Election Approaches

Candidate for the positions of community councilmen for Butte and Canal for the new 1945 term total 135 men, the largest since the councils were organized in this center.

NEW FACES

One can see from the list of candidates that new men formerly of Jerome have served to bolster the roster of candidates. So have other residents who, in the face of the continued relocation of leaders, are rising to the occasion. The material is surely there--135 strong; it now rests on the residents to do something about it, come December 12.

Too often residents demand of their candidates all those qualities of courage, decision, leadership, and energy; and as often they themselves are unwilling to give councilmen even a semblance of interest, let alone active support. When there's trouble in the air,

it's "councilman to the fore; what did we elect you for?" When the sailing is smooth it's "by the way, who is our councilman?"

MORE INTEREST?

But this time, the fact that enough people took interest in the nomination to put up the unusually large number of candidates may indicate a strengthened interest in representative government. We should like to see this followed up on election day with a record turn-out of voters, each intent on selecting a man who will work for the best for the most and in whom residents have faith and trust.

The election commissions of both Butte and Canal will soon be announcing the registration of voters and the location of polls. Each voter might well remember that in the few moments that are required to place the check mark at the polls he will be deciding his representative for the next half year.

**PROPERTY INFORMATION
ON NOTES MORTGAGES**

(Here is the fourth of a series of five articles dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

Evacuees who wish to collect debts owed them may do so with the aid of the Property Office if they will supply complete information to that office.

GIVE ADEQUATE DATA

The date of the note or the date the debt was made; explanation of how and for what the debt was made (for work done, goods purchased, etc.); the original amount of the debt, rate of interest and the plan of repayment agreed upon; the balance due, name and address of the debtor; and any evidence of the debt, such as a note, mortgage, purchase contract, etc., should be given to the Property Office to speed collection.

Where an evacuee wishes to rent or lease property he should supply the Property Office with an accurate description and the location of the property. He should specify rental rates but must keep in mind that OPA rent ceilings may apply and that where they exist rental rates cannot be raised unless proper authorization from the OPA is given. Such permission is usually hard to get. Complete details about the terms of leases, length of lease desired and other special terms should be given to the Property Office.

LAND LEASING

In cases where farm land is to be rented out or leased, it is important that the evacuee supply the Property Office with complete details about irrigation assessments, electricity bills, water district taxes, methods of determining shares when share rent is desired, use of farm equipment left on the farm, building insurance as well as the evacuee's desires regarding all other leasing specifications.

Dates for payment of rent and expiration of leases should be specified to the Property Office. The Property Office can also help the evacuee in handling matters such as inspection of property, fire insurance, vandalism and pilferage.

STORAGE SPACE

Evacuees should understand that as long as the military exclusion order remains in effect the WRA will provide storage space for property left in the evacuated area or left in a center by an evacuee who either relocates or is inducted into the armed forces.

On the other hand the WRA cannot assume responsibility.

WRA OFFICE MAY OPEN IN HEART OF PITTSBURGH

On the recommendation of Council of Churches of Allegheny County, Pa., steps are being taken to open a WRA office in the city of Pittsburgh in the heart of the "arsenal of democracy," Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes Area supervisor, announced.

PROGRAM ENDORSED

The executive committee of the Council last week unanimously endorsed the program to relocate Japanese Americans, and announced its action publicly in the three daily metropolitan papers. Prominent, favorable publicity was given to the story on the front pages.

Steps are now being

taken by the Council to form a citizens resettlement committee of prominent residents in all walks of life to assist the WRA in obtaining employment and housing for the evacuees.

Pittsburgh is a labor shortage area. The classified advertisement in the papers show a great need for men as laborers in the steel mills, as accountants, cooks, auto mechanics, machine operators, bakery workers, domestics, as professional people, radio service men, stock clerks, produce workers, and others. Advertisements for women also are endless, calling for such artisans as bookkeepers, beauticians, bakery workers, commercial artists, domestics, clerks, cooks, dental assistants, factory workers, clothing workers, nurses, vegetable trimmers, and others.

JOBS WILL OPEN

Many of these jobs will undoubtedly be opened up for evacuees as soon as a permanent WRA official is appointed and an office is established, Cullum said. He added he expected to open such an office in a few days.

Buyer Reports General Scarcity

Bunji Ikenoue, general manager of the Co-op, returned Wednesday night from a buying trip to Chicago, Denver, and Salt Lake City.

Ikenoue stated that merchandise of all kinds are scarce in the nation and are very hard to get, and residents in the center are fortunate to have the things which are available.

ability for the storage or care of a relocated evacuee's property at the point of relocation. This includes property of evacuees who were inducted after relocation. The WRA will, however, assist in moving the household, personal and commercial property of evacuee going out on indefinite leave from a relocation center.

PROPERTY OF INDUCTEES

Any evacuee inducted into the armed services and who wants the WRA to store property he has left in a relocation center or on the West Coast should designate some person to represent him in dealing with the WRA.

Any evacuee wishing to have personal or commercial property picked up and stored must fill out Form WRA - 155. The form must be filled out, signed and witnessed. It must be signed by the owner or for him by someone who holds power of attorney.

STORAGE TRANSFER

Evacuees who wish property stored by them in a commercial warehouse or in private storage transferred to a WRA warehouse must pay storage costs that have accrued before the WRA can move such property to a WRA warehouse. Warehousing receipts must be supplied by the evacuee.

The WRA maintains warehouses at Seattle, Portland, Sacramento, Stockton, Fresno, Watsonville, Los Angeles and San Francisco for storing evacuee property.

LINOTYPIST GETS AFL MEMBERSHIP

Full membership in the Rochester, N.Y., Local #15 of the International Typographical Union, AFL, has been enjoyed for the past several months by Harry T. Yasuda, former linotypist of San Francisco, Honolulu and Delta, Utah, who relocated to Rochester last June from the Central Utah Relocation Center. In the near future he hopes to bring East his wife and 7-year-old son Stanley, who now reside at 40-4-A, Central Utah.

The secretary of the union local, the Ledger Printing and Publishing Co. of Rochester, and the Rochester relocation officer, Calude C. Cornwall, all cooperated in arranging for Yasuda to take the linotypist's job which he has held in the printing company's union shop since three days after his arrival in Rochester last June.

"Everybody in Rochester has been swell to me and the union members have been especially friendly," Yasuda said recently. "They treat me like one of the boys. They're really fine fellows. I don't know all the members personally, but all our monthly union meetings even strangers come over to ask me how I'm getting along. I like my job and the shop where I work, too."
