ELECTION

Nomination Still Possible

Additional nominations for the officer of councilmen may be made in writing if signed by not less than 15 qualified electors and if filed with the election commission not less than 5 days before election, Yoichi Nakase, chairman of the Butte election commission, announced yesterday.

All eligible voters must register at their respective block manager's office on or before Saturday, December 9. All evanece residents, 18 years of age or over, are eligible to vote.

It is important, he stated, that all eligible residents participate actively and with interest in the selection of their councilmen. Among those winning promotions is Staff Sergeant Koji N. Yoshimoto, 28-2-C, Gila River Relocation Center, Rivers, Arizona, formerly of Reedley, California. He will be promoted to Technical Sergeant.

Financial Help For Nisei Cases

The Pacific Citizen

I have noted the statement in Saburo Kido's column of October 21 that Wayne Collins spent \$2,000 of his own money in the Korematsu case and that James Purcell has spent about \$3,000 of his own money in the Endo case. No mention is made of the time the attorneys have spent on these cases, to the detriment of their own private practices.

As a matter of fact, the Northern California Branch of the A.C.L.U. has thus far spent exactly \$1465.16 for the printing of Mr. Collins' briefs in the Korematsu case, while Mr. Collins has contributed the substantial cost of making two trips to Washington besides months of time in working on the case.

Mr. Collins has also prepared briefs for the Northern California Branch of the A.C.L.U. in the Hirabayashi, Yasui, Endo, and Kegan cases. The branch has spent exactly \$739.46 in the printing and filing of these briefs and Mr. Collins has not been compensated for his work.

I venture to say that if Mr. Collins were compensated for all the work he has done in these Japanese test cases in accordance with usual fees in the legal profession the bill would run into five figures.

Sixty per cent of the money the branch expended on the Japanese test cases came out of its reserve funds. While we haven't solicited funds from the Japanese in support of these cases, it is interesting to note that out of our expenditure of \$2,224.62 not one cent has been contributed by any person of Japanese ancestry.

FOR THE NISEI CAUSE

The letter printed on the side column prompted this reply from a T. Kako to the Pacific Citizen, 415 Beacon Building, Salt Lake City, 1, Utah:

Editor, The Pacific Citizen

Dear Sir:

The Ernest Besig letter as director of the Northern California Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union addressed to you in the November 4 issue of the Pacific Citizen astounded me. That the various cases waged on behalf of the civil and citizenship rights of Japanese Americans have been carried on solely without the financial support of those who would derive the most benefit shows an astonishing lack of gratefulness on the part of those of Japanese descent.

One reads how Red Cross and bond drives top quotas in the centers. One sees of many Nisei earning wartime salaries. Apparent, too, are many Nisei enterprises prosperous and thriving. In the face of this, the fact that the efforts of our Caucasian friends go unrecognized is indeed a strange and paradoxical situation.

It so happens that I am an Issei with children who are American citizens. Though I am an alien "ineligible to citizenship," I feel strongly that the rights which our boys are fighting to maintain overseas should be preserved intact at home. The maintenance of civil rights is one of the homefront battle.

This is a continuing battle, and I am sure as others of Japanese descent become aware of the imperative necessity for this effort, financial support will be forthcoming. To start the ball rolling, I am hereby enclosing my check for \$50. Please convey this to Mr. Ernest Besig with my apologies on behalf of those who are the recipients of their efforts. Express also my confidence that others like myself will join in and that ingratitudes is not a quality which can be attributed to Japanese Americans.

EVACUEE PROPERTY

Shipping Information

(This is the concluding article in a series of five dealing with the services and limitations of the evacuee property program.)

An evacuee who wishes to arrange for shipment of personal property must request such shipment by filling out Form WRA-156, signing it and having the signature witnessed. Complete information should be given on the form.

Evacuees are entitled to free shipment of their household or personal effects from the original point of storage to a center or a point of relocation or, if they already have them in a center, to a point of relocation from the center. Evacuees wishing to have personal property shipped from a center to the point of relocation should make their requests to the Project Director of the project from which they moved.

The WRA will furnish help to the evacuee to get information on transportation costs when the evacuee wishes to have a private company ship his property. Request for such help should be made on Form WRA-153.

In the matter of shipping commercial property, the property office will help the evacuee arrange for shipment to any point he desires but the cost of ship-

CANAL LISTS PRINCIPLES FOR AUDITORIUM USE

The ten principles for the usage of the Canal High School auditorium were drawn up by a committee composed of representatives from Canal High School, Canal High PTA, Community Council, Elementary School, Elementary School PTA, CAS, James L. Shelly, and W. C. Sawyer.

The principles are:

1. The custody of the Canal High School auditorium shall remain with the Canal High School principal, who is responsible to the WRA for all movable property therein. He shall retain the keys, and charge any other organization using the facilities with the care of all property therein.

2. Smoking shall be positively prohibited. Organizations using the auditorium shall request the police or firemen to enforce the "no smoking" instructions.

3. Community activities and education sections shall be the only sections authorized to schedule events in the auditorium. Community activities shall pass on requests of all other than school groups for use of this facility.

4. School activities shall have the right of use of the auditorium from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

5. In the use of the auditorium, no attachments shall be made to the floor or walls except through approval of the custodian.

6. The auditorium shall not be used for carnivals.

7. There shall be no objection to use of the auditorium for activities charging admissions, so long as they are within project regulation.

8. Banquets may be held by unanimous consent of the afore named groups represented at this meeting. Light refreshments may be served incident to a social affair, subject to the approval of the custodian.

9. Auditorium may be used for athletics if the floor is safe in the estimation of the custodian.

10. Parties using auditorium are responsible for returning it to the same condition as it was found.

CIGARETTE

Pack A Person Ration Starts

Due to the cigarette shortage, the rule that one person will be allowed to purchase one package of cigarettes providing he brings an empty pack with the Co-op stamp on it will be effective from this Friday, Dec. 8, at all canteens. Every package will be stamped with a co-op stamp.

As the Co-op will try its best in equal distribution, all the residents are asked for their co-operation.

The cigarette shortage is acute all over the nation, Bunji Ikenoue, general manager pointed out. In Chicago, at stores where cigarettes are still available, there were long queues of purchasers. Another instance showing the evidence of the unusual value placed on cigarettes these days was the scene outside the post office in Chicago where they had the semi-annual auction of unclaimed merchandises which included cartons of cigarettes. The cigarettes were moved across the town to a warehouse in an armored car with the shotgun ready. A pack sold, for as high as 88 cents.

OREGON LEGION DROPS 16 NISEI

The names of 16 Nisei now serving in the U.S. Army were erased by the Hood River (Ore.) Post of the American Legion from the county's war memorial, said Jess Edington, commander, according to an AP release. Many of these soldiers are serving on overseas battle fronts.

He also stated he would try to exclude all Japanese from Hood River valley.



TOOELE WANTS MORE WORKERS

Additional workers are needed at the Tooele Ordnance Depot in Utah. Persons interested should contact the relocation offices of either camp.

At present there are three wives employed as secretaries to the officers at Tooele, and three as munitions checkers. More women are needed as beauty operators, secretaries, munitions checkers, and domestics.

A nursery school is available for children from two to six years of age, provided the mothers are working.

A liaison officer has been appointed to greet new arrivals, see that they are properly housed, and to look after the interests of the evacuees working in the depot.

NO COOKING

Cooking classes which are being conducted in both camps by Dr. Grace Lawson, chief dietitian, will not be held this week, because she is ill.

SEABROOK CALLS FOR EMPLOYEES

Thirty-one more families and fifty more unattached workers are needed by Seabrook. Women are preferred for the unattached workers but men will be acceptable.

On November 23, 1944, there were 477 Japanese Americans employed at Seabrook Farms. Of this number 350 are men and 127 are women. There are a total of 134 families living at Seabrook.

Further information concerning Seabrook Farms may be secured by the relocation office, 69-8.

ment, including packing, crating, loading, etc., must be paid by the evacuee.

However, the WRA will pay for shipment to points of relocation tools and equipment of an evacuee's trade, business or profession, including farm machinery and equipment sufficient for a family-sized venture (but not over 5000 pounds shipping weight per family) if the relocation officer in the community in which the evacuee relocates or intends to relocate will certify that the use of such tools, equipment or fixtures is necessary to the evacuee's successful relocation and that they cannot be replaced locally at the time because of wartime shortages.

All shipments must be made by freight unless the items are difficult to send safely by freight because of high value or small size. Furthermore, if the Project Director or relocation officer certifies on Form WRA-156 that express shipment is necessary in the interest of the relocation program, goods may be sent by express. Express shipments at government expense may not exceed 500 pounds shipping weight.

Evacuees should consult with and ask the advice of the property office in all matters pertaining to shipment of all types of goods, sale of all types of property or in matters involving rentals, leases, taxes or disputes arising from contracts.

The property office, of which there is one on every project, has been established for the purpose of aiding the evacuee. While its functions necessarily are limited, it can be of help to the evacuee in solving many types of individual problems. The evacuee is welcome at the property office and should avail himself of the services offered.
