DELEGATES GIVE CONFERENCE TALK TOMORROW NIGHT

Rivers' four delegates to the Salt Lake City all-center conference, who returned here Monday, will present their reports at public mass meetings in Butte and Canal tomorrow night from 7 o'clock.

Butte's delegates, Hiroshi Nishimura and Yoriyuki Sato, will speak at the Butte amphitheater, and Sen Fukuzawa and Shigeoichi Mitsuyoshi will speak in Canal at the community stage.

Arsonists Will Face Trial

The four men accused of arson and attempting to dynamite a ranch building of Sumio Doi in Auburn, California, last Jan. 19, will face the county Superior Court at a later date as the result of the preliminary hearing in the Justice Court Feb. 21.

In the meantime, there will be a hearing in Superior Court on March 3 to determine whether or not the Surety Bonds posted by the two local brothers involved in the charges are sufficient in view of the serious nature of the charges.

The other two brothers held, both AWOL from the Army, are still in jail because of inability to make bonds of \$5000 each.

500 RETURN TO WEST COAST

Secretary of Interior Ickes announced that more than 500 persons have returned to the Pacific Coast from relocation centers since the lifting of the exclusion, the U P reported last Friday.

WRA records show that 413 went to California, 43 to Washington, 33 to Oregon, and 32 to Arizona.

OUCHIDA REPORTED SLIGHTLY WOUNDED

Sgt. Hiroharu P. Ouchida was slightly wounded in action in France on Feb. 10, according to a War Department teletype received by his brother, Harold Y. Ouchida of 73-10-A.

Sergeant Ouchida was a member of the squad which rescued the Lost Battalion.

HOSPITAL

Opens Class for Nurses' Aides

A new class for nurses aides will start 8:30 Saturday morning, March 3, at the Rivers hospital classroom. The first class meeting will be a period of introduction to the course with discussions on the hours for the class, the work, etc.

Chief Nurse Priscilla Parker states she would like to have as many students as possible because relocation is again making the nurse shortage acute.

Nurses aides applicants may be either job experience workers or those on the regular pay basis.

Interested girls who want to enter the new class are requested to notify the chief nurse at the hospital.

LEAVE PROCEDURE CONFUSIONAIRE

There has been some misunderstanding as to the types of leave now available. Seasonal or trial leave is no longer granted, and there is no possibility that it will be granted between now and the time the camp closes.

Short term leave is granted for a period of thirty days or less. Persons who are out on short-term leave are not permitted to accept employment if they wish to return to the center.

MYER COMING SATURDAY FOR THREE DAY VISIT

Dillon S. Myer, WRA director, will arrive here Saturday morning for a three day visit, during which he expects to meet with residents and staff members. He probably will discuss the post exclusion program. He is scheduled to leave Monday noon, March 5.

The Rivers post-exclusion co-ordinating committee is making plans for Director Myer's appearance in both Butte and Canal, in cooperation with the community councils.

The Director probably will appear in a series of meetings with the appointed staff, the block managers and the councils, the two high school student bodies, and at mass meetings in both camps. His schedule will be announced in the next issue.

Pfc. Madokoro Awarded DSC

The Distinguished Service Cross was presented last week to Mrs. Matsu Madokoro of the Poston Center, who received the posthumous award for her son, Pfc. Harry F. Madokoro, killed in action in Italy last summer.

Brig. Gen. John Wilson, chief of staff of the Ninth Service Command, Fort Douglas, Utah, presented the award to Mrs. Madokoro, only living member of her family.

An infantryman with the U.S. Fifth Army, Pfc. Madokoro was cited for "extraordinary heroism in action" in three assaults at Molina A. Ventobbato and in Luciana, Italy, in July. He died August 25.

A former resident of Watsonville, Calif., he volunteered for army duty in June, 1943.

BROOKS HEADS ST. LOUIS OFFICE

Miss Prudence Ross, acting relocation supervisor of Chicago's North Central Area, has announced the appointment of Miss Mary E. Brooks, formerly assistant counsellor at the Minidoka Relocation Center, to the position of district relocation officer with headquarters at St. Louis, Missouri. Miss Brooks entered on February 16, 1945. Her offices are located at 1415 Paul Brown Building, St. Louis.

Previous to her work with Japanese Americans, Miss Brooks directed an educational program for the Chicago health department. A graduate of the University of Minnesota, Miss Brooks was employed over a ten-year period in St. Paul as a social worker and later as supervisor of social services.

Yoshiharas Are At Home Again

Welcomed by friendly Caucasian neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. George Yoshihara are "at home" once again in Shelton, Wash., having arrived a week ago from Granada Colorado Relocation Center.

While they are both working very hard to get their house and oyster beds in order again, the beaming couple took time off to tell two WRA representatives who called on them, of the wonderful welcome extended by neighbors. "When we arrived here, our good neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Roy Stevens, invited us to be their house guests for three days so that we could get our own place in livable condition again," Yoshihara said.

"They even had a chicken dinner for us on Sunday, and a lot of the other neighbors telephoned us to say that they were very glad we were back again," added Mrs. Yoshihara. "We have even had people stop by and try to buy Olympia oysters from us in the few days we have been here, but we had to tell them to come back some other time,

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PVT. HACHIYA, AMERICAN

The New York Times on Feb. 17 carried the following editorial about Private Frank T. Hachiya, a Nisei soldier who was killed in action at Leyte, and whose name was among those of sixteen Nisei soldiers removed by the Hood River, Ore., American Legion Post from their county war memorial.

ANSWERS THE CALL

The members of the Hood River, Ore., Legion Post who removed from their county war memorial the names of sixteen Americans of Japanese ancestry would do well to heed the case of Frank T. Hachiya, whose name was one of the sixteen.

Japanese treachery at Pearl Harbor reacted upon Hachiya as upon other patriotic Americans. To be sure, his eyes slanted, his skin was yellow, his name different. But Hachiya was an American. He enlisted at once, and it must have been a dramatic moment when he told his Japanese father of his plan. The son went to the front; the father was removed to a War Relocation Authority camp.

HERO AT THE FRONT

As a soldier, Private Hachiya saw action at Kwajalein, at Enwetok, at Leyte. There he lay in a little valley under withering Japanese fire. Bullets cut up the ground. Men were killed and wounded beside him. The attack was stopped. Information on the enemy's strength was essential. The commanding officer asked for a volunteer to reconnoiter the position. Private Hachiya volunteered. He crept forward through the grass, now crawling, now running quickly through the open from cover to cover. The men behind watched him descent the slope and work into the valley. Then they saw him drop. A Japanese sniper had got him.

DISHONORED AT HOME

But Private Hachiya, mortally wounded though he was, could not lie there. The battalion wanted the information he had gathered. He must get back. So he crawled, bleeding and in agony, out of the valley and up the hill, through the grass and scrub and around the merciful protection of little hillocks. He was dying when he reached his lines. He made his report while they bound his wound. Then about a month after his name had been removed from the Hood River war memorial, Private Hachiya died.

Perhaps Private Hachiya never knew that the Legion post had dishonored him back home. Perhaps some day what is left of him may be brought back to this country for reburial among the honored dead.

CIO ACCEPTS NISEI GIRL AT SAN FRANCISCO OFFICE

The California CIO Council this week put to work--literally--its official policy approving the return of loyal Americans of Japanese ancestry.

Personal embodiment of that policy is pretty, capable Alico Takeuchi, Japanese American girl who went to work this week at the council's San Francisco office as secretary to

state CIO Legislative Dir. Claudia Williams.

Miss Takeuchi went there from Columbus, Ohio, where she had been employed by the Ohio CIO council.

Born in Alameda, Miss Takeuchi was living in Oakland before evacuation. She went to the Fresno assembly center and then to the Jerome Relocation Center, where she remained until going to work for the Ohio CIO, in September, 1943. Her mother lives at Gila, 28-2-C.

"I got to like Columbus, and I thought I'd stay there the rest of my life," Miss Takeuchi confessed. "But now that I've changed my mind and come back, I'm tickled pink."

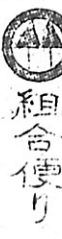
