Hall. The test cases involving Elmer Yamamoto, Los Angeles attorney, Ki-yoshi Shigekawa, San Pedro fisherman, both now at Poston Relocation Center,

where they can be easily found. In some cases they have been lost or packed with goods sent by freight, thus causing a great deal of difficulty for the persons involved.

Arizona, and Dr. George Ochiai, Oakland dentist, now at the Topaz Relocation Center, are being sponsored by the American Civil Liberties Union.

According to the A.C.-L.U., the rights of all persons of Japanese descent throughout the United States, alien as well as citizen, are indirectly at stake in the proceedings, since exclusion orders from military areas apparently are now being issued only against persons of Japanese ancestry.

During the four-day trial held last week before Judge Hall, all the Nisei testified to their loyalty to the United States. But none of them was questioned by the government attorneys representing the military authorities as to his loyalty.

Yahanda Visits Monterey, Calif.

In California he will meet with a group of church people on plans to have their church used as a hostel for evacuees returning to the coast.

SGT. OTANI HONORED

Before the hushed audience of several thousand Canal residents and nine Army and Navy officers the Distinguished Service Cross awarded posthumously to S/Sgt. Kazuo Otani was presented to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Yoichi Otani of 22-6-A, at a presentation ceremony Thursday night at the Canal stage.

Major Jerome S. Murphy, who presented the Cross to the Issei couple, read the citation which honored

Sergeant Otani "for extraordinary heroism in action on July 15, 1944" and for "the dauntless courage and inspiring leadership exhibited by Staff Sergeant Otani" which "exemplify the highest traditions of the Armed Forces of the United States."

The Distinguished Service award is the second highest award in the U.S. Army.

Colonel W.S. Drysdale, main speaker for the evening, commended the superb fighting qualities of the Nisei soldier in the U.S. Army.

Project Director Leroy H. Bennett introduced the president of the Service men's Relocation Association, Frank Sasaki, who presided during the program.

CINCINNATI**CATHOLIC EDITOR SCORES RACISM**

Racism must be rejected in all its forms and implications in the postwar world, the Rev. John LaFarge, New York, editor of the Catholic Weekly, America, declared at the seventh annual Interracial fellowship dinner in Cincinnati, Ohio. The Cincinnati Post of Feb. 28, reported the meeting.

Among others on the program was the Rev. John J. Yamazaki, former pastor here at Rivers, according to the Post.

The Reverend LaFarge stated:

ABROAD

"In the postwar world we must live with those who are now our enemies. We cannot discriminate against any race or clan of men as peoples. It is a world in which we must all live together.

"As responsible citizens, we demand on a world scale that the international organization now being planned and which will be debated in San Francisco, shall contain as an indispensable element in world peace certain universal safeguards of human rights, against racial or imperialist discrimination.

AS WELL AS HOME

"But it is the local field that demands our closest attention. If we thoroughly sense our responsibility as citizens of a God-fearing democracy we shall devote special attention to an effective organization of the community. The problems of hostility and conflict must be met right in our own towns."

Pamphlets On Relocation Here

GREETINGS

"Dear Friends:

"Realizing that the ban is lifted and that perhaps you may be considering returning to the Long Beach area, a friendly group of citizens of this community extend greetings. For some time we have been interested in your problems, and are eager to give any possible service. Throughout the city a number of different groups have been sympathetically discussing this situation.

"We realize that you will be concerned with finding a home. Housing is critical in this area. Every day scores of service families and business people are being turned away because of the lack of available housing. This is a serious obstacle for those wishing to return to this congested industrial area. At present we can suggest no solution to this problem.

"We would like to give you more tangible aid, but we want you to know that we are happy you are free to return to normal living whether in Long Beach or elsewhere. If we can be assistance in any practical way please feel free to contact any of the undersigned.

National Headquarters of Edward N. Scheiberling of the American Legion announced Tuesday Hood River, Ore., post, No. 22, had agreed to restore to its honor roll the names of 15 Japanese American service men which it voted to scratch out last December. One name will not be restored since he has been dishonorably discharged.

Meanwhile, an AP dispatch under a Hood River dateline states that the American Legion post is restoring Japanese American soldiers to its honor roll, but it still objects to Nisei returning to this area. Jess B. Eddington, post commander, said. Several Nisei have returned to this apple valley, despite American Legion advertisements urging them not to come back.

MESA, IDAHO, HAS WORK FOR 50 TO 60 JAPANESE

The Mesa Orchards located at Mesa, Idaho, offer to employ from 50 to 60 Japanese workers on a permanent basis.

Permanent family hous-

ing available with year-round employment promised. Women and children could work picking apples, in packing plant and dehydrating plant. There is also work for single evacuees.

The housing consists of nine 4 - room cottages and 39 two-room cabins equipped with running water, sinks, wash basins and facilities for cooking.

There is a public school right at Mesa, and Japanese American students will get the best of treatment with no tuition charges. High school students are now going to Council High School, 8 miles from Mesa.

The Mesa Co. has a contract with a local doctor and hospital to take care of Japanese medical assistance. The worker pays \$1.00 per month and the employer (Mesa Co.) pays 50¢ per month.

Wages are 60¢ per hour for all males and 50¢ for children and women. During the apple picking season wages are paid on the piece basis and workers have made excellent wages. Considering the fact that permanent housing and garden space is available to workers the income for families would be very good.

Store Offers Managers Job

A cooperative grocery store in Arden, Delaware, near Wilmington, has an opening for a manager. Salary is \$50 a week. A three or four room apartment with bath will probably be available at the same time. Wilmington offers many opportunities for employment for any other members of the family. This offer must be filled within the next two weeks. Further information may be obtained through both Butte or Canal relocation offices.

TOOELE WORKER DESCRIBES JOB

Earl Tanaka, formerly of block 6 and now employed at the Tooele Ordnance Depot in Utah, returned to Rivers this week to take his family with him.

He said there are about four Gila families among the 150 Japanese working at Tooele now. About 400 more Japanese workers are needed.

Describing conditions there, Tanaka stated that housing is available with everything furnished including sheets and pillow cases. Rent is \$27 for single persons, and \$32 for double, each with bedroom, bathroom, dining room and kitchen. "The housing is very nice," he said. "The only thing that evacuees aren't used to when they first go there are the coal stoves."

There are grocery stores and service shops a couple blocks away. All prices are moderate.

The work day starts from 8:15 a.m. and ends at 4:45 p.m., unless there is a rush order, he stated. In that case they work overtime. Workers are paid time and one half over 40 hours a week.

Bulletins Give Relocation Data
