FORTY SOLDIERS EXPECTED FROM FORT SNELLING RIVERS DONATES \$235 TO MARCH OF DIMES

Approximately 40 soldiers have been given seven day furloughs beginning today to visit Rivers to assist their families in making relocation plans according to a teletype received this week from the Minneapolis relocation office.

The soldiers will be given priority assistance in making their relocation plans during their stay in the center.

Incidentally, the Butte Y, YM, and YWA have joined forces to sponsor a "Hi Soldier" social next Tuesday night, Feb. 20, at mess hall 43, for the Fort Snelling boys and other visiting servicemen.

The social will be an invitational sports affair and will be in charge of co-chairman Yoko Goto and Fumi Oka.

W.R. CENTERS Nisei Casualty Score Hits 486

Casualty totals among Nisei serving in the armed forces of the United States as of January 25, 1945 were 486, announced Robert Cozzens, assistant director.

The total includes only Nisei who entered the armed forces from WRA relocation centers and whose next of kin at the centers have been notified.

The livestock products during January were: 225 hogs slaughtered, 8,564 doz. eggs produced, 322 head of beef cattle slaughtered, of which 120 head were sent to Poston, and 6,190 gal. of milk produced.

650 acres of vegetables will remain to be used on the project. The rest of the 6,250 acres will be turned into new alfalfa fields (1848 acres) and pasture lands (4402 acres).

The weekly report on shipment of vegetables to other centers was 3 carloads last week, 4 carloads this week and 5 carloads next week, stated Robert Davidson, chief of the farm management.

The proceeds are being transmitted by campaign chairman Stomon Faust to Mrs. Mary J. Bryan, Florence Junction, Pinal County director.

Fifty per cent of the money collected will be spent in the county; the other half will be sent to the national foundation for research on infantile paralysis.

TULEANS LEAVE FOR INTERNMENT

A special train carrying 650 evacuees left the Tule Lake Segregation Center Sunday, Feb. 11, for an alien enemy internment camp operated by the Department of Justice, reported the San Francisco Chronicle.

Eighteen of the evacuees were Issei and 632 were Nisei who have renounced their citizenship.

The destination of the contingent was not announced. This is third of such groups to be shipped from Tule Lake. In all, 391 evacuees have been transferred from the center to an internment camp.

HAYASHI SISTERS LEAVE FOR U.C.

Ruth and Jane Hayashi of 5-12-A left Thursday for Berkeley, Calif., where they plan to attend the University of California.

RIGHTS BEING RESTORED

President Robert Gordon Sproul of the University of California has assured equality of opportunity to all students of Japanese ancestry.

President Sproul's statement says:

"The University makes no distinction among students because of their race, religion, or nationality. Therefore, persons of Japanese ancestry who have been cleared by the War Department and other federal authorities and who return to California either to begin or to resume their studies at the University will not be treated differently from other former students or applicants for admission.

"Moreover, such persons will be received by the University and by the faculty and student body as well, I am sure, in a friendly and cooperative manner. For they will have been certified, in effect, to have proved themselves free from any blemish or disloyalty even under the stress of most discriminatory treatment."

Such assurance, coming from men like President Sproul, is a big boost to Nisei morale and to the nation's aim of giving equal justice to all, regardless of race, birth, or creed.

In Seattle a Japanese American nurse at Harborview County Hospital left the city of her birth because the nurses at the hospital circulated a petition, objecting to working alongside anyone of Japanese ancestry. In Chicago the Jackson Park Hospital refused to admit a Nisei girl who went there for emergency treatment. (Dr. Selig A. Shevin, member of the hospital staff, resigned in protest against the hospital's refusal.)

These cases of discrimination do hurt; nevertheless, we take courage in the fact that through big men and big institutions the Nisei is being restored his citizenship rights.

Sasaki is now with General Patch's 7th Army in France. His brother, S/Sgt. Herbert, is also in service in France.

DOCTOR FIGHTS DISCRIMINATION

Stories in the newspapers and protests from Chicago citizens have brought about a denial by a hospital superintendent that the Jackson Park Hospital discriminates in admitting patients because of race or ancestry.

Dr. Selig A. Shevin, veteran of World War II, recently resigned from the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital when one of his patients, former Gilan Toyoko Murayama, 19 year-old Nisei, was refused a bed in the ward. Dr. Shevin, who had served on the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital for 17 years, resigned to protest Supt. Lucius W. Hilton's conviction of Toyoko Murayama a few hours after she entered the hospital.

"She is entitled to all the privileges of other Americans," Dr. Shevin stated, according to a Chicago Sun story Feb. 7, "and any other attitude is un-American, unpatriotic and inhuman. It is the sort of thing that our boys are fighting for."

'GOOD TO BE BACK IN CALIFORNIA'

Impressions on returning to her home Parlier, Calif., are written in a letter from a girl who formerly worked in the transportation office here. Parts of the letter follow:

"Well finally I'm back in good ole California again. It feels so good to be back to all the things we once enjoyed. Although we do not live in our former residence, it is like awakening in a dream of familiar surroundings. Most of the people in camp seem to fear coming back because of the rumors.

"During the short time I have been here, I have experienced very little discrimination. Of course, there is a distant feeling (as you converse with former friends) but most of it seems to be your own self-consciousness. Rumors really are false, aren't they?"

LEGAL AID CLUBS TO HELP NISEI

More than 60 Legal Aid Societies throughout the country will cooperate with WRA in assisting Nisei who are unable to employ the services of a lawyer, the National Association of Legal Aid Organizations announced in a statement unanimously adopted at a recent meeting of its Executive Committee.

The service of these voluntary organizations covers both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also handle criminal matters.

Among the more common problems requiring legal aid handled by Legal Aid Societies are these: installment contracts, wage claims, landlord and tenant relationships, recovery of personal property, small loans, family relations and workmen's compensation.

Persons able to pay are not accepted as clients of Legal Aid Societies, but will be referred to capable and honest attorneys who will charge a fair fee, or a reduced fee if necessary.

Relocation officers have been instructed to maintain contact with the Legal Aid Society in each area, to develop sound relationships which will be beneficial to evacuees.
