HACHIYA, AMERICAN

The New York Times on Feb. 17 carried the following editorial about Private Frank T. Hachiya, a Nisei sol; dier who was killed in action at Loyte, and whose name. was among those of sixteen Nisel soldiers removed by the Hood River, Ore., American Legion Post from their county war memorial.

ANSWERS THE CALL
The members of the Hood River, Ore., Legion Post who removed from their county war memorial the names sixteen Americans of Japanese ancestry would do well to heed the case of Frank T. Hachiya, whose name was one of the sixteen.

Japaneso treachery at Pearl Harbor reacted upon Hachiya as upon other patriotic Americans. To be sure, his oyes slanted, his skin was yellow, his name different. But Hachiya was an American. He enlisted at onco, and it must have been a dramatic moment when he told his Japanese father of his plan. The son went to the front; the father was removed to a War Relocation Authority camp.

HERO AT THE FRONT
As a soldier, Private Hachiya saw action at Kwajalein, at Enwetck, at Leyto. There he lay in a little valley under withering Japanese fire. Fullets out up the ground. I'en were killed and wounded beside him. The attack was stopped. Information on the enemy's strength was essential. The commanding officer asked for a volunteer to reconnoiter the position. Private Hachiya voluntoored. No crept forward through the grass, now orawling, now running quickly through the open from cover to cover. The men behind watched him descent the slope and work into the valley. Then they saw him drop. A Japanese sniper had got him.

DISHONORED AT HOME mortally wounded though he was, could not lie there. The battalion wanted the information he had gathered. He must get back. So he' orawled, bloeding and in agony, out of the valley and up the hill, through the grass and scrub and around the merciful protection of little hillocks. He was dying when he reached his lines. He made his report while they bound his wound. Then about a month after his name had been removed from the Hood River war memorial, Privato Hachiya diod.

Perhaps Private Hachiya nover knew that the Legion post had dishonored him back home. Perhaps some day what is loft of him may be brought back to this country for roburial among the honored dead.

They had lived there for hearly twonty years, and in the community for forty years, Yoshihara sai d they had always been a part of the community activities and civic celebrations, parties, Red Cross committees, etc.
