Shevin, veteran of World War II, recently resigned the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital when one of his patients, former Gilan Toyoko Murayama, 19 yearold Nisci, was refused a bed in the ward. Dr . Shevin, who had sorved on the staff of the Jackson Park Hospital for 17 years, resigned to protest Supt. Lucius W. Hilton's ewiction of Toyoko Murayama a few hours after she ontored the hospital.

"She is entitled to all the privileges of other Americans," Dr. She vin stated, according to a Chicago Sun story Feb. 7, "and any other attitude is un-Amorican, unpatriotic It is the and inhuman. sort of thing that boys are fighting for."

The service of these voluntary organizations covers both advice and representation in court for all types of civil matters. Some organizations also handle criminal matters.
