### RAFTSMEN BUILD 800 MODEL SHIPS

The Navy flier hunting enemy targets in Philippine waters will spot warships faster because he first learned their outlines through ship models made by Japanese American ver Relocation Center, the WRA reported last week.

Young Americans, with Japanese names and faces, built nearly 800 models of a n d Japanese, German, American ships for the Navy in the ship model shop at this center.

VALUE

The value of the miniature craft is estimated at \$25,000 in monotary terms. They are considered of inestimable value in teaching new Navy personnel attending ship identification training classes, the characteristics of ships of various types and nations. Except for materials the work was done at no cost to the Mavy, the WRA reports.

The pocket-size counterparts of World War II warships range in size from two inches to two feet. The fleet, fashioned from poplar, scrap pine, and tin cans, include d small replicas of the Ger-Tirpitz, man battleship German cruiser Prinz Eugen, the German destroyer Koln, a number of submarines and many PT boats.

SPECIAL JOBS one of the scale model Prinz Eugons was presented to Mrs. Roosevelt, when she visited the center, as a gift to the President. One of two special jobs, a seven foot fully operative minature of the Cruise'r Cleveland was placed on display in a Naval laboratory in New York City, The other special undertaking valued at \$1200 was an eight-foot roplica of the U. S'. S. South Dekota, with all parts operative above the waterline.

One particular for two-foot long called precision minatures of a number of models of Japanese ships. These, scaled down to exact detail and valued at \*60 each, were produced at the rate of 40 a month.

law permitting an American citizen to renounce The craftsmen in the Gila Ri- his citizenship, while residing in this country or its outlying possessions, is now operative, following the recent publication of procedures in the Federal Regis-

> No application will be accepted unless it is submitted in accordance with the regulations. Only individual applications will be considered.

> Information received in Washington from the field indicates that few evacuees will take action under the new law.

> The Department of Justice has indicated that no renunciation will be granted without careful examination of the facts and the reasons motivating the application Requests for renunciation from citizens who are motivated by a desire to avoid Selective Service or othor legal obligations, will be subject to particular scrutiny.

Highlights of the procedure follows:

The applicant forwards to the Attorney General his application for renunciation of citizenship, on the prescribed form, together with specified citizenship documents. Forms may be secured from the Attorney General as soon as they are printed. In the event the requested ronunciation does not appear contrary to the interests of national .defense, a hearing is conducted by a hearing officer whom the Attorney General designates. The applicant is notified of the time and place of hearing.

After the hearing the applicant may file formal renunciation of citizenship on a prescribed for m and request its approval. The hearing officer recommends approval or disapproval to the Attorney General. This officer is authorized also to consider results of investigations and available records from government agencies and other sources.

A renunciation of citizenship does not become ef-

fective until the Attorney General approves it. Notice of approval or disapproval is given the applicant. If approval is granted, other stimpulated government agencies are notified so that the renunciation may be recorded on specified documents pertaining to the applicant.


