COUNCIL TO MEET FOR DISCUSSION OF CONFERENCE

The Butte Community Council and representatives from all blocks will meet at the 69-6 court-house building 1:30 p.m. Monday, Feb. 5, to prepare for the all-center conference to discuss problems arising from the proposed closing of centers.

The Council decided at Monday's meeting to suggest to the Topaz Center that the tentative date for the meeting be Feb. 10 to 25 and the locality be Salt Lake City.

Two official delegates to the conference will be elected on Feb. 12.

AGED RESIDENT HANGS HIMSELF

Sangyo Goto, 72, of 45-5-E, was found dead about 6:30 Thursday evening, Feb. 1, suspended by rope from a boom of a canopy at the dump ground beyond the hills west of camp.

Coroner Walter B. Love, Jr., who investigated, stated that it was suicide.

Goto, formerly of Jerome, left no other identification and is apparently a bachelor. He is listed in the Japanese directory as a native of Kumamoto prefecture and formerly of Fresno.

Chief John W. Nichol, who was called to the scene, stated that indications showed the man's first attempt to take his own life had failed when the rope broke, and he had tried the second time.

KUROKI BROADCAST

Emphasizing that racial discrimination produces "wounds in this war that don't get the Purple Heart," the Army Air Forces Radio Unit dramatized the story of Technical Sergeant Ben Kuroki, Nebraska-born Nisei hero of the Eighth Air Force, in a half-hour program which was broadcast on Jan. 19 from New York City's Station WABC over a national hook-up of the Columbia Broadcasting System.

BOY FROM HERSHEY

Early in the program the narrator said it would "tell the story of a boy from a farmhouse near a potato field in Hershey, Nebraska," who had "picked up a very fancy collection of decorations, commendations, medals and citations--including two Distinguished Flying Crosses, the Air Medal and four oak leaf clusters, a Presidential citation, and half a dozen bronze stars--but no Purple Heart. Which is the point of the story!"

"Have you heard the story of the boy from Nebraska? He was missed by flak over Germany, but he could get it right in the teeth from a storekeeper out West. He flew past the Fock-Wulfs all right, but the gentleman from the little town nailed him. He made it through the Floesti raid, but he didn't quite make it through a truck farm in the U.S.A. And the point is, there are wounds in this war that don't get the Purple Heart...."

HIS BROTHERS

"The neighbors of the truck farmer who needed help with his crops and hired five Japanese Americans... didn't run out five of the people who brought death to China, and plunder to Burma, and starvation to the Philippines. They ran out five people like the boy from Nebraska."

"The gentlemen (who) counted off the names of the Japanese Americans on their servicemen's honor roll and got a bucket of paint and wiped out the names... weren't wiping out the people who raped Nanking, who came to Pearl Harbor in the dawn, who planned the death march of Bataan. They were wiping out the brothers of the boy from Nebraska..."

ALL FOR ONE

"Do you hear the story of the boy from Nebraska? Do you listen closely and understand that he could have been from Seattle or Staten Island, or Sandusky, Ohio? And for Kuroki, read Canelli, read Kantrowitz, read Kerchuski. Any name that comes hard to the tongue, a different slant to the eye, the shape of a nose. They are riding the tail turrets from Pe 11 to Burma. They are spelling it out slowly in fifty calibre bullets that it isn't race or religion that makes free men. They are writing it across the sky in demolition bombs that freedom isn't color, but a way of life. And all men are created equal until they prove otherwise."

Pfc. Yoshinao Omiya, blinded Hawaiian-born Ni-ahole hero of the Italian campaign, and his Seeing Eye dog, Audrey, will soon be graduated from "school," reports Edward V. Berman, relocation officer in charge of the WRA office in Newark, N.J.

In company with his secretary, Miss Hidoko Tsutsui, formerly of San Luis Obispo, Calif., and Gila River, Berman recently

lunched with Pvt. Omiya at the Seeing Eye Institute in nearby Morristown, N. J. There they learned that each blind person and his Seeing Eye dog go through a four-week course of study at the Institute before going out into the world together.

Berman, who was for several years a resident of Hawaii, said that Pvt. Omiya was very happy to meet "someone from the Islands" and to talk about poi and lomi salmon. He plans to return to his home in Hawaii after his and Audrey's graduation.

Pvt. Omiya served with the famed 100th Infantry Battalion and lost his eyesight during the crossing of the Volturno River in Italy on October 13, 1943.

HOSTEL OPENED FOR EVACUEES

According to a letter recently from Esther Rhoades of the American Friends Service Committee, a small hostel has been opened in Pasadena for the use of returning evacuees who wish to have temporary living quarters until they can find a more permanent home.

The Friends group is also assisting persons to find permanent living quarters in Pasadena. Anyone interested in making use of the hostel facilities may arrange a reservation through either the Canal or Butte relocation offices.

JOBS FOR NISEI IN CIVIL SERVICES

According to Walter Mowing, relocation supervisor in San Francisco, the California regional office of the United States Civil Service Commission is anxious to eliminate any possible discrimination in the assignment of qualified Nisei applicants to employment in federal government agencies on the West Coast. Any persons living in the center who wish to apply for civil service jobs in California may do so by sending an application to the United States Civil Service Commission, 12th Region, 630 Sansome Street, San Francisco, Calif. The application blanks, civil service form no. 57, may be obtained in either the Canal or Butte relocation office.

In many cases, persons are eligible for civil service jobs even though they have never taken a civil service examination before applying. Person who were working in Federal agencies on the West Coast prior to evacuation should follow the same procedure.

HOSTEL STARTS PRIORITY SYSTEM

In view of the coming relocation from centers to the eastern states, priority space in the Cleveland Hostel has been set. Priority will be given in the following order: (1) Remnants of family groups (having close relatives in Cleveland already), (2) Whole family groups having no relatives in Cleveland), (3) Single women, (4) Married men preceding the rest of their families in relocation and (5) Single men.

The main purpose will be to encourage and help evacuees to accomplish the uniting of families.

Relocation officials in Cleveland feel that it is preferable for married men to relocate together with their families, and face the relocation experience together. For that reason, married men preceding the rest of their families in relocation are fourth on the priority list. Another reason is that ample living facilities for unattached males can be found.

Oregon Farmer Seeks Japanese

A farmer, David Chadwick of Route 1, Ontario, Ore., wants one or two Japanese families to handle his beet crop for the 1945 season, according to Ernest J. Palmer, relocation officer at 328 Idaho Building, Boise, Idaho.

Chadwick's proposition is as follows:

Sixty acres of beets; Japanese to do all hand labor. Their compensation will be 35 per cent of the crop. Expense money will be advanced as each operation is finished, at the government scale for that operation. Chadwick will do his part of soil preparation, seeding, and cultivating in proper manner to obtain maximum yield.
