Regulations controlling the travel of aliens are explained by Victor L. Furth, acting a ssistent director at the San Francisco WRA office, in a letter to William Pusa.

Rumors that aliens may not travel more than five miles has no foundation. Under the regulations of the .U.S. Department of Justice, an enemy alien may freely travel without special permission within the limits of the community in which he resides. The community includes all the area constituting a metropolitan district or an urban or rural community and is not limited to the boundary lines of a city or county. Thus he may commute between his home and his place of business.

TRIPS, MOVES

If he wishes to make a trip or move from one community into another, he should send a statement to the U.S. Attorney of the district of his residence at least seven days before his intended departure, "stating in a form furnished by the U.S. Attorney his name, his home address, his business address, his Alien Identification number, the purpose of his trip, the persons to be visited, his intermediate and final destinations, the dates of his intended departure and return, his address while he is away, the routes to followed to and from destination, and the means of transportation. If neither the attorney nor the FBI know of any reason why the trip would endanger the national security, the attorney will stamp an endorsement on the form and will deliver in time before he travels.

CHANGE OF RESIDENCE, WORK Change of residence or of employment shall be made only ofter at least seven days notice to the U.S. Attorney of the proposed change; and the holder of a Certificate of Identification shall not change his name, residence address, or place of employment without written notice to the Alien Segistration Division of the Immigration and Naturalization Service and to the FRI at the office shown in the holder's Certificate of Identification. .

Travel by airplane is not permitted.
