FLAGSTAFF

JOBS AVAILABLE AT ARMY DEPOT

A variety of jobs were offered to Gila residents and their families by Captain Register of the Navajo Ordnance Depot of Flagstaff, Ariz., who visited the Project Monday. The Navajo Depot located in northern Arizona is similar to Tocoale Depot in Utah, but the employment offered differs in several important details. Jobs available to men include truck drivers, auto mechanics, plumbers, diesel mechanics, fork lift operators, painters, gang bosses, laborers, and mechanic helpers. Women can be employed immediately as a clerk typists, nurses' aides, stenography teachers, and gang bosses. In the latter category, Captain Register stated, women were preferred to men.

FOR DURATION

All jobs at the Depot carry civil service status. The Depot is expected to continue in operation longer than most of the other army posts of this type and employment will continue beyond the end of the war.

Captain Register stated that he is anxious to fill present vacancies immediately and believes that he can hire persons on the project cleared list without waiting for provost marshal clearance. He also wants as many applications as possible from persons now on the Army Excluded lists. Employment is offered to single men as well as families.

WOMEN'S PAY

The women's positions are classified under civil service at a salary of a \$1440 to \$1620 per year for clerk typists, \$1200 for nurses' aides trainees, and \$2000 for stenography teachers. There is additional pay of approximately 20% which covers eight

RICE TO ARRIVE FROM ARKANSAS

Arrangements have been completed for rice to be shipped here from Arkansas, stated John D. Seater, head of mess operations.

It will be about the first of February when the shipments will start coming in to Rivers, Seater estimated. If everything goes as arranged, Rivers ought to get about four cars of rice between now and Feb. 10.

hours overtime for the 48-hour week which is now in operation. Other positions are paid on a daily basis.

OVERTIME PAY

The pay rates are the base pay received for an 8-hour day and a five-day week. All work on the 6th and 7th day of the week, or in excess of 8 hours per day is paid at the rate of time and a half. At the present time all workers at the Depot are working a regular 54-hour a week. This would mean that auto mechanics and diesel mechanics who have been on the job for two months would receive a weekly salary of \$68.93.

Applications for any of the above jobs are made on civil service blanks and can be submitted through either the Canal or Butte relocation offices.

GOV. WARREN

SCORES AUBURN ARSON ATTEMPT

Governor Warren of California Saturday called the attempted burning and dynamiting of a Japanese home at Auburn "atrocious" and said a repetition of such incidents might cause enemy retaliation.

"I can't conceive of people who claim to be good Americans trying to further the war effort doing a thing of that kind," the Governor said at a news conference.

"Every officer and every citizen not only should resent such conduct but do everything to prevent it.

"Such incidents not only give California a bad reputation throughout the world, but might cause our boys and civilians in enemy countries to suffer additional injury."

Central Calif. Returnee Happy

Families who have returned from Gila to Central California are being well accepted and are experiencing no difficulty in carrying on their business, according to a report by Walter Mewing, area supervisor, to R. B. Cozzens, in San Francisco.

James Morishige, his wife and two daughters, returned to their farm three miles northwest of Selma. Their tenant, Frank Salido, vacated the premises before their arrival and turned over complete possession to the evacuees. Morishige states that they are well received and their children are going to school and are receiving very fine treatment.

The Fresno relocation officer dropped in to see the Kazuo Miyama family at their Fowler farm. They too are well pleased at the treatment they are receiving at Fowler.

ARABIAN NIGHTS

'Four Horsemen' Arrive In Egypt

The four men who left the Rivers farm section last September to head an agricultural mission in Arabia have arrived in Egypt, according to personal letters which have been sent to Rivers by Walt Emrick, foreign correspondent.

David A. Rogers, Carl W. Quast, Raleigh J. Sanderson and Emrick compose the party formed by the War Food Division of the Foreign Economic Administration after the Egyptian Government requested a group of agricultural men to assist in the farm production problems of that country.

EIKE FICTION

Reading like an Arabian Night fairy tale, Emrick's letter describes his trip over on a small cargo ship that rocked rolled, and at one point had them seriously wondering whether they would ever come through the storm. Emrick wrote at that time, "I would gladly give a thousand dollars to be home and forget this whole cockeyed deal." Throughout the trip all of them were required to wear life jackets at all times when on deck.

Rogers and Quast had sailed on a passenger liner, Emrick and Sanderson, had taken the cargo boat as "76 other kno t heads like we did."

ONCE IS ENOUGH

Emrick's last letter written on Dec. 5, 1944, states, "I am glad I had the experience of making the trip under such conditions, but I certainly don't want to go back that way!" Excerpts from Emrick's letters follow:

"This is a hurried note to let you know about my safe arrival in Cairo, Egypt. Met Dave (Rogers) and Carl (Quast). They were just about as glad to see us as we were to see them. They have both been here and worried about us for days."

"Nov. 24, 1944. Believe it or not tonight I am in Beirut (Lebanon) and last night I was in Jerusalem! Climate is so wild

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FACTS ON DOI CASE

In view of rumors, newspaper and radio accounts of incidents at Auburn, Calif., involving returnee Sumio Doi, his father and mother, here are the facts as teletyped to Project Director Leroy H. Bennett from R.J. Cozzens of the San Francisco WRA office.

Doi's return was without incident until the night of Jan. 17 when he heard a noise in the outbuilding. Investigation showed that hoodlums had started a small fire which was promptly extinguished by Doi and his father. The incident was reported to the sheriff's office.

The following night buckshot was fired toward the house from a shotgun in the hands of an unknown person on the road. The sheriff was summoned. His investigation showed several sticks of dynamite planted in the packing shed.

Governor Earl Warren and State Attorney General Kenny appraised the facts and immediately requested full protection for the Doi family. This was followed up with a conference with Placer County superior court judge, the sheriff, and the district attorney who assured protection.

Doi's immediate neighbors are friendly, extending help, Cozzens states. Merchants in Auburn are cooperative. The Doi family will feel happier when other friends have returned to the area.

NISEI PREMISES GUARDED

day, Jan. 19, Sheriff Charles H. Silva announced he had placed a twenty-four hour guard on the Doi premises, according to an AP report. Doi had returned with his parents on Jan. 6 from the Amache Center.

According to the AP report, Silva said the first attack on the Doi place was made Wednesday night, Jan. 17, when a wall of the shed was soaked with gasoline and set afire. Doi put out the blaze and did not report the incident immediately.

Early Friday he phoned the sheriff's office that several carloads of persons were parked on his property and shots were being fired over the house. When deputies arrived, the cars had gone, but nine sticks of dynamite were found under a cover of the packing shed, together with a litter of burned matches.

No arrests have been made, since there were no witnesses, but Silva said there may be some later.

Honda plans to resettle his parents on their farm in Fowler as soon as the tenants who now occupy their house move out. Housing shortage is quite acute in California, he said. After his parents are settled, he plans to return to his job with the Ryerson Steel Co. in Chicago.

OSATO GUEST AT NISEI BALL

Some 350 persons attended an Allied Relief Ball sponsored by the Japanese American Committee of the New York War Fund on Jan. 6 at the Hotel McAlpin, one of New York's leading mid-town hotels. In addition to many resettlers and long-resident local Japanese, those present included about 50 Nisei soldiers from the mainland and Hawaii and 100 Caucasian friends. Among the guests was Sono Osato, famous dancer, who is now being featured in New York's new musical show, "On The Town."

The New York War Fund will receive over \$250 from the sale of tickets and of a directory of Japanese Americans in New York which was prepared by the War Fund Committee for distribution at the ball.

Music for dancing at the ball was provided by Al Bennett and His Recording Orchestra, which broadcasts over radio station WOR. The program also included entertainment by 15 Hawaiian hula dancers and a native orchestra; singing by Miss Ruby Yoshino, who was accompanied by Miss Aiko Tashiro; and the showing of new reel movies of Nisei soldiers in action in Europe and of "Go For Broke," the film depicting the training of the 442nd Combat Team at Camp Shelby, Miss.
