## CHEST FUND Drive Starts Here Tomorrow

The community chest and National War Fund Drive will be held tomorrow in Canal and Thursday in Rutte.

Residents are urged to be prepared to give their contributions to the volunteer collectors.

This is the only time during the year that Gila will have the opportunity to support their youth activities, and so generosity in donations is urged by the drive committee.

The Canal elementary staff was the first unit to gain the 100% mark. Their contributions exceeded a day's wages.

Thus far, the appointed personnel has contributed over \$500.

## CLEVELAND

## BLAZE VICTIMS REACH 115 DEAD

Victims of the liquid gas explosion that charred a 50 block east side area in Cleveland Friday had reached 115 dead according to an AP report dated October 23.

Of the dead only 36 were identified. There were 102 names on an official roll of reported missing, including 47 employees of The East Ohio Gas Company, located at East 61st Street and the New York Central Railroad tracks. S.R. Gerber, coroner, said that the toll of lives would possibly reach 200.

Estimates of property damage ranged up \$15,000,000. Officials of the Gas Company, owner of the \$6,000,000 liquifying and storage properties, said an explosion in a near-by testing laboratory of the American Gas Association apparently fired the liquid gas tanks. The cause is not known.

## JUVENILE BOARD ELECTS ONODA

George Onoda was elected chairman of the Canal Juvenile Board at the initial meeting on October 14th.

It was decided that the board meet every second Saturday of each month and invite the high school or grammar school PTA or any other group interested in juvenile cases.

Leroy H. Bennett stated that he has appointed John Stringer and William May as juvenile officers.

## ANNOUNCEMENT BY NET TRUSTEES

The trustees of the camouflage net fund have announced that if any former camouflage worker expects to secure refund tax payments on contributions paid to the trust fund, a certified copy of 1040 or 1040A must be submitted to trustees by December 31, 1944.

The present trustees of the camouflage net fund are W. G. Graham, finance officer; Tom Ikemoto, and Shobei Sasaki.

## Death Found To Be Accident

Judge Walter B. Lovo, ex-officio coroner from Casa Grande, who investigated that death of Teruo Matsumoto, stated that death was accidental and that an inquest is not necessary.

Judge Lovo arrived here Saturday to investigate and to attend the autopsy.

Matsumoto, formerly of Lodi, died last Friday morning from injuries suffered when he fell from a mess operations truck delivering vegetables at mess 40. He fractured his skull and died about an hour later at the hospital.

His father Gunichi Matsumoto, residing at Rohwer, Ark., has been called to this center.

## SEABROOK

## Kawamura Says More Jobs Open

Additional opportunities exist for a large number of family groups to resettle successfully at Seabrook Farms, according to Hideo Kawamura of 31-13-B, who has returned from Seabrook for a visit. Kawamura transferred here from Jerome and left Gila in July for Seabrook, where he has been working since that time. He states that the reports to the effect that Japanese workers are only getting 5 hours of work a day are unfounded. He states that he has worked continuously on an 8 to 10 hour day since his arrival there and lost only 2 days time when the hurricane hit the Atlantic Coast last month. He is certain that all persons now on the job at Seabrook will work a minimum 48 hour week throughout the winter and that starting next March or April, they will have unlimited overtime.

Kawamura is a foreman at the dehydration plant where he is in charge of a group of men. He states that he was worried at first when large groups of Issei from Gila River arrived at Seabrook in August and September because he feared that community sentiment would be unfavorable since many of those people have difficulty speaking English. After they had been there several weeks, however, he became convinced that his fears were needless, for all the Gila families seemed to make a satisfactory adjustment.

## EVACUEE FARMER GETS \$1,500 LOAN FROM FSA

Word was received recently of a \$1500 Farm Security Administration Government Loan made to an evacuee farmer who settled near Lapeer, Michigan. A complete account of the case was given in a letter from the FSA County Supervisor to Lee A. Marsa, relocation officer, in Detroit.

### FROM ARKANSAS

The evacuee farmer relocated from Arkansas Center in 1943 and worked for a farm near Lapeer on a salary basis during the summer. Of that year in the winter, he earned additional capital in a Detroit war plant. Since he had been a truck farmer and produce man in California, he returned to Lapeer in the spring and on the basis of recommendations from his former employer and the County Agent, who he had met the proceeding summer his loan was approved. Since machinery, including a truck, was leased with the farm, the money loaned was used entirely for operating expenses. Security consisted of a mortgage on the crops to be grown this year. Although the farm was hampered in the earlier part of the season with difficulty in obtaining satisfactory labor, workers were finally recruited from the center and the crops were not seriously affected.

### LOAN SUCCESSFUL

The FSA man writes, "From present indications I believe that the loan will be a financial success as well as giving the applicant an establishment of his own. The farmer's two children attend a rural school near the farm and the family states that the children like their school work very much and are getting along better than they did in California. Produce is marketed on the eastern market in Detroit."

"This family is making an attempt to get along in the community and seem to be succeeding well. They exchange work and use of machinery with the neighbors and also have attained some valuable advice as to farming practices," the letter concludes.

## Iowa School Offers Courses

West Technical High School, Des Moines, Iowa, War Training Division is currently offering welding, machine shop, drafting, and power machine operation courses. These courses are offered to both men and women. Persons may apply at the school personally.

Men, particularly from the welding classes average over \$70 per week on day shift and others average over \$80 per week on night shift.

Anyone desiring to get rapid, efficient training in any of these courses to go into well-paying jobs, should come immediately to Des Moines on community invitation and get enrolled for school work and take a part-time job, if necessary for maintenance while in school, according to Frank E. Gibbs, relocation officer.

# Squeeze 9-0 Win At Canal

An unusually large crowd of football fans saw the invading Butte gridsters capture the Canal eleven by a score of 9-0 Sunday afternoon in an unlimited exponent clash played on the Canal gridiron.

The Butte eleven scored their touchdown early in the first quarter. The winners started their offensive march from their own forty yard line and got into scoring position on the five yard line on line bucks by Hank Kanemoto and off tackles and end sweeps by Min Sakaguchi. Hank Kanemoto, hit pay dirt after three successive line bucks. Min Sakaguchi's extra point kick failed. Butte added three extra points in the third quarter when Min Sakaguchi kicked a field goal from the twenty-five yard line.

On several occasions the Canal eleven came knocking deep into Butte territory but was stopped every time by the charges of the Butte line, and as a result the game ended 9-0 in favor of the Butte eleven.

## MORE ON SEABROOK

In Bridgeton, a town of 1500 located a few miles from Seabrook Farms, stores, restaurants, and other public places have given unqualified welcome to Japanese, citizens and aliens alike. A bus runs between the Farm and the town every Saturday for shopping tours. He feels that by this time most of the family people are settled and content.

### LITTLE SOCIALS

There is still a number of jobs and housing available for single people, but he feels single people are not satisfied at Seabrook because there is not enough social activity.

Two-thirds of the apartments that have been built for family groups are still vacant and more are being built. All the vacant ones are brand new and clean. No family at Seabrook has paid any rent for his living accommodations nor will be expected

# EAGLES TROUNCE BOBCATS; TAKES THIRD STRAIGHT WIN

The Butte High Eagles dumped the Bobcats of Canal by an impressive score of 32-0 on the Butte CAS gridiron Saturday afternoon.

The Eagles scored in almost every period as they crossed the pay line twice in the first quarter, once in the second,

and twice in the last.

In the first quarter, fullback Charlie Yamaguchi scored the initial touchdown from the four yard line on an off tackle play. Right end Shig Kawata placed a kick through the uprights for the extra point. In the same quarter Yosh Yamaguchi followed with the second touchdown as he smashed through from the one yard line. In the second quarter Yosh Yamaguchi scored again as he took a reverse from quarterback Teruo Katayama from the four yard line and bucked through for the winners' third touchdown to put the Eagles ahead at half time by a score of 14-0.

In the last quarter, a Bobcat punt from their own ten yard line was blocked by Jim Kataoka and recovered by left end Jim Taniguchi in the end zone to give the winners another touchdown. Shig Kawata's kick was again good for an extra point. Willie Mukai scored the final touchdown as he ran back a punt for a forty five yard touchdown. The Eagles' attempt for an extra point failed and the game ended with the Butte High Eagles on the victorious end of a 32-0 score.

### WAGE RISE

Recently the WLB authorized a wage increase so that now persons at Seabrook are paid a starting wage of 60¢ an hour for men and 50¢ for women. Mr. Kawamura figures that this is equivalent to 85¢ or 90¢ in Chicago or Cleveland and that housing at Seabrook is better than that available by evacuees in any of the larger cities until they have been there for a considerable length of time. In addition, Seabrook pays a 2½% bonus at Christmas time for all hours worked during the preceding year to every worker who is per-

manent. As soon as a worker acquires a permanent status he is admitted to the Union. Most of the evacuees expect to enter the Union in December. The production record at Seabrook during the last three months has proved to the management that Japanese workers are more efficient than white or Negro workers. Consequently, Mr. Seabrook is anxious to staff his plant with Japanese workers 100% and shall assure them top wages and ideal post-war opportunities.

### 'HAVE MADE GOOD'

"Japanese Americans at Seabrook have made good. For anyone who wishes to return to normal life as soon as possible, Seabrook is the best place," Mr. Kawamura concluded. "Anyone who wishes to discuss the matter personally with him is invited to his home at 31-13-B."
