Educators To Visit Project

Fifteen to twenty principals and executive officers of Arizona high schools, together with their wives, are expected to be guests of the Rivers School administrators next Tuesday afternoon and evening. The principals have been invited to come, bring their wives, inspect the schools during the afternoon and be the guests of the administrators for dinner that evening.

They will attend an assembly in Butte High School auditorium at 8 p.m., and be guests at a dinner in Canal High School Home Economics Building at 8:30 p.m. Following the dinner, they will hold their monthly meeting of the Salt River Valley Secondary School Administrators Association.

For the evening a program of Japanese music and Japanese dances has been arranged.

RELOCATION CENTERS TO CLOSE BY DECEMBER 31

War Relocation centers will close by Dec. 31, 1945, Pugo W. Wolter, liaison officer of the relocation division in Washington, declared this week in addresses before the Canal and Butte residents.

Wolter declared that since the danger of the West Coast invasion has passed, war hysteria is gone, and since the coast exclusion has lifted, all work of the WRA will now turn to resettlement and to helping evacuees back to the normal way of American living.

The purpose of the WRA has always been and still is to resettle dislocated people. Now that the reasons for evacuation and exclusion are gone it be-

comes the natural, normal thing to go out and seek life just like everybody else.

He outlined the Resettlement Assistance program, which has been organized to help all evacuees resettlement into normal life. This program, he declared, takes care of all types of cases including welfare cases, the ill, crippled, large families, etc. This program has an answer for every resettlement problem, he said.

Social security boards have guaranteed help to needy evacuees. Resettled evacuees may apply through local social security boards for funds from the Resettlement Assistance Program. This fund is WRA money set aside to help evacuees; it is not charity, Wolter stated.

He listed five groups under which evacuees will fall.

1-Those willing and able to relocate.

2-Those willing to relocate but needing assistance to meet problems.

3-Those who want to re-

Hawaiians May Receive Grants

Hawaiian evacuees eligible for travel grants may receive leave assistance to relocate to the Midwest or East and will be eligible for boat transportation at WRA expense when they are permitted to return to Hawaii. The boat trip must be made before March 1, 1946.

The evacuee will have to pay his own expenses from the place to which he has relocated to the point of embarkation, according to instructions received recently from Dillon S. Myer.

DELEGATES TO CONFAB CHOSEN

Four evacuees, two from Canal and two from Butte, were chosen this week to represent Rivers at the all-center conference at Salt Lake City, from Feb. 15 through Feb. 23.

Mitsuru Fukuzawa and Shigeichi Mitsuyoshi will represent Canal as a result of the election last Tuesday night. Of the 3041 votes cast, Fukuzawa and Mitsuyoshi received 651 and 679 votes, respectively.

Hiroji Nishimura and Yoriyuki Sato were elected to represent Butte at a meeting of block representatives yesterday afternoon.

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AWARDED ARMY BADGE

One hundred and eighty-eight American soldiers of Japanese ancestry who were called to service from government War Relocation Centers to which they and their families had been evacuated in the spring of 1942 from their homes on the West Coast have been awarded Combat Infantryman's Badges for exemplary conduct under enemy fire in France.

All are now members of the 442nd Japanese American Combat Team. All are reinforcements who joined the Combat Team in Italy prior to its departure for Southern France and earned their awards in the bitter fighting in the Vosges Mountains of eastern France with the 7th Army. They participated in the historic breakthrough of the main German lines of resistance in this sector and in the dramatic rescue of the now famous Lost Battalion of this war in the wooded ridges near Bruyeres, France.

LEGION REFUSES TO ACT

The membership of Hood River American Legion post rejected the recommendation of the Legion's national

commander that it restore the names of Japanese American servicemen erased from the country's honor roll, AP reports.

A terse statement said simply that the post "deems it inadvisable at this time to take any action."

National Commander Edward N. Scheiberling had asked the post to reconsider its action when widespread protest against the removal of the Nisei names came from church groups, the civil liberties union and others. Scheiberling said the erasure brought much "unfavorable publicity" to the Legion and was officially called to his attention by the War Department.

turn to their California homes.

4-The welfare cases- aged, crippled, etc.

5-Those who want to stay until the war ends.

He said that those in the first four groups will be taken care of through either temporary assistance or permanent assistance, according to need. These assistances, to be given to resettled evacuees from local social security boards, will last until June 30, 1946, six months after centers have closed. In other words 17 more months of assistance will be given to those now outside, but if residents wait until Dec. 31 before resettling, assistance will be available only six months thereafter.

'LET US HELP YOU'

"All we ask," stated Wolter, "is that you let us help you; those who don't want help, we can not help."

It is the first time in history that the U.S. government has set up a definite program for the express purpose of helping out a group of people, he pointed out. In each city there are groups of people willing to help evacuees. Giving examples of wonderful job offers that have been turned down by evacuees, he stated that these things are most discouraging to people and agencies who are really trying to help Japanese.

ON INDEMNITIES

Wolter also stated that indemnities have no connection whatsoever with resettlement. It will be up to Congress to decide on indemnities, and resettlement will not change the indemnity status at all.

Answering questions as to how certain and how soon financial assistance on the outside can be obtained, Wolter said that cash aid when needed will be immediate. The best thing to do would be to see for oneself how Resettlement Assistance actually works for resettled evacuees, he said.

POULTRY SHOWS GOOD LAY RATE

The farm poultry unit
 reports more than twenty
 one eggs per bird produced
 during the month of Janu-
 ary. This is an exception-
 al lay as compared with
 averages compiled by the
 Department of Agriculture.
 A high rate of lay has
 continued throughout the
 entire 1944 year.

Don Steward, livestock
 superintendent, states that
 the outstanding record is
 due to the grade of birds
 purchased, careful feeding
 and culling, and the good
 care of the birds by the
 poultry foreman Shigeo Ya-
 washita and his crew of
 poultry workers. Stewart
 feels that this unit com-
 pares well with the better
 units in the Petaluma area

Poultry is being de-
 creased along with live-

 nouncement of the closing

PROPERTY**FREIGHT CRATING BUREAU STARTS**

The evacuee property section has started a freight crating bureau to crate evacuee property for resettlers. Under this system the property is picked up and crated by the engineering division using power tools, instead of the former method by which individuals crated their property at their home.

A. F. Chamberlin, evacuee property officer, stated that freight shipments will be made as far away as possible from the date of departure so that resettlers will not have to wait too long for their property.

Property Officer Chamberlin left yesterday for San Francisco on WRA business. Thomas Reynolds, employment officer, has been detailed to assist the evacuee property officer because of the increasing amount of work.

McCLURG AND COMPANY TO EMPLOY EVACUEES

Employment opportunities for stockroom and office help, for both men and women, are open at the A. C. McClurg & Co., Chicago, Ill.

McClurg's, one of the first companies in Chicago to hire Japanese-Americans, have at present more than 600 employees of which 150 are Japanese-Americans.

Positions open in the stockroom include the following:

Order fillers, stock man, packers, truckers, freight handlers, receiving clerks, checkers, library checkers, assemblers, scalers.

Jobs in the office include typists, clerks, file clerks, and computer operators.

Most of the male employees work 48 to 60 hours a week and their basic pay is from \$24 to \$35 a week. However, with the overtime included it is possible to earn from \$38.40 to \$60 a week. The Illinois Labor Law limits the female employees to 48 hours a week, of which all over 40 hours is paid at time and one-half rate.

These openings offer permanent post-war positions.

CALIF. SCHOOLS ACCEPT GILANS

Four Japanese American children, members of the Nakada family formerly of Gila, have enrolled at Glendora, Calif. schools, according to the Los Angeles Times.

Grace and John Nakada entered Citrus Union High School while two younger children were admitted to elementary schools. They have five brothers in the Army, and a sixth expects to be in uniform soon.

Utah Approves Relocation

The Salt Lake City WRA office is not encouraging relocation in this area, however, because of the lack of opportunity for employment in the post war period.
