## WRA EQUIPPED TO HANDLE 300 APPLICATIONS DAILY

"Apply for your clearance now if you have any intention of getting outside employment in the future," stated Davie McEntire, assistant national chief of WRA Employment Division, who is here mainly to establish procedure for leave clearance.

"The importance of getting our clearance now," he continued, "lies in the fact that, once a person is cleared he can leave in a few days after an offer of employment, whereas, without clearance an offered job is usually filled before he (she) can finish the clearance process, which takes a month to six weeks, despite a greatly speeded up procedure in Washington."

McEntire said that as the first step in the extensive resettlement program, which the WRA anticipates, will see evacuees relocated in every part of the nation except the military area, the Washington office has accelerated the leave clearance procedure. The office now is equipped to handle 300 applications daily. In the process of being appointed, is a staff of WRA employment investigators to search out jobs and to do public relations work so that the communities will be more ready to accept evacuees.

The co-chairmen announced the appointment of a study and research committee composed of Harry Miyako, Chiroyuki Nakamura, Mitsuji Oishi, Frank Saito, Bunji Ikenoya, Nagao Fujita and an adviser, H. G. Frickland, faculty member of the Butte high school.

G. I. clothing being sold at 18-1 and 69-5 are available now to all evacuees. Heretofore, their sale was limited to workers only. Ample supply is still on hand, it was reported.

## Qualified Aliens Wanted For Federal Positions

Latest rulings from Washington reveal that aliens are eligible to apply for a position with a Federal government agency to transliterate place names occurring on Japanese map into the Hepburn Romanji system.

Desired qualifications, in addition to a thorough knowledge of Japanese character and English language, are a college degree on engineering, and journalistic or professional background. Employment places are Cleveland, Chi-

cago, Louisville, or some other mid-western city. Applicants who are accepted will be given indefinite leave, and after termination of their work in approximately 6 months, will have an opportunity to seek other employment.

Applications can be made with Walt Sunada in Canal and Toshi Kawai in Butte in the administration buildings. Representatives of the Federal government will arrive sometime in the future to conduct tests.

## LINES FOR FUEL LONG

As the residents finally received all their oil heaters and were accustoming themselves to the routine of lining up for their fuel oil, from the nation's colder climates

came reports that there are similar lines of people waiting in long queues in below freezing weather for their share of fuel.

Lee Nofzger announced yesterday that all of the 5,025 stoves had arrived, and that by noon today they would all be installed. Every apartment, with the exception of the partitioned ones, will be equipped with them.

## EDITORIAL

### THE FIGHT FOR UNDERSTANDING

The tempo of resettlement is accelerating. In the last two weeks many leave permits have come through to residents in the colony. The student relocation program is releasing a great many. For those who have hopes of relocating, the concrete result is near.

Washington office has caught up with the applications for leave and from now, certainly no long period of waiting will be necessary after the papers are cleared here. To help streamline leave procedure, and particularly to aid people get their leave clearances is Davis McEntyre, in Gila now.

But what we are interested in is that here, at least, the way is being made easier to contribute to the cause of understanding and the resultant peace. If out of this war comes only bitterness among races, this war will lead inevitably to another, and again minority races, such as we, will needlessly go through the same travail.

But we are given an opportunity to pioneer in the field of mutual sympathy by resettling in mid-western and eastern communities where Japanese are yet a curiosity.

What we can do will be little, but the part that any individual contributes to a great cause is small. That is his share and it is the compounding of these minute shares that produces this final achievement. For the cause of peace and understanding, which we, for their lack, have suffered so much, and which we desire so much, our next step is clear. —JN

### Project Director Bennett

Approximately ten days ago, thirty-two certificates of identification were collected from parolees living in both camps and were forwarded to San Francisco for appropriate endorsements. Assurance was given each person from whom a certificate was received that these certificates would be returned at such time that the endorsements were placed thereon.

A few stories have circulated throughout both camps reflecting that the removal of certificates was the preliminary step for subsequent transfer to a community outside this Project. Inasmuch as there is no factual information to substantiate these unfounded stories, it would seem appropriate to run a short story in the GILA NEWS-COURIER advising that: (1) Certificates were requested by the Regional Office in San Francisco for appropriate endorsements. (2) That the certificates will be returned at such time that the proper endorsements are made. —Leroy Bennett

## UNEMPLOYMENT COMPENSATION ELIGIBLES ASKED TO APPLY

The Employment and Housing Division is ready to receive applications for unemployment compensation at the Placement offices located in block 42 rec. hall in the Butte Community and 16-10-A in the Canal Community, revealed John C. Henderson, supervisor.

Unemployment compensation for evacuee workers is effective from October 1, 1942. Only those persons who were employed on October 1st or later and who were forced to stop work permanently or temporarily because of illness or injury on the job are eligible to this unemployment compensation.

There have been jobs available for all persons who were desirous of work, and those persons who declined to accept jobs because they desire to wait for some other job, which they considered preferable, are not eligible to unemployment compensation.

According to revised administrative instructions, an injured mailing worker is to be kept on the timekeeper's payroll for fifteen days after his last day's work. Thereupon, he is to be terminated and instructed to report to the Placement Office with a termination slip and a doctor's certificate reflecting his incapacity for work. The Placement Officer will review the facts and certify such employee as being eligible for unemployment compensation.

## CLAIM CONFISCATED MATERIALS NOW

This will be the last chance for those who had their books taken away to claim such articles, as they are to be sent back or distributed by other means for project usage.
