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ARMY LIFTS COAST BAN

HUSO TELLS OF EASTERN TRIP

William Huso, relocation program officer, returned from a detail to the N.Y. relocation office for four weeks. On his return trip he called on former Gilana at Seabrook and on WRA offices at Savannah, Ga., and New Orleans, La.

At the N.Y. office he met many employers and evacuees who had newly arrived and were seeking employment. "Evacuees already resettled there," said Huso, "had a high regard for the efficiency of the office, and this is understandable because of the type of people who were assisting evacuees with their problems." He found that relocation officers were men of broad background with knowledge of employment opportunities and social problems.

VARIETY OF JOBS

Huso stated that there were a wide variety of jobs in various skills and trades. In many cases it is impractical to develop a job for a relocatee until he is on the spot for placement. He felt that a person going out should to some degree know what he contemplates doing so that a relocation office can explore for the type of job he wants. Too many he said were not too clear in their minds about what kind of a job they were after.

OPPORTUNITIES NOW

"I believe," said Huso, "that evacuees should take advantage of the many opportunities now." The employment market is abundant and there is a strong chance of getting into work which will carry on through any business recession which may come as a result of cutbacks.

The mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast will be lifted midnight, Jan. 2, 1945.

The Western Defense Command on Sunday, Dec. 17, issued the necessary orders to terminate mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry from the Pacific Ocean coastal area.

The details of the revocation order will be explained in both English and Japanese through bulletins from Washington, which already have been sent out and are expected this week, probably today. As soon as they arrive, these bulletins will be distributed for residents to see.

The revocation proclamation, Public Proclamation No. 21, issued by Maj. Gen. H.C. Pratt, commanding general of the Western Defense, explains.

CONDITION WARRANTS

"The present military situation makes possible modification and relaxation of restrictions and the termination of the system of mass exclusion of persons of Japanese ancestry...and permits the substitution for mass exclusion of a system of individual determination and exclusion of those individuals whose presence within sensitive areas of the Western Defense Command is deemed a source of potential danger to the military security thereof."

ARMY MEN HERE

Army officers, as representatives of the Western Defense Command, have arrived at the center and starting this week will individually notify individuals whether they are free to enter the Western Defense Command area or are to be excluded. They will also notify those individuals whose cases have not yet been determined and will interview such individuals in order to determine their final status.

**FEELING SHOWS
IN ART WORK**

Yasuo Kuniyoshi, who was recently awarded a \$1000 prize in the Carnegie Institution of Pittsburgh's exhibit of Painting in the United States, stated that "If you feel something, it comes out in your work," according to an article in the PW Daily of Nov. 27.

His paintings run largely to abstract still-life and he says that you don't have to paint war scenes to reflect the war.

He is a chairman of the Arts Council of Japanese Americans for Democracy and a member of the Japanese American Committee for Democracy in New York.

"As a young boy of 13, he came to America and lived on peanuts for several days in Seattle and then went to Los Angeles where he attended the public school and began to study art."

**DETROIT HOSTEL
HAS FAMILY UNIT**

In order to make it possible for families to relocate to Detroit as complete units, Fellowship House, the hostel in the city of Detroit, has set aside a suite including cooking facilities for use by the family. A special rental of \$12.50 a week will be charged for the rooms and no time limit will be placed on the length of occupancy.

Inquiries regarding this suite should be made to the Rev. Shigeo Tanabe at the Fellowship House located at 130 East Grand Avenue, Detroit, Mich. This move closely mirrors what had been done by the hostels in both Cincinnati and Cleveland.

BAN LIFTING HEARDENED

The announcement of the lifting of the West coast ban of Japanese Americans hit the front pages of coast papers this week in streamer headlines that shoved war news to the background.

Most papers gave factual accounts of Maj. Gen. H.C. Pratt's proclamation, emphasizing that the return of evacuees will be gradual. At least two governors, Warren of California and Osborn of Arizona, have made public statements urging decency and tolerance and asking their citizens to maintain and protect the constitutional rights of loyal Japanese who return.

EVACUATION "RIGHT"

The United States Supreme Court Monday ruled 6 to 3 that the Army had a right to remove all Japanese from the West Coast in 1942 because American shores were "threatened by hostile forces."

It is presumed that the ruling applies to the Korematsu test case which had questioned the constitutionality of the evacuation.

The majority decision delivered by Justice Black upheld as an emergency measure the Army's edict issued in the mass evacuation of Japanese from the coast.

In the Mitsuye Endo case the court unanimously ordered her unconditional release from the Topaz Center. The tribunal ruled that the WRA had no right to detain loyal citizens under the circumstances.

FACT**SEEKS MINORITY GATHERING**

Calling upon President Roosevelt to issue invitations for a White House Conference on Minorities, the National JACL Conference held in Salt Lake City, Dec. 1-3, made a number of noteworthy decisions. In its petition to the President, the League pointed out that the domestic problem of minorities is of growing national concern, especially typified in the wartime treatment of persons of Japanese descent. The status of Orientals in the United States in relation to Asiatic policies were pointed out as necessary items for such Conference.

Particularly outstanding was the rehabilitation measure proposed for returning veterans. The as-

sembly moved that the farming projects developed by relocation center residents be made available to discharged veterans, especially to Nisei who have been evacuated and whose limited means make difficult their desire to reestablish themselves and families.

From appreciative letters received and comments of delegates to the National JACL Conference held in Salt Lake City, Dec. 1-3, the JACL sponsored tour of Pfc. Thomas Higa was lauded as the most outstanding boost to home-front morale among the Japanese-speaking Issei.

INCIDENTS TOLD OF EVACUEES GETTING AID

Incidents where resettlers in need have been helped by public and private agencies are told by relocation offices in New York City, Philadelphia,

Rochester, and Washington, D.C.

The case of a Nisei from Gila is an example of the valuable services provided by private social agencies. After living with his sister for eight months in Pennsylvania, where she had resided for five years, Mr. T. was called for Army induction. His physical examination revealed that he had tuberculosis. Expensive medical care was essential, many X-rays were required, and it was important for Mr. T. to quit work and rest. Furthermore, because of his condition, it was not wise for him to continue living in his sister's crowded home. The relocation office arranged for the necessary medical care and X-rays to be provided without cost to him. They also arranged for his support until he could go back to work and obtained for him a separate room near his sister's house.

An old man from Heart Mountain had saved over \$300. This 61-year-old Issei came East with his wife and their 17-year-old Nisei daughter. Mr. C., an artist, had definite plans for his family's future, which included working a while to save some more money and then opening his own studio, as he had done in California. At this time, Mr. C. broke his glasses. A new pair at regular rates would cost about \$30 and the expense would oblige him to delay the opening of his studio. But the social agency arranged for him to be given an excellent eye examination for fifty cents and perfectly fitted glasses for only \$2.75.

Nisei Nurses

The County Hospital advisory committee in San Diego, Calif., opposed the acceptance of Nisei girls for training in the hospital's nursing school last Tuesday, stated the L.A. Times.

The resolution was adopted in response to a query from the State War Council to the director or nurses at the hospital.

One of the advocates of the resolution, D.C. Reun, Commander of Post 6, American Legion, states that "until the war is over and there is some definite way to tell the loyal from the disloyal Japanese, bringing Jap nisei girls into the hospital would be unfair to the patients and to the nurses. I imagine the boys fighting Japs in the Pacific wouldn't like it very much if they knew their mothers or daughters were being nursed by Japs here at home."

Resettlers arriving in New York City will be met at Grand Central Station or Pennsylvania Terminal and escorted to their destination by members of a reception committee recently organized by the Resettlement Council of the Japanese-American Organizations of New York City if the New York relocation office has been given advance notice of the time and place of arrival.

According to Mr. Price Steidling, relocation officer in charge of the New York district office, this reception committee, consisting of local residents of Japanese ancestry, has been especially helpful to Issei and several family groups that

DULUTH GROUP AID RESETTLERS

The Minneapolis relocation office has compiled a very complete information folder regarding opportunities for evacuees in Duluth, Minn. In addition to general information regarding the Duluth area, the kit contains large photographs of resettlers who are living and working in Duluth. The success which the first relocators found in this city has encouraged the Minneapolis office to assign a relocation officer to answer correspondence and meet incoming evacuees in Duluth.

Duluth is a city of over 100,000. Although it is located on Lake Superior in the Northern United States, its climate is similar to that of Minneapolis, where large numbers of resettlers are now living.

The citizens of Duluth have organized an active relocation committee, which is prepared to cooperate with center residents who are interested in further information regarding this area. Members of this committee will meet newcomers on the train or at the W.C.A. and assist them in housing arrangements. Also arrangements have been made with the War Manpower Commission to give special attention to finding employment for resettlers.


