The gifts will be given to those under 1 year to 18 years, invalids at home, and persons who are 65 or over.

The gifts have been sent by denominational boards under the Home Mission Council.

Christmas will be observed with a special Christian Christmas service on Sunday, Dec. 24, at Chapel 59 from 10 a.m.

The service will be a joint Issei-Nisei program.

Traditional Christmas caroling will begin from 9:30 p.m. Christmas Eve.

On Christmas Day, there will be a community Christian program from 7 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Two technicolor films, "Come Unto Me" and "A Savior Is Born" will be shown.

MILK

NEW SYSTEM OF PERMITS

Due to the rigid enforcement of the legal allowance of eight ounces of milk per person in the project, it is now necessary to cancel all previously issued permits. The milk will be used in the following manner:

First, the hospital will be served an adequate amount for its daily needs. Second, the out patient special diets daily needs. Third, for babies up to nineteen months of age. Fourth, all pregnant women and post natal mothers who are nursing their babies, other post natale not included. Fifth, all those persons who have a medical prescription from the doctors.

"I admit the evacuation was wrong and apologize for and make restitution for its wrong. That is only fair---lifting the exclusion order and help the evacuees in establishing themselves; not in money, but actual friendly help. We are offering jobs and housing. We are also going to ask that they be protected from any criminal disturbance."

JACL CONFERENCE

To correct the wrongs brought on by the eviction of persons of Japanese ancestry from the West Coast and to display democracy in action, William C. Carr, realtor and representative of the Friends of the American Way, arrived from Pasadena, California and spoke before the National JACL Conference held in Salt Lake City, Dec. 1-3.

Carr described their slogan as: "Justice Delayed, Is Justice Denied". Their activities included the molding of acceptance for the early return of Japanese. They have circulated leaflets urging tolerance; they have publicly recognized the exploits of Nisei soldiers; and they have eased the way for those who are returning.

GI RAFFE

"Our unofficial emblem is the giraffe, for we do believe in sticking our necks out. Funds for our works comes from envelopes, such as one received from the Italian front a matter of hours after one of their major engagements.

"The letter read, 'Just before we went on our last mission copies of your printed letter that 150 Pasadenaans were willing to furnish housing and jobs for Japanese Americans were received. I distributed these, as best I could to some of the leaders and I know that they talked about your wonderful work on their way up to meet the foe of all Americans. Later, some of our men were found dead with copies of your letters in their pockets nearest their heart.'"

CHRISTMAS MESSAGE

(Father Clement of the Maryknoll Catholic Chapel gave the following Christmas message to residents here.)

"Glory to God in the Highest, and on earth Peace to men of good will!"

Thus sang the angels of old over the Christ-Child in the stable on Bethlehem's outskirts. What is this peace of which the angels sing? It is a treasure we may have if we will. It is the peace that surpasseth all understanding. The peace that Christ told us about on the mount, "Blessed are the peacemakers for they shall be called the children of God."

This peace is in the heart of the God-like man who is wise enough to receive the One who "came unto His own" though His own received Him not. For to those who receive Him He gives the power to become children of God. Evacuees of Japanese ancestry compose about one-third of the membership. A report from Poston describes the organization as "pretty much of a cosmopolitan club, and perhaps somewhat typical of center life."

When the Ninth Service Command set Sunday, December 3, as Memorial Day for all men killed in the service in the district, Military Police at the center asked the Ex-serviced Club to sponsor the program.

All Poston organizations participated in the parade honoring the 13 center boys who gave their lives in World War II. A large audience attended the services in which all religious faiths took part

HUSO SEES EVACUEES IN MANY OCCUPATIONS

(This is the second in a series of articles on William Huso's Eastern trip.)

In further recounting his experiences in the New York office, William Huso, relocation head, stated that he was surprised to find evacuees engaging in so many types of occupations. Many of these occupations had been denied them in pre-evacuation days. They were employed as architects, statisticians, medical social workers, school teachers, office managers and accountants and were working for the highest type of employers.

Ordinarily, Huso said, evacuees may not find the highest paying job in his occupation at first. A good example of this is in the beautician trade. Fashionable shops on 5th Avenue will pay \$25.00 to \$30.00 per week while those located in less desirable districts will pay considerably more. Artists may not be able at once to utilize their highest skill

but will be able to get on with something within their skills.

The opportunities for produce men in New York City are relatively few and outside of placements in the Eastern cooperative very little has been done for men of retail and wholesale grocery back-grounds.

If wives of relocatees want to work in the garment industry there is a world of opportunity because New York City is the center of garment manufacture. Those who have done home sewing are referred to the custom tailoring shop and there are a great number of openings among those.

So far as war work is concerned, New York has relatively little to offer in comparison with the opportunities in Cleveland and Chicago.

DAYTON, OHIO HELPS EVACUEES

For the second successive year, the Dayton Community War Chest has underwritten the Ohio city's Church Federation to the extent of \$15,000, part of which goes for the community needs of resettled Japanese Americans.
