## Resident Found Dead Last Night

Joe Tsujimoto, 29-year-old discharge veteran of World War II, was found dead at his home, 65-6-A, about 9:50 o'clock last night, with a knife wound through his heart, probably self-inflicted.

John V. Nichol, police chief, stated that a coroner's jury is coming today. Their verdict will be known this afternoon.

Tsujimoto was discharged from the Army on Dec. 28, 1943, and has lived with his parents here ever since. He was found dead by his father, who with other members of the family had attended the Japanese movie at the amphitheater.

## FREEDOM WELL EARNED

This message to all American soldiers of Japanese ancestry was given last week by Harold L. Ickes.

"I have gained deep satisfaction, which must have come to you as well, from the announcement by the Western Defense Command that the West Coast mass exclusion orders have been lifted. This action is a well-earned recognition of the loyalty which the great majority of evacuee people of Japanese descent have displayed in the severest test that any group of Americans have ever had to face.

It is a victory of faith in the principles of real Americanism, and of unflinching patriotism so well exemplified by valiant American soldiers, from the mainland and Hawaii, whose parents come from Japan. You have made a magnificent record of

The Juvenile Guidance Board will be composed of Hiroji Nishimura, Mitsugi Hamanaka, Michimasa Asami (46), T. Hasegawa (59), Douglas Mitsuhashi (63), and Shotaro Hikida (64). The Gila Health Committee will consist of Masao Nishimura (29) and Hiroji Nishimura.

# CITY ORGANIZES TO AID EVACUEES

Wholeheartedly endorsing the program to assist evacuees in getting established in Pittsburgh, a group of forty leading residents met in that Western Pennsylvania industrial city on Wednesday, Dec. 20, and formed the Pittsburgh Citizens Committee on Resettlement.

Among the Committee members were representatives of labor, industry, social and welfare agencies, governmental bureaus and churches of several denominations. Also a member is the wife of the mayor of the city.

Speakers at the meeting, which was attended by reporters from each of the city's three newspapers, included Dr. A. F. Kinsolving, chairman of the committee and leading Episcopal clergyman; Rev. Shunji F. Nishi, also an Episcopal clergyman, who works with the Cleveland Federation of Churches on relocation problem; and Robert M. Cullum, Great Lakes Area supervisor of the WPA. Cullum discussed the Government's program; Rev. Nishi, the evacuees' viewpoint; and Dr. Kinsolving, the attitude of the residents of Pittsburgh.

Outcome of the meeting was the appointment of a nominating committee which was empowered to formulate sub-committees on housing, public information, community participation and employment.

## 1944 Births Top Deaths By 115

The number of births in Rivers during the 1944 calendar year exceeded the number of deaths by 115, according to a report from the Rivers hospital. One hundred fifty-three babies were born and 48 persons died during the past year.

Other statistics are as follows:

- Hospital admissions-302;
- Medical and surgical treatments in outpatient department-33,140;
- Dental treatments-21,620; patients contacted and treatment given by public health nurse, 27,000.

## SIGNIFICANT YEAR

The year 1945 may well turn out to be the most significant even though a most trying one in the lives of Japanese Americans.

### MOMENTOUS DECISIONS

It will be significant because the decisions we make here during next year may shape our environment and our lives. It is a good bet that many relocates who have gone East to "look around" and have found something to their liking will decide to stay there even though the West Coast has opened. This year can decide what we do for a living, with whom we will associate, and in what part of the country we live for the rest of our lives.

In the face of difficulties are several reassuring factors. There are sympathetic groups and persons like the Friends of the American Way and church organizations to give us physical and spiritual aid. The WRA is still here to help us with job placements and financial support to a certain extent. Those who still have homes on the West Coast will be able to return.

### GOVT RESPONSIBLE

With the announcement that the WRA will close within a year, those who have no immediate means of starting anew will no doubt be disturbed. But so long as we have a democratic government, we can expect humane treatment. A government which carried out evacuation with reasonable order in a short time will surely be able to meet the resettlement problem without undue hardship or evacuees. Responsibilities of the WPA may end with its closing, but that of the government will continue.

With those things in mind, we face 1945 and the problems of resettlement with hopes for the best under difficult conditions.

service of your country. All good Americans are proud of you.

### RESETTLEMENT DIFFICULT

"The removal of the exclusion orders forecasts an end of the need to provide the refuge of the relocation centers for thousands of loyal and law-abiding people who are now free to live wherever they desire to make their homes in the United States. It is for their own best interests, and for the interests of all Americans of Japanese descent, that they should leave the centers as soon as possible. I am fully aware that departing from centers will involve difficult readjustments for some people, but they will be given ample time to make them and the War Relocation Authority will continue to give all of the assistance that it has previously given. Federal and state welfare agencies will aid families that need special help."

### A FUTURE WELL EARNED

"This message is addressed to you with full confidence that you will continue to enlarge with the splendid record of America's fighting Nisei, which has been so effective in demonstrating that Americanism is not a matter of race or ancestry, and in winning the respect of all good Americans for their loyal fellow-countrymen of Japanese descent. I send to you my wishes for your safe return home, and for a future in America endowed with the happiness that you have so well earned."

## NISEI OFFICER VISITING CANAL

A Nisei lieutenant with 31 months of overseas duty in the New Guinea area is visiting Rivers with his wife.

The soldier is First Lt. Gary Kadani, formerly of San Francisco, who has been in the service since March, 1941. He wears a Presidential citation ribbon on his chest and has five bars on his left sleeve, each bar representing six months of overseas duty. These are in addition to his overseas service ribbons and major battle stars. A corporal when he went over, Lieutenant Kadani received his commission on the field, a direct citation for valor and meritorious service.

When his 30-day furlough is over he will return to his New Guinea post. His wife relocated from Jerome and has been living in Columbus, Ohio. They are visiting her parents now in block 26.

Lieutenant Kadani says there are now many Nisei soldiers on duty in the New Guinea area.

## BASKETBALL SEASON OF '45 READY TO BE LAUNCHED

The 1945 season of basketball will resume play this coming Monday with the first A and B League

games scheduled to begin then. Next week, the C League is tentatively planned to commence.

At a managers' meeting, being held today, they will draw lots to see which teams will play. Recently at a Basketball Advisory Board meeting, several rules were drawn up for the cagers to abide by.

A few of them are as follows:

1. No player can play in a league lower than that in which he played during the last season or the one in which he is now playing.

2. The first and second round champs will play off at the end in a 2 out of 3 playoff.

3. Fighting--Any person throwing the first punch (hit or miss) will become ineligible for the league.

4. There shall be a closed roster of 12. In case of relocation, team must appeal to the Board to pick up players, and in the event that a person relocates but remains on the roster and comes back to camp for a visit, he is still eligible to play. To pick up players who have relocated and come to camp for a visit, but who aren't on any one team's roster, he must be ok'd by all managers and the Advisory Board, before he is eligible.

5. In case of a postponed game, the 2 team managers and the CAS shall schedule the game.

6. All protests of a game must come in within 24 hours after it is played.

7. Rules are to be determined under the N. B. C. rulings.
