HOG FARM FIRE DESTROYS SHED, SOME PROPERTY.

A fire of unknown origin burned the hog-farm shed on Thursday, Feb. 22, at 11:50 a.m. The shed was located exactly 150 feet from the main hog pen 1-A.

The shed was a meeting place of the workers for transportation to the camp, and a store house for farm equipments such as coveralls, rubber boots, water-proof aprons, and gloves.

The fire caused a damage of \$39.67 by destroying six pairs of coveralls, four pairs of rubber knee boots, three pairs of water proof aprons and seven pairs of gloves.

More On Filing Of Income Tax

Residents are reminded that their annual income tax returns should be filed by March 15, next, if their gross income for last year exceeds \$500, stated Attorney Ernest Iwasaki, of the project attorney's office.

The usual form to be used is Form 1040 where income is derived from wages, salaries, dividends, interest, gain or profit from business operations, etc. Withholding receipt Form W-2 may be used as an alternative form by any one where the income derived is virtually from wages or salaries.

EXEMPTION

A \$500 exemption may be claimed for a dependent regardless of age or physical condition if the following tests are met:

1-Dependent must not have more than \$500 gross income. 2-He must be closely related by blood, marriage, or adoption. 3-He must be a resident of the United States, Mexico, or Canada. 4-The returnor must have supplied more than half of the total support of the dependent during the taxable year.

In any case cousins are never considered close relations but claims for exemption may be taken for aunts, uncles, nephews and nieces, if they meet the above tests.

1945 ESTIMATES

Persons deriving income from wages or salaries who expect to receive as income over \$5000 for the current year should file their declaration of estimated tax by March 15. Where the income is less than \$5000 and is wholly derived from wages or salaries no declaration of estimated tax need be filed, stated Attorney Iwasaki.

ARMY EMERGENCY RELIEF

Army Emergency Relief this week released the following statement to WRA, pointing up the operation of its special funds to assist servicemen and their dependents in critical emergencies.

AER is a private corporation, organized under the Cross, the second highest laws of the District of Columbia, for the purpose of military award of the rendering emergency financial assistance to army personnel on posts, camps, and stations, and to supplement assistance to servicemen's dependents given by Fujiwara and to S/Sgt. In the event the dependent of an army person requires emergency financial aid, he or she should contact the nearest Red Cross chapter. Assistance will then be rendered directly from Red Cross funds, those of suitable community agencies, or from the funds of Army Emergency Relief.

Ordinarily cases requiring long or recurrent assistance, such as extended confinement for tuberculosis would be cared for by community agencies, equipped to render help of that character. Funds of Army Emergency Relief are usually available only for emergencies.

Through more than 3,750 chapters and 6,000 branches, Red Cross uses its own funds, and is later reimbursed by Army Emergency Relief, to prevent delay in rendering the assistance necessary. AER approves expenditure of its funds on a case basis.

OPPORTUNITY IN COUNTRY CLUB

Omaha Country Club, six miles from Benson, a suburb of Omaha, offers a good opportunity for group relocation. The club is on a paved road with adequate bus service for trips to town. Housing consists of 8 modern furnished rooms on the second floor of the building.

Work includes the following:

Fourteen men to work on the golf course and greens, and paintings; a couple as kitchen chef and second cook; a couple to make salad and pastry in kitchen; couple as dishwasher and vegetable woman in kitchen; life guard at swimming pool; two maids; one daddy instructor and bus driver.

Wages range from \$60 to \$100 a month per person plus room and board.

FOOTBALL WITHOUT PRE-CLEARANCE

Evacuees on the free list who wish to work at the ordnance depots at Tooele, Utah, or Sioux, Neb., will no longer be required to fill out the Personnel Security questionnaire and obtain a prior clearance from the Provost Marshal General's office before going to work.

They may make application simply by filling out the application blank at the center or field office or by going directly to the depot. At the depot, they will be required to fill out a Personnel Security questionnaire the same as any other employee before entering on duty, but pre-clearance of this questionnaire will not be required as in the past.

However, should the evacuee request pre-clearance, he may still obtain it by filling out the questionnaire and sending it to the depot with a covering letter of explanation at the same time his application forms are forwarded. The depot can then deal directly with the PWG in handling the Personnel Security questionnaire.

'RELOCATION FOR ELDERS TOO'

Elmer Tanaka, 51-9-B, who is employed in a tent factory in Chicago, has returned to the center for a brief visit. Tanaka has done well in Chicago and feels that there is a good opportunity there, now especially for older men. Many jobs are open; some evacuees are going to work the day they reach the city.

Housing is still the biggest problem, especially for family groups. Tanaka lives with a group of other workers in a rooming house which they operate on a cooperative basis at a very moderate cost. His suggestion to the head of a family is to go out to work, save money, and with three or four friends buy an apartment house and then take the family out. These apartment houses can be bought for as little as \$1,200 says Tanaka. He will be on the project until March 5, and will be glad to discuss Chicago's possibilities with anyone interested. Tanaka was president to the PTA of Butte Elementary School before going to Chicago.

FARM WORK FOR COUPLE

A farm, with 40 acres in citrus and 18 acres in alfalfa, located 6½ miles south of Phoenix, offers an opportunity for a couple with no children. The man should have some experience with this type of work. The woman would do cooking and general housework. Modern living quarters are furnished. \$75 - \$125 a month and maintenance, is offered.

The owner could possibly get 40 acres more, and is willing to work out a different income plan, possibly share crop, with a capable person. Interested persons could arrange to go to Phoenix for an interview.
