FORMER GILAN GETS ARMY MEDAL FOR HEROIC ACT

Word was received that S/Sgt. Masaharu Okumura, former Rivers resident, was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for heroic achievement on November 14, 1944, in France.

Disregarding enemy machine gun fire, S/Sgt. Okumura went to aid two riflemen who were severely wounded 25 yards from an enemy strong point. After bringing the men to cover and rendering first aid, he again exposed himself to enemy fire to crawl back to his post.

"Later, when his patrol leader was seriously wounded in the head, S/Sgt. Okumura sent his men to a safer position, attended to the injured man's wounds and remained with him until he could be safely evacuated."

Okumura's residence in Rivers was at 64-7-C. He is formerly of Santa Barbara, Calif. He left for the Army in May, 1943.

HARRY SASAKI CITED IN EUROPE

Staff Sergeant Harry Sasaki, son of Frank Sasaki of Canal, is a member of the second battalion of the 442nd infantry regiment engaged in front-line combat high in the French Alps along the Franco-Italian border. The battalion is sending patrols into the mountain wilderness, exploring enemy territory for signs of troop movements and weaknesses.

Staff Sergeant Sasaki himself has been awarded the Purple Heart for wounds in action, a Cluster to the medal, and has won two Bronze Stars for conspicuous action against the enemy.

L.A. NISEI**CAUGHT WITHOUT
DRAFT CARD**

Ben Nakaji of Manzanar was trying to take a nap in Los Angeles Union Station one day this week. It was 2:30 a.m. He was waiting for a train to Chicago scheduled to depart 13 hours later.

A Los Angeles police officer making a routine tour sized Ben up as draft material and asked to see his Selective Service Classification Card.

As near as the police department could piece the thing together later, Ben, who is 21, got a bit flustered, didn't have his Classification Card on his person as the law demands, and so he was packed off to the special "tank" maintained for draft evasion suspects.

Then the WRA Los Angeles office heard about it, a speedy investigation was requested and Ben was cleared in time to catch the afternoon train.

The incident was the first to involve a Nisei in a Draft Card difficulties in this city. It brought prompt requests from both Police Department and Intelligence Agencies for publication in Center newspapers of the following reminders:

1--Draft Classification Cards must be carried ON THE PERSON. (Ben had his some place in his luggage).

2--A Classification Card more than six months old is worthless under law.

**ARMY ACCEPTS
JAPANESE ALIEN**

Kazuo Uno, 23, of Longview, Wash., became the first alien Japanese volunteer to be accepted in the United States Army. Aliens are taken only as volunteers and must be acceptable to the Army.

Uno, who has made previous attempts to join the armed forces, came to this country when he was two years old.

The Arizona Republic Monday states that there are 17,600 Nisei now in the service.

TRUE DEMOCRACY

Following is a letter to the editor of the Pacific Citizen, Japanese American Citizens League weekly, published in the March 10, 1945, issued and headed "True Democracy":

"I should like to remind the California Japanese that the thousands of friends who came to wave "good-bye" in 1942 when they saw them off on the train are still their friends. Real Friendship is not such a weak thing that rantings by fascists in certain newspapers can break up.

"Your neighbors in Lemon Grove, Spring Valley and other warm California valleys know that you always had a grand record as law-abiding citizens and that your sons are off fighting America's battles.

"I used to teach your children in school and I hate to think that many of you are planning on leaving this really beautiful state. No matter where you go there may be a few who understand nothing of democracy, raving around, but for every unjust person you will find a hundred good people ready to help and pull for you to reestablish yourselves.

"I can see where some of you have grown bitter--but nothing is to be gained by such an attitude. Just remember that war is cruel and hard. Come back and join your hands and hearts and we will eliminate war, greed and racial hates. All is not lost--true democracy has to win out as it is right."

"I live at Lemon Grove, Rt. 1 Box 400 B. If I can be of any help in any way call on me. I, like other thousands, am ready to help good people get back to the good clean soil of California."

One section explains how resettlers are aided by the Resettlement Assistance Program of the Social Security Board, the U.S. Employment Service, and other cooperating public and private agencies.

It is a large well-constructed 3-story dwelling house and was used for graduate theological students by the Episcopal Church. The Family House is located in a fine residential section with good transportation leading to the downtown area.

The rent for adults is \$16 a month; for children, rent begins at \$6 a month. Arrangements can be made for preparing meals.

GAMES SCHEDULED OVER WEEKEND


Two baseball games are scheduled to be played in Canal over the weekend, announced Ken Zonimura, Butte's baseball commissioner.
