GILA ARCHITECT WINS \$750 PRIZE

Kenneth M. Nishimoto, 37, former Los Angeles architect now residing at 44-1-3, was notified last Wednesday he has won the \$750 third prize in a national architecture competition sponsored by the Bituminous Coal Institute of Cincinnati, Ohio.

The problem presented to competitors was to design an ideal post-war house of a given size on a given lot, incorporating modern facilities and equipment, and providing a basement for recreation.

A graduate of the College of Architecture of the University of Southern California, Nishimoto was granted a license in 1941 and practiced in Los Angeles. He worked for several Los Angeles architects and also for J. P. Davidson and Paul T. Frankl, both designers. Previously he has won two prizes in Southern California contests and a honorable mention in a national competition.

William S. Fukuda and his wife and 3 children were the first Japanese American family to return to the Orange County farm last Saturday since the evacuation of May, 1942. stated the L. A. Times. Also with them was Shigeo Fukuda, William's brother, who received an honorable discharge from the U.S. Army.

The Fukudas who were farming in Colorado, were given permission by the Western Defense Command after about 60 days of investigation by the governmental agencies.

The family was given a warm welcome on their return home by the neighbors, and the children resumed their classes in Placencia school from Monday.

CANAL MOVIES IN AUDITORIUM

CO-OP RESOLUTION LOOKS TO THE FUTURE

WHEREAS, the Delegates from eight Center Business Enterprises to the Third All Center Enterprises Conference, being held at Gila Project, Rivers, Arizona, under the sponsorship of the Federation of Center Business Enterprises, are gravely concerned with the multi-phases of problems attendant to the eventual liquidations faced by all the center cooperatives, and

WHEREAS, the Delegates recognize the existence of a gap of time spanning the period between the final closing and liquidation of the center cooperatives and the completion of the general evacuation and exodus of the residents of the center, wherein no provisions are definitely established to and the residents are deprived thereby of the services and goods necessary and instrumental for their daily needs, and

WHEREAS, the Delegates, at its General Assembly, had reached to an unanimous conclusion that the formation of a definite policy pertinent to and the establishment to that end wherein the residents are afforded a mean to acquire and purchase such necessary services and goods are primarily the responsibilities of each Project Director as well as that of the War Relocation Authority,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the War Relocation Authority be requested to give serious thought to the problem and formulate a definite policy and establish or cause to be established a mean or means, at minimum prices consistent to the best interest and the benefit of the residents and thereby give assurance to and render relief to each center cooperative of its moral obligation.

A SAFE CHRISTMAS

Director Dillon Myer has issued a request for a "Safe Christmas" campaign this year. His statement follows:

"Each Christmas hundreds of homes and many lives are lost by fire throughout the United States. The gayest hours of the year have too often become scenes of tragedy. The causes of these fires are well known to fire protection officials and can be prevented.

"The traditional festivities of the Yule season can have tragic results if precautionary measures are not taken. Therefore, it is fitting to request each WRA center and the Emergency Refugee Shelter to do their utmost to promote a 'Safe Christmas' campaign this year in an effort to maintain our present perfect record of no fires nor loss of life from Christmas activities."

HEART OF AN AMERICAN

The following editorial appeared in the Omaha World Herald, November 28, 1944.

"I have the face of a Japanese but my heart is American," said T/Sgt. Bon Kuroki in revealing here that the War Department has granted his request for assignment to combat duty in the Pacific.

Speaking before a group of transplanted Nisei (Japanese Americans shunted from the West Coast) this modest soldier from Hershey, Nebraska, who flew with the first Liberator Squadron over Europe, told of his ambition to fly over Tokyo in a bomber.

His words might well be pondered by some, perhaps well-intentioned, who have the face of Americans but the hearts of bigots so far as Bon Kuroki and his minority group of Americans are concerned.

ELECTION INCIDENT READERS SYMPATHIZE

Many letters of sympathy from nearly every state were received by Pvt. Raymond Matsuda of Poston who had been ejected from a barber shop in Parker, Ariz., recently, according to an AP release.

Parts of the letters from some of the people to Matsuda, a war-crippled Nisei, read:

"You are just as good an American as any of us."

"There are a good many boys like you who are or will be coming home again. Some of them are mixed nationalities, some German, some Japanese, some Chinese... You're all our boys."

"I would like to have you spend your convalescence at our farm home where you would be most welcome."

WASHINGTON OFFERS JOBS IN JAPANESE TRANSLATION

One hundred positions are open for persons as Japanese language translators, writers and type-setters in Japanese, and Japanese-style artists and illustrators. Applicants for translator positions must have a very good command of English as well as Japanese. No Japanese is required of persons applying as artists. For the writer positions, it is preferable that applicants have some education in Japan and Japanese journalistic experience.

The beginning salary for all of these positions is approximately \$2800.

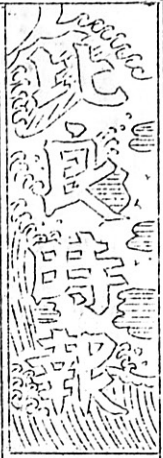
