor) from the unidentified disloyal members of the group (of persons of Japanese ancestry) by excluding the group as a whole." The attorneys concluded, however, that "the restrictions placed upon this group of our citizens must be removed as soon as the military authorities determine and the national security permits."

Inventory Taken In Leupp Center

WRA representatives are now making a complete inventory of property at the Leupp center as a preliminary step in the termination of the agreement between WRA and the Indian Service concerning its use.

Leupp was opened April 27, 1943, with the transfer of evacuees from the Moab isolation center. It was closed December 2, 1943, after its residents had been transferred to Tule Lake and the relocation centers. Since that time it has been in the care of a WRA custodian.

WRA SOLICITOR HAS ENLISTED

Philip M. Glick, solicitor of the War Relocation Authority since its first day, has enlisted in the U.S. Navy, according to the October 1 WRA information digest.

The camp to which he will be assigned for his "boot" training is not known.

Charges Made For Gamblers

Five persons pleaded guilty to the charges of gambling, one to permitting gambling and one to assault and battery on Thursday, October 19, announced John W. Nichol, chief of the internal security.

Kamematsu Yamaguchi, was charged with gambling and permitting gambling, was fined \$10.

Usaburo Kikunaga, who was charged for assault and battery, was sentenced to 30 days of work without pay, and was put on probation for 60 days thereafter.

The four, who were fined \$2 each for gambling are Ichigi Nakaya, Kaneichi Arikawa, Seijiro Inouye, and Geichi Nakayama.
