At any rate the need for a good PTA should not be under-estimated as it seems to be by some parents, if attendance at meetings is any criterion.

A little consideration will surely show that what youngsters got cut of school now will be the basis upon which they develop later. Influences here will leave deep grooves that will shape their characters for life. Guidance and discipline new is a must.

ions for improvement, and commendations when meritod.

All visiting regu-CATION HEAD lations in hospitals are made first, for the wel-fare of the average patient and second, for the. efficient functioning of the institution. It is necessary for the patients' welfare that a hospital-be quiet; loud talking, confusion, or any unnecessary noise often delay recovery.
"For these reasons it

is suggested that:

"(1) Parents and re-latives of small children in the hospital contact the nurse in charge of the floor before visiting the patient, since occasional-ly small children react unfavorably toward visits from rolatives.

"(2) That visitors during the regular come visiting hours when pos-sible and enter the front door of the hospital stopping at the receptionist's desk before going to the ward.

"(3) That relatives of very ill patients get permission for special visit-

"(4) That soldiers home on leave having relatives in the hospital visit the nursing office to got special permits.

"We are asking soldiers and civilians alike to cooperate with us. We are asking you all to observe regular visiting hours unless there are special conditions present. Then we shall be glad to help you in any way can."
