KUBO

RELATES TRIP TO CALIFORNIA

Shig Kubo of 45-7-B and the project agricultural department returned Sunday night from two weeks visit to San Francisco, where he attended a three-day conference on inter-racial relations, and went to Sacramento and Placer county, where he visited old friends and investigated community sentiment.

The San Francisco conference held on January 10, 11, and 12, in the Palace Hotel was attended by nearly 200 delegates from all sections of the Pacific Coast from Seattle to San Diego.

Since Kubo was the only person at the convention who actually still resides at a relocation project, he was called upon to express the viewpoint of the center residents at a meeting of the entire group. He appeared on the same platform with Dillon Myer and other notables. He told the conference that considerable confusion arose in the minds of the Issei residents when the opening of California was announced, because the official Japanese translation of the WRA bulletin which was released from Washington was in very complex and un-

CHEST FUND TO BE SHARED BY EIGHT ORGANIZATIONS

Eight organizations were approved to receive shares from the community chest fund at a meeting of the 1945 Chest Fund Com-

mittee held Tuesday.

The organizations approved for participation in the chest fund are the Young Buddhist Association, Young Men's Christian Association, Young Women's Christian Association, Girl Scouts of America, Boy Scouts of America, United Servicemen's organization, Nurses' Aide, and Senior Men's Club. These eight organizations had been recommended by a special committee chosen to select the organizations for participation in the 1945 chest fund, which was raised through the "Give a Day's Pay" drive conducted last year.

Allocation of funds will be determined by the Chest Fund Trustees, the Chest Fund Committee decided. It was further approved that the trustees be guided in their allocations by the same rules set last year, and that special requests by individual organizations for justification of allotment be considered.

Last year's chest fund was distributed with a ruling that these funds were not to be used for items such as (1) personal property of an individual such as wearing apparel, prizes, awards, etc.; (2) foodstuffs available or easily substituted on the project (use of food should be for refreshments only); and (3) funds for travel of any individual except under unusual circumstances.

telligible Japanese. He said that the Gila people were for the most part from small farm communities and that although some plan immediate return to California, many find it impossible to leave immediately because they have no housing or because they have lost a considerable portion of their savings as a result of evacuation, and because they are uncertain about the future. He told them that a great deal of help was needed from the government agencies and private groups, both in developing opportunities for people to return to California and in improving public sentiment.

American internees, the State Department revealed Jan. 22, UP reports.

Japan has indicated her special interest in repatriation of Japanese subjects held at Tule Lake, it was stated.

The Japanese government expects to be able to carry out the exchange during 1945.

State Department said it is prepared to ensure speedy execution of any exchange to which the Japanese government's agreement can be obtained.

ARABIAN NIGHTS

EMERICK WRITES
OF EGYPT LIFE

Walt Emerick, former Gilar who is headed for an agricultural mission in Arabia, writes of his experiences in Egypt.

Excerpts from his letters follows:

"This is truly a land where anything grows, oranges, vegetables, and fruits of all kinds.

"All prices here are 19 times what they were in normal times. There is no OPA or rationing. We used to cuss over OPA and rationing regulations, but I know now that they were a great help to the economic health of our nation.

"Egypt is a very interesting place: life is no different from that in the states. We go to work at 8 a.m. and work until 1 p.m. and then go home and back again at 3:30 p.m. and then stay on the job and go home after dark at 7:30. Dinner is not served until 8:30."

"Money here is a big puzzle. A pound is worth about four dollars and I do believe it goes about as far as one dollar. For ten dollars you can get a fist full of paper money of varying sizes and a

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NIGHT RIDERS

The following editorial "Night Riders" appeared in the Jan. 22 issue of the San Francisco Chronicle.

"Night riding tactics like the attacks on the Japanese-American farmer who returned to his Placer County home come pretty close to an invitation to the FBI to take an interest in the matter.

"Such instances are not quite on a par with disturbances which, although they deal with constitutional rights, are held clearly and exclusively the responsibility of local authorities.

"American citizens of Japanese antecedents who were removed from their homes and held under military guard have been Government wards. No amount of legal sophistry can alter that practical aspect. If local peace officers cannot protect these persons in rights which were disturbed in the first instance by the Federal Government it seems to be up to the Government to find a way to do it."

"The country is filled to overflowing with the hardest working people I ever saw in my life. Everything, it seems, is done the hard way. They plow with oxen or donkeys with a wooden plow. In the cities there are many automobiles, many American make. But it seems there are about as many horse and donkey drawn carts, wagon and rigs as there are cars."

Kenny Requests
Law Enforcement

Robert W. Kenny, attorney general of California, has written to the law enforcement officers of the state calling upon them to see that returning Japanese American people are given full protection. In his letter he quotes the text of a statement issued by the State Law Enforcement Advisory Committee after a special meeting called at the suggestion of Governor Earl Warren. The statement follows:

"To consider it our sworn duty as law enforcement officers to fully cooperate with the Army authorities in dealing with the return of the Japanese residents of this state. All persons, regardless of race, are entitled to the full protection of the law. The Army has carefully investigated each person to be permitted to return and will not allow those who are potentially dangerous to return.

"There should be no difficulty involved in this transition unless incidents are provoked by intemperate words and thoughtlessness.

"During this period of adjustment, the reputation of each of our California communities will be at stake. We confidently expect all citizens to join with us in furthering full respect of the individual rights involved."

DEAR NISEI SOLDIERS

To keep Nisei fighting on the far-flung battle-fronts informed of progress on the home front, Pasadena Friends of the American Way, through Marjorie Noble, executive secretary of that group, has sent letters to Nisei soldiers whose homes were in the Pasadena area.

Addressed to "Dear Nisei Soldier," the letters tell the names of the returnees and what they are doing. Here's a sample:

"In this first week after the lifting of the ban, thirteen Japanese Americans have come to Pasadena. They include:

"Ko Yamaguchi, age 10, living with the Emerson family and attending McKinley Junior High School. A clipping about him from the Los Angeles Times is inclosed.

"T. Hata, who has found a gardening job, and housing for his family. He is temporarily living with the Emersons.

"Ruby Hori, who will be a freshman at U.C.L.A. next term, and has a housework job in Los Angeles.

"Akira Kagayama, who will work at Caltech, living now with the Emersons.

"Mitsuko Kayama, living at the Morses', will attend P.J.C. next term.

"Francis Uyematsu and Francis Uyematsu Jr., now at the Carrs, are here to look over their nursery and make arrangements for reopening the business.

"Mr. and Mrs. Iida and Mr. Yamamoto, who may accept jobs offered them at Moody's mattress factory, in Los Angeles, with the Nicholsons.

"Mrs. Lily Moriguchi, who lived with Miss Fanning while she was here on business.

FARM FIELDS Will BE CONSOLIDATED

All vegetable fields, except for fields 51, 61, and 65 will be turned back into the original alfalfa fields before the month of February, Robert Davidson, farm chief, stated.

The consolidation of the vegetable fields into three fields is to save labor, seed, and unnecessary use of fields. Due to the consolidation of the fields all the tractors, seeds, and other farm equipments of surplus use will be taken in and stored in the warehouse.

Livestock are being sold so that feed will be plentiful for the livestock necessary for the use of this camp. No vegetable will be planted during the month of February unless it is possible to have the vegetables harvested before July 1. This means that this year there will be no water melons, honeydews, cantelopes, and casabas.

Seven carloads of vegetables have been sent to other centers, and fifteen more carloads will be sent during February.
