"I have interviewed a great miny of our Japanese Americans at Seabrook in the past months and have made a point of finding out whether Mr. Seabrook's guarantee is proving true. That guarantee is that he will provide pay at the straight hourly rate and on an' annual basis equal to an average minimum work wook of 48 hours. In all of the interviews, I found not one who had fallen below an average of 48 working hours a week. Of course, more working hours will be available in summer than in winter. WAGES

"Another runor you mentioned is that Japanese workers are paid lower wages than non - Japanese workers in comparable service. As a matter of fact, our Japanese American men have been storted at 55¢ on hour which is 5¢ above the usual starting wage. This is done on the basis that our Japanese Americans are experienced. It should be remembered that Mr. Seabrook desires t o obtain the Japanese Wo want to emphasize here that an increase of 5¢ in ing hourly rate for men 60¢. .
