FOUR SUSPECTS TWENTY RECEIVE NOTICES APPREHENDED IN FOR ARMY DUTY MONDAY

AUBURN ARSON

Four men, charged with felony counts of arson and attempted dynamiting in the Sumio Doi case, are in custody of civil authorities at Auburn, Calif., according to R. P. Cozens of the San Francisco WRA office.

Two brothers, both AWOL from the Army, and two other brothers, distant neighbors of Doi's, have been apprehended by state and county law enforcement officials. They are Pvt. Elmer R. Johnson, 20, picked up by MP's and turned over to civil authorities; his brother Alvin E. Johnson, 18, both of Redding; James Edward Watson, 38, and Auburn bartender; and his brother Charles, 35.

Four young women, with whom the men are said to have been on a drinking party, are considered material witnesses although released on their own recognizance while each of the men are held in lieu of \$5,000 cash bail or bond of \$10,000.

Arrests were made after intensive investigation and cooperation of the state department of justice, military police, sheriff's office, district attorney's office and others.

In the meantime the Doi's have had nightly protection since Jan. 18 from the state highway patrol and special deputy sheriff. There have been no further incidents.

BUTTE DISCUSSES ALL-CENTER MEET

Butte's two delegates to the all-center conference which is scheduled to be held at Salt Lake City this month, will be chosen this Friday afternoon, at 1:30, when the members of the Community Council meet with representatives from each block at the 69-6 court room. Problems arising from the proposed closing of WPA centers will also be discussed, and questions to be brought up at the conference will be prepared.

The all-center conference will be held at Salt Lake City from Feb. 16 to Feb. 23 inclusive, according to a teletype from Topaz, which was read at Monday's special session of the Butte Council and block nominees for the official delegates to the all-center conference. Nominees from block 29, 46, 60, and 74 were absent.

In addition to the 45 members and representatives, Gordon Brown, L.H. Bennett, William Huse, Hugo W. Volter, and Lt. Commander Lodge were present. Volter, who is here from Washington, extended Director Myer's greeting and appreciation for the fine work being done in this center.

CANAL VOTES ON CONFAB NOMINEES

442ND

NISEI RECEIVE ARMY CITATIONS

WITH THE 442ND COMBAT TEAM OF THE SEVENTH ARMY IN FRANCE - Seventy-eight members of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team Infantry Regiment were honored at a Citations Ceremony near Leperges, France.

BRIEF REST

Just returned from the fighting front for a brief rest, while their Field Artillery and Engineers were still carrying on against the enemy in the hills, the Infantry Regiment honored their comrades who have won decorations for their part in the great Fifth Army drive northward from Rome to and across the Arno River in Italy.

PAY RESPECTS

Standing at attention throughout the ceremonies, the officers and men of the Japanese American Infantry Regiment paid their respects to those who had to receive their awards posthumously, watched Major General John E. Dahlquist, Commanding General of the 36th Division to which they were attached, decorate all those who were able to be present, and thought of those who were now in hospitals, were missing, or were killed in action since winning those tokens of appreciation from a grateful country.

ONE GIANT

Among those decorated was a former Giant, Pvt. Masaharu Okumura, formerly of Camarillo, Calif., who received the Bronze Star.

After personally decorating those present for their respective awards General Dahlquist spoke briefly to the men, saying: "We have only the utmost admiration for you and what you have accomplished...no finer fighting, no finer soldierly qualities have ever been witnessed by the United States Army in its long history."

ALIEN TRAVEL RULES

Regulations controlling the travel of aliens are explained by Victor L. Furth, acting assistant director at the San Francisco WRA office, in a letter to William Fuso.

Rumors that aliens may not travel more than five miles has no foundation. Under the regulations of the U.S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides. The community includes all the area constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business.

TRIPS, MOVES

If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another, he should send a statement to the U.S. Attorney of the district of his residence at least seven days before his intended departure, stating in a form furnished by the U.S. Attorney his name, his home address, his business address, his Alien Identification number, the purpose of his trip, the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the route to be followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the attorney nor the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the attorney will stamp an endorsement on the form and will deliver it in time before he travels.

Salesmen, drivers of truck, etc., will not have to make a separate application for every trip.

CHANGE OF RESIDENCE, WORK

Change of residence or of employment shall be made only after at least seven days notice to the U. S. Attorney of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Registration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FBI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification.

Travel by airplane is not permitted.

FRANCE**NISEI SOLDIERS WIN PROMOTIONS**

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, FRANCE

-- One hundred and three American soldiers of Japanese ancestry with the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team have received battlefield promotions recently for demonstrated leadership in combat against the Germans in France.

Sixty-nine of the group are from the Territory of Hawaii and 34 are from the continental United States. The promotions range from ratings of corporal to first sergeant.

All those receiving promotions were the Combat Infantryman's Badge for exemplary conduct under enemy fire and wear at least two battle stars for participation in the Fifth Army's northward drive from Rome to and across the Arno River in Italy and in the Seventh Army's push through the Vosges Mountains in eastern France. Many of the men earned their promotions during the historic rescue of the now famous "Lost Battalion" of World War II by the Japanese Americans near Bruyeres, France in October. Most of the men wear Purple Hearts, some with oak leaf clusters.

Marumoto had a gross of 160 with a handicap of 34 to come out with a net of 126.

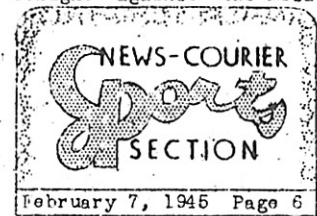
