PARENTS TEACHERS

"PTA" is a common and dull sounding term, made even duller by its very familiarity. Maybe Parents Teachers Association spelled out would arouse some fathers and mothers into feeling more involved. Perhaps we should go further and call it "The Future of Our Children" or "Will My Boy Succeed?" At any rate the need for a good PTA should not be under-estimated as it seems to be by some parents, if attendance at meetings is any criterion.

A little consideration will surely show that what youngsters get out of school now will be the basis upon which they develop later. Influences here will leave deep grooves that will shape their characters for life. Guidance and discipline now is a must.

Because we are in a "RA" center and know that children cannot go far beyond the fence is no reason why parents should relax their vigilance. And it is not the barrack buildings or the lack of facilities that should take all the blame in case of poor showing of students. It could well be the attitude of the students themselves, who in turn often reflect the attitude of parents that is to blame.

A high school principal reports a marked drop in scholarship of his students. Students who passed through the first year of heat, dust, and bare barracks are now lagging--in the face of improved conditions, a new auditorium, science buildings, lawns, etc. Why?

Questions such as these can best be met and answered by parents and teachers who coordinate their efforts through PTA meetings. It should not be that parents are coaxed to join and attend by membership drives. It should not be that parents are lured to meetings by interesting programs, nor should they come just to listen to reports from the faculty. It is for parents to come willingly for the sake of young students. It is for parents to give criticisms, suggestions for improvement, and commendations when merited.

The "PTA" will be as dull or as interesting and useful as participants make it.

DR. YAMAMOTO DIES IN IOWA

Dr. Tetsuo Yamamoto, former Gila and a resident of San Francisco, Calif. prior to evacuation, died Tuesday in Des Moines, Iowa, where he was engaged in the dentistry profession.

Dr. Yamamoto had practiced dentistry in San Francisco for about 25 years and was active in civic affairs there.

After evacuation he resided at 74-2-3 in Gila and was a dentist at the Rivers community hospital.

He is survived by his wife, Tomoko; son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Vorlin Yamamoto; and a granddaughter, all of Des Moines.

HOSPITAL ANNOUNCES VISITING REGULATIONS

The Rivers hospital this week released the following suggestions and requests concerning visiting of patients:

"Visits to a patient in the hospital can assist in the recovery of a patient; it is often the best medicine a patient can have. On the other hand visits may be the worse thing for him. All visiting regulations in hospitals are made first, for the welfare of the average patient and second, for the efficient functioning of the institution. It is necessary for the patients' welfare that a hospital be quiet; loud talking, confusion, or any unnecessary noise often delay recovery.

VOCATION HEAD LEAVES RIVERS

Fred W. Shaefer, who had been acting as vocational guidance counselor since January of this year, left last week for Santa Ana, Calif., where he has taken up residence, announced W.C. "Tom" Sawyer, superintendent of education.

His position probably will not be filled before the first of the year, said Sawyer. In the meantime, his work with vocational trainees has been assumed permanently by Ralph Othmer, vocational training supervisor.

The testing, measurements and other guidance functions of his office are at low ebb at this time of year, and no one has been assigned to continue them for the present.

"For these reasons it is suggested that: (1) Parents and relatives of small children in the hospital contact the nurse in charge of the floor before visiting the patient, since occasionally small children react unfavorably toward visits from relatives. (2) That visitors come during the regular visiting hours when possible and enter the front door of the hospital stopping at the receptionist's desk before going to the ward. (3) That relatives of very ill patients get permission for special visiting. (4) That soldiers home on leave having relatives in the hospital visit the nursing office to get special permits. We are asking soldiers and civilians alike to cooperate with us. We are asking you all to observe regular visiting hours unless there are special conditions present. Then we shall be glad to help you in any way we can."

DR. KEHOE DISCUSSES LIFE IN WRA CENTER

Dr. Monika Kehoe, formerly director of the adult education program in this center, discusses life in the center in an article, "Issai and Nisei," published in the *Friends Intelligence of Philadelphia*. Dr. Kehoe is now an instructor in the department of personnel services at the Brooklyn College.

She asks what a fifteen-year-old Nisei boy would think in a civics class at a relocation center high school when the teacher discusses "the democratic way of life". She tells of the father who is released from an internment camp and tagged as a "parolee" for a crime that he has not committed, the struggle of women who try to learn the English language and American customs to fit themselves for the dreaded adventure of relocation.

She states the necessity of speedy relocation of these families now under the tension in the artificial organizations of center life and the assistance all must give for the readjustment of these people to the normal pursuits of life in a community where tolerance and understanding prevail.

Poston Evacuee Returns To L.A.

Tadayuki Todah, 54-year-old naturalized Japanese from Poston, returned to his home in Los Angeles with full approval of Army authorities last Tuesday, according to the *L.A. Times*.

While still a Japanese citizen, he volunteered in the World War I and served with the United States Army. In 1937 he applied for citizenship and received his naturalization papers.

Todah's release from Poston is the first resulting from actions brought in Federal Court in behalf of several native-born American Japanese and others who have been naturalized.

Resettlers Get Financial Help

How security for resettlers is provided by public and private agencies is shown in a newly issued report from the Middle Atlantic Area relocation office. Included in the report are a number of actual examples of assistance to resettlers in meeting health, financial, and family problems.

Copies of the report in English can now be obtained from the local relocation program office. That office will also soon have available copies in a Japanese translation which is now in preparation.

The report describes the following typical examples of assistance to resettlers provided by public and private agencies:

Two families were aided in resuming housekeeping by grants of \$100 and \$195, respectively, from social security funds; an Issai who lost his savings was granted funds for his immediate needs by the Social Security Board; several sick individuals were provided with free medical care in hospitals and clinics; and Issai who

Canal High School's net profit from the carnival held last month totaled \$588.91, announced J.P. McVey, principal. As agreed upon earlier, the proceeds were distributed in the following manner:

The youngsters expected to be snubbed when they enrolled in the suburban high school this fall and were prepared to take it with a smile. They undoubtedly are happy that the hatred of America's enemy doesn't include everyone of Japanese des-

cent.

"I'll admit I was a little worried when I first saw these little fellows at school," Coach Graydon Ashton admitted, "but my worries were wasted. They proved themselves true Americans and it didn't take long for other students to accept them as such.

"They are awfully small but are quick and willing to learn. I can use them nicely."

Kanemine, a sophomore, is a native of Los Angeles; Murekiyo, a junior, is from Monrovia. The former stands 5 feet 5, the latter 5 feet 4. Both are without previous basket ball experience,
