"The people from Gila River are leading the way, for evacuees returning to California," according to Walter Mewing, area supervisor, of the War Relocation Authority in San Francisco, who spoke enthusiastically of the record being made by returning Gilans, in a phone convergation with William Huso recently.

Probably the outstanding achieve ent made since California was reopened was the departure last Tuesday of Fred Wakita and a group of 25 persons who were returning to their former homes in Florin, Calif. With courage and determination which would do credit to pioneers who made their way westward in covered-wagon days, .Wakita's group set out with boldness and a resolute will to resume their lives as free Americans despite the discouragement of a fire which destroyed the home and farm buildings of one of the families in groups, and the noisy and irresponsible statement s of a few West Coast people whose belief in American principles are apparently less well founded than those of Wakita and his group. Their action will serve as home front inspiration to all Americans who believe in the ideals for which United Nations soldiers of all naces and creeds are offering their lives to strength e n and preserve.

All these factors have led the government to conclude that the relocation centers have outlived their period of usefulness and that they should not be operated any longer than is necessary for individual residents towork out their own and their family resettlement problems. sequently, the War Relocation Authority has not asked for any funds from the Congress for the operation of any relocation project after December 31, 1945. Until that time the War Relocation Authority will exist sololy for the purpose of assisting those residents who wish holp of any kind, Volter concluded.
